

Daily Hints For the Cook

OATMEAL MACAROONS Two and a half cups oats, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup sugar, 1 table-spoon butter, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Drop by teaspoon on buttered tins, shape a little with the fingers. Bake 10 or 15 minutes. Take off the tins before they get brittle. Two and a half cups oats, 2 teasp

RAILROAD BISCUIT Sift into your mixing bowl a quart of bread flour, 2 heaping teaspoons of baking powder and a little salt. Then work into the flour a piece of butter or lard as big as two eggs. If you use lard mix with sweet milk, and if you use butter you can mix with water and a little milk to make a dough soft enough to pat out about 8-4 of an inch thick. Sprinkle it with brown sugar and bits of butter generously and roll it up and cut same as you would slice a jelly roll. Put into a well-buttered tin. Lay each slice in the tin. They are to be eaten hot. Bake in a quick oven same as any biscuit.



MORE EVIDENCE OF SOUNDNESS OF THINGS IN CANADA

(Montreal Herald)
"In neither city did I find anything but complete and quiet confidence in the soundness of Canada's economic position and in the steady advance of the tide of prosperity."

This is the declaration of George H Wykes, special correspondent of Financial America of New York city. Mr.

cial America of New York city. Mr. Wykes, special correspondent of Financial condition appeared in the Sunday Herald. It was written from Montreal. The second article is from Toronto.

"In my first article," he says, "I made it quite clear I venture to think, that the criticisms and gloomy predictions concerning Canada's financial position lately indulged in by certain financial writers in the United States and England, have engendered in financial circles in Montreal and in government circles at Ottawa nothing beyond a feeling of unfair treatment.

"Here in Toronto. I have found the

"Here in Toronto. I have found the spirit of optimism even more pronounced and the croakings of the critics are being good-naturedly laughed at. It is admitted that at the present time a lull in municipal and commercial enterprise is being experienced but it is argued that this is due wholly and solely to universal financial stringency and that nothing is wrong with the fundamentals of Canadian finance."

Mr. Wykes goes on to quote Sir Henry Pellatt in a forceful interview.

Sir Henry advances the theory that the attempt made to create an adverse impression in American and European markets concerning financial conditions in the dominion, has been engineered for the purpose of checking immigration of American farmers into Canada to interrupt the flow of United States money into Canada for manufacturing purposes and also, perhaps, to divert European capital from Canada to the United States.

"I have no misgivings whatever," says Sir Henry.
