FRENCH TROOPS ATTACK GERMANS

London, Sept. 22-The Times' military expert says that the line of the allies now extends on the east from a po int near St. Die through Luneville, Pont-A-Mouison, Etain, Consenvoye, Montfaucon, Souain, Rheims, Craonne, Noyon, Lassigny and Roisel to Lecalelet.

"The battle of the Aisne continues, having lasted a week with the allies making slow progress against extraordinary difficulties.

"It is no longer properly speaking, a battle, but a siege, the Germans having constructed along their hundred-mile front a series of small fortresses from Oise to the Meuse, made of old forts and disused quarries.

"Bomb-proof shelters, formed of bags of cement, and subterranean passages connect the casements on the heights of Pommiers with the open country, by means of which the enemy secures victuals and is supplied with ammunition. These elaborate works were prepared by the Germans before the march on Paris, thus indicating that they had some doubt of success.

In progress to the west of Noyon threatens the German right, and the advance between Rheims and the Argonne threatens their line of retreat and communications, through Stenay.

The deduction of the military experts here is that the weariness shows more decidedly in the German camp. They are said to be feverishly active in their work on fortifications along the Sambre from Maubeuge to Namur, and even on their lines of defence across the German frontier. This is taken to indicate a lack of confidence in the final issue of the clash of the Aisne.



MAKING OVER LAST SEASON'S GOWNS.

(By Caroline Coe.) As economy seems to be one of the new fashions, a great many women will make last year's gowns do duty for another season, and their chief difficulty, other season, and their chief difficulty, which is no great difficulty after all, will be remaking the kimona sleeves that were so popular earlier in the season.

The new sleeves are "in-set," but a clever woman can easily alter last year's kimona model to look like an 'inset' sleeve. To make the alterations she should take the paper pattern of the weight and draw a line with pencil from waist and draw a line with pencil from under the arm in the front to under the arm in the back, curving the line to give the desired length on the shoulder.

Rip waist carefully and lay pattern over waist and mark line with pin-

points or chalk. Run a small tuck around this line on inside of waist and stitch. Sew up under arm seam and the "new set-in-sleeve" is complete.

A new waist may be made in this same way, using old pattern.

Hon. W. T. White, minister of finance, speaking at the Central Canada exhibition, in Ottawa, last week, referred in a spirited manner to the great European conflict. 

To preserve the lines of the coat the greatest care should be used in cutting. All of the parts of the pattern, with the exception of the collar, are placed on a lengthwise thread of the cloth. Make notches carefully and be sure that they correspond perfectly before they are put together. It is worth what it will cost to have a tailor press the seams.

In cutting place pieces with edge marked by triple "TTT" perforations on a lengthwise fold and remaining on a lengthwise fold and remaining pieces with line of large "O" perforations on a lengthwise thread of material. For shorter length jacket cut off lower edges of side front, side back and back on small "o" perforations.

In making, first adjust the vest to position underneath front and tack at corresponding double "oo" perforations. Join front to side front, and back to side back as notched. Pleat, creasing on slot perforations in side back, bring folded edge to small "o" perforations in back and press. Close under-arm seams as notched. Close center-back seam from neck edge to extension;

seams as notched. Close to extension; lap extension in back as illustrated and tack. Close shoulder seam. Sew collar to neck edge as notched. Roll revers as illustrated. revers as illustrated.

Close sleeve seams as notched, leaving back seam free below small "o" perforation. Sew in armhole, inside seam at notch in front, easing in any fullness. Upper edge of the pocket lap is indicated by small "o" perforation: adjust on jacket upper edge along crossline of small "o" perforations in side front and side back.

The buttons and silk braid add much to the effectiveness of the coat. It is the latest thing to have buttons and revers match.







Again, after protesting against the view that only France and Prussia were concerned in the conflict of that day, he insists that, "when Prussia becomes the arbiter of the continent . . . she will be neither accommodating nor indulgent." Even in the wretched plight to which he had lived to see his country reduced, M. Chevalier was confident that France would rise again. She was still at the core the same nation that England knew as an ally in 1854 and 1855, and in spite of her reverses would develop again into a great and powerful nation.

Michel Chevalier, the author of this noble and pathetic appeal, was born at Limoges on January 13, 1806. He was educated in the School of Mines. He early entered public life. In 1838 he was made a councillor of state. In 1846 he became a member of the Chamber of Deputies. For a time he had belonged to the St. Simonians, but in his mature life he was known to hold quite different views from theirs. In 1840 he was appointed professor of political economy in the College de France. In 1851 he was made a member of the Institute. With Cobden and Bright he had a share in the making of the commercial treaty of 1860 between France and Great Britain. Among M. Chevalier's works may be mentioned his "Letters on North mentioned his "Letters on North America," his "Essays on Industrial Politics," his "History and Description the College de France.


