JUDGE CASSELS TO OPEN THE MARINE DEPARTMENT ENQUIRY HERE TOMORROW

An Interesting List of Witnesses. It is Not Yet Decided Just Where the Commission Will Sit, as Court Room is Engaged--Commissioners Arrived From Montreal at Noon Today.

Judge Casseles, who is conducting the investigation into the marine and fisheries department and other matters of the commission including the secretary, Dr. W. Morse, assistant registrar of the exchequer court, Ottawa, and G. H. Watson, Toronto, the counsel, arrived in the city on today's Montreal train for the opening of the enquiry which begins here tomorrow.

It was at first intended to hold the sittings in the court house but as the circuit court is in session there tomorrow it had not been arranged up to the time of going to press where the commission would sit.

J. C. Perron, K. C. of Montreal, also of the counsel has been in the city for the past few days making preparations.

Neither Judge Casseles, Dr. Morse or Mr. Perron would talk of the enquiry, but it is understood that the following will be called as witnesses:


John Kain





CARNEGIE FAVORS A TARIFF REDUCTION

He Declares Infant Industries of United States Can Now Take Care of Themselves—Increase Tax on Luxuries and Reduce It on Necessities.

New York, Nov. 22.—A notable article from Andrew Carnegie, dealing with the tariff, will appear in the forthcoming December number of the Century Magazine, in which the iron master takes the position that "infant industries" no longer need protection; that the steel and other industries have now grown beyond the need of tariff protection; that duties on luxuries used by the rich should be maintained, but that those on manufactured articles should be reduced greatly, or abolished entirely when no longer needed.

Protection Not Needed. Further on, Mr. Carnegie says: "We have already become by far the greatest of all manufacturing nations. The infant industries of the past have reached maturity, and speaking generally, are now quite able to protect themselves."

MONCTON GIRL IS A VICTIM OF POISON

Miss Gertie McLellan Drank Wood Alcohol With Suicidal Intent and Lived But Short Time.

Moncton, Nov. 22.—Gertie McLellan, aged seventeen, daughter of Alexander McLellan, of the I. C. R., died quite suddenly in convulsions this afternoon after an illness lasting only a few hours. She took ill this morning and gradually sank until 2.30 this afternoon, when death ensued.

It appears the young girl was a victim of wood alcohol poisoning. She was of a weak mind and had previously threatened to do away with herself by taking wood alcohol. Friday last, according to her story, she drank a quantity of wood alcohol, and this morning the poison began to take effect. She took violently ill and although three doctors were called and everything possible done to save her life, she died in convulsions about 2.30 this afternoon.

**STUDENTS GO OUT ON STRIKE**

Grand Rapids Veterinary Students Drew the Color Line When Negro Students Entered.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Nov. 20—Thirty-four members of the junior class in the Grand Rapids Veterinary College, walked out of a class room today when the negro students entered to resume their studies. Because of the objections of other students, the colored men had been denied admission when they returned to college this year, and the negroes appealed to the courts. Judge Perkins' mandamus to the college management to admit the colored students being a quasi-public institution, had no right to discriminate against citizens because of their color. After today's strike the school authorities suspended the entire junior class, including the two colored students until next Tuesday.

**MILLIONS SPENT ON NEW ROLLING STOCK**

C. P. R. Will Spend \$2,000,000 on New Passenger Equipment Before June.

Montreal, Nov. 22—D. McNeill, vice-president and general manager of the C. P. R., who has just returned from an inspection of the port facilities at the inauguration of the season at the winter port of St. John, N. B., says the construction department of the company is now busy building new equipment at nearly the pace marked when the country was in the hey day of prosperity. The Angus shops, he said, are turning out twenty freight cars a day and will be doing so for the next six months at least. The construction of new locomotives has also been resumed at the Angus shops and a locomotive a week is being steadily produced. Half a million dollars has been appropriated for this between now and the close of the fiscal year in June, and nearly \$2,000,000 will be spent in passenger equipment.

The order for 200 street freight cars which was given out to the Dominion Car and Foundry Company, shows activity in another direction. As the last engines of the large locomotive order upon which the Locomotive Company has been at work at Longue Point is complete, there will probably be further orders placed at an early date with that or some other outside company.

The Grand Trunk has just placed an order for 1,000 steel hopper coal cars with the Pressed Steel Car Company of New York. These cars which cost about a thousand dollars apiece, have high sides and a hopper underneath and they can run up on coal sidings and discharge their load in a few minutes.

The Canada Car Company is still busy with the orders for the Grand Trunk Pacific rolling stock, turning out about twenty cars a day as it has been doing for the last four years. The original order is for 10,000 cars, and this has been exceeded and a new one undertaken. The cars are worth eight hundred dollars each, representing an expenditure of about \$2,000,000.

**DENVER TO HAVE BIG CONVENTIONS**

Delegates Representing More Than a Million Employes of Building Trades and Railways Will Meet Today.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 23—Two adjuncts of the American Federation of Labor, which closed its annual convention Saturday, will convene in Denver today. These two organizations represent more than a million men, the building trades and railroad employees departments, the latter an organization of 600,000 men formed in Denver last Saturday. The building department will represent about 600,000 men, and the first session will be called to order by President James Kirby, of Chicago, a leader in the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners. The Building's Trades Department of the Federation has been in existence about a year, but the branching out of the railway employes, a new venture that has for its purpose the organization of every shop and track employee connected with the railways of the country. The leaders hope to secure the co-operation and eventually the affiliation of the teammen, conductors, engine men and firemen, and thus make the railway employes' organization the most powerful of its kind in the world.
