Chatham, Sept. 19.—The steam ferry Sybella H., plying between here and Ferry road and forming the direct highway connection between Chatham and Bathurst, is laid off this week as a result of an accident to the main shaft on Monday night owing to strong winds and a heavy tide. The boat when entering her pier swerved to one side and the impact caused the injury. She now is docked at the Miramichi Foundry shipyard. It is expected that the ferry service will be disrupted for about a week and in the meantime a small boat is conveying foot passengers. foot passengers.

PROGRESS REPORT ON DISTRIBUTION

A progress report on the civic dis tribution system was laid before the City Council yesterday afternoon and after some discussion it was decided to

City Council yesterday afternoon and after some discussion it was decided to ask that a report on the activities of the Commission, showing particularly how many services had been installed and the class of customers, be fur-nished the council every month. The report was as follows:— The report was as follows:— The report was as follows:— The section of the city south of Union street, all the poles will have been erected by the end of the week, with the exception of about twenty-five poles whose locations have not as yet been definitely decided. Fractically all the primary and secondary wires in this section will also be completed by the end of the week. The section north of Union street a number of poles have been erected, about the middle of October. In West St. John, about 80 per cent. of the poles have been erected, but no wing has been done, as yet. On Aug. 15 the commission took over the street lighting in the orna-mental section and will be ready to take over the other street lighting in the section south of Union street with-in two weeks of receipt of street light-ing fixtures. These were shipped from South Bend, Ind., on Aug. 9, and have been very seriously delayed in transit, but are now between Hamilton and St. John and should be here by Mon-day at the latest. There has been some little delay through shortage of poles and some further delay on account of shrotage of these articles. The order for wire was passed by the Civic Commission on Aug. 18, but on account of the ab-sence from the city of some of the members of the Common Council, was not authorized by the Council until Aug. 27. This delay was the reason for the holdup on account of shortage of wire. Over 350 meters have been installed and the unmber of shores are being


