BRITISH SCHOOL, SAINT JOHN.

BRITISH SCHOOL, SAINT JOHN.

The following Report was read at the Annual Meeting of the British School, on Tuesday evening 9th instant, in the Hall of the Mechanics' Institute, by the Secretary, the Rev. J. C. Gallaway:—

The Committee of the British School, in presenting their first report to the subscribers and friends of that Institution, deem it appropriate to refer to the circumstances in which it originated.

During the year 1845, public attention was frequently called, in the daily and weekly journals of the City; to the subject of Provincial Education. The observations that were made, were mostly of a complaining character, and consisted of little more than an exhibition of the defects of the present system. Much was said on the general and external apparatus of a good Provincial system, and comparatively little on the best mode of education itself. The mode of toaching appeared to some persons the first question. In order to afford the public an apportunity of witnessing the method of teaching, which is generally considered extremely efficient, and well adapted to mixed communities, it was agreed, at a public meeting called for the purpose, to apply to the Committee of the British and Foreign School Society, for the services of as competent a Teacher as they could send. The result of this application was the arrival in this City on the 27th of July, 1845, of Mr. Duval, of whom it is only justice, in the Committee, to say, that he has, in every respect, custained the high testimomials with which he was accompanied, and fully realized the hopes of the best friends of the finetitution.

Important notice.

The system steadily aims at the culture of the understanding. The memory is exercised through the medium of the judgment. Tasks, in the ordinary sense of the term, are but sparingly introduced. It is considered by the friends of this system that little is gained by compelling children to commit to rote the words and sentences of a printed book, the meaning of which is never perceived, and the attraction of which is never felt. To acquire the habit of correct and vigorous thinking, is one of the greatest blessings which can be conferred on the human mind. Let a child learn to think, and to think well, he will soon become his own teacher, and will make steadly and honorable progress in any intellectual exercise to which his energies may be devoted, and which his circumstances may require.

Almost the only influences which the British system recognizes is of a moral nature. Every reasonable method is used to make education itself attractive to the pupil. Curiosity is stimulated, spontaneous intellectual efforts are elicited, variety is studied, music is introduced, and explanations are given, less in abstract statements, than by a reference to objects of sense.

The number of children that may be taught, and taught well, on the British system, affords an opportunity of reducing the expense to each pupilwhile an adequate salary is secured to the Master-Hence cheapness becomes a further characteristic of this method.

It was the persuasion that a system of teaching possessing these features, would be a benefit to this community, and might indirectly prove advantageous to the Province generally, that induced several gentlemen, belonging to different denominations, to establish a School of the kind in this neighbourhood.

The School commenced on the 25th of Angust, 1845, with twenty-seven pupils. For some time the progress of the Institution, in point of numbers, was slow. At the termination of the first quarter, the increase of pupils was so great, that it became necessary, not merely to obtain the occasional use of an additional room, but to seek the services of an assistant. Application was immediately made to the Parent Society in England. In the mean while the Committee were constrained to avail themselves of the services of Teachers who laboured under the disadvantage of not being duly initiated in the principles of the British system. At length, ofter a delay of about six months from the time of the first application, the Committee were favoured with the services of Mr. Munro, who, in the capacity of Assistant, fully sustains the character, as an efficient Teacher, which the testimonial of the Parent Society lead the Committee to anticipate. The presence of two Masters supersedes, to a considerable extent, that use of the Monitorial system, to which Mr. Duval was compelled to resort, when the superintendence of the entire School devolved exclusively upon himself. Now, each scholar receives a much greater amount of individual attention from the Teacher, than could be given in other circumstances, and the general efficiency of the School is much increased.

A valuable grant of Books, Maps and Pictures has been arranged to introduce, as additional subjects of instruction, Latin, and the Use of the Globes.
