

UNDER ARREST ON DYNAMITING CHARGE

Indianapolis, Ind., April 22—After months of investigation, directed by William J. Burns, the San Francisco graft investigator, now head of a detective agency, John J. McNamara, international secretary of the Bridge and Structural Iron Workers of America, the head quarters of which are in Indianapolis, was arrested here late today charged with complicity in the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times on October 1, 1910, and the plant of the Llewel-

er.

A later investigation of the international offices of the union disclosed in a storeroom in the basement of the building 64 sticks of dynamite, 200 feet of fuse, 500 dynamite caps, one dozen small alarm clocks and a leather case made to carry a ten-pound can of nitro-glycerine. Detective Burns took possession of all the explosives.

CONFESSES HER SHAME TO SAVE MAN'S LIFE

Sensational Turn Given in Trial of Doctor for Murder of His

St. Louis, Mo., April 24—The St. Louis
Star publishes the following:
Crushed by the action of the Illinois
supreme court, which refused Wednesday
to grant him a new trial on the charge
of having murdered his wife the night of
May 30, 1909, Dr. Haldane Cleminson admitted to a Star correspondent in Chicago that he had deliberately shielded proof
of his innocence and committed perjury
in his trials in order to protect the name
of Mrs. Anna Schmidt of St. Louis.
Mrs. Schmidt, wife of James Schmidt,
a saloon keeper, of 3701 North Broadway,
St. Louis, admitted to Star reporter she
was with Dr. Cleminson practically all the
time the night the murder was committed
and that she knew him to be absolutely
innocent. She said:

"Dr. Cleminson and I were together from 8 o'clock in the evening until 4 o'clock in the morning. We were in his office together, and we have proof of it. If the crime was committed at or near midnight, as the police say, Dr. Cleminson is entirely innocent.

"I am willing to go to Chicago, and repeat my statement before any judge or jury. I would have declared myself long ago, but Dr. Cleminson forbade it, saying he could get out of the trouble without dragging my name into it. Since all his efforts have failed and the supreme court has refused to give him a new trial, I have persuaded him to let me tell everything, and prove his innocence.

When asked why she gave her name as Anna Schmdt, while Dr. Cleminson referred to her as Anita, Mrs. Schmidt said her name is Anna, but that she chose Anita because it was more euphonious. She said she was generally known in Chicago as Anna. Mrs. Schmidt's statement was and



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


