SLAYER OF ELEPHANTS JAMES SUTHERLAND HAS SPENT 17 YEARS IN THE JUNGLE.

Elephants and Sold Tons of Ivory May Visit Canada In the Near Future—He Is Tired of City Life and Will Go Back To His Job In

Taking a few days off, before returning to Africa to resume the slaughter of elephants for their ivory, ames Sutherland, Scotsman and champion elephant slayer of the world, may pay Canada a flying visit in the near future.

The spoor of the giant pachyderm

is more familiar to Sutherland than the ways of civilised man and he confesses that he feels a restraint in the stuffiness and restricted area of a city and will return to his job, which ting elephants. For the past seventeen years Sutherland has all but lived entirely in the wilderness of Africa, surrounded only by natives. He has shot some

the wilderness of Africa, surrounded only by natives. He has shot some 600 elephants and sold tons of tvory. An average expedition requires six to nine months and yields about two tons of tvory. Ivory in bulk is worth about \$7,500 a ton, so that there is a fairly good compensation for the risk and isolation.

As for the isolation Sutherland has come to like it. He has little use for the artificialities of civilization, find-

the artificialities of civilization, find-ing life in the "rori," as the denizens call the dense African forest, more call the dense African forest, more sincere and straight-from-the-shoulder than life in the cities. As for the risk—they are many, but they are a part of the business the same as risk accompanies steeple-climbing and railroading and electrical work. It's all in a day's work. A man who lacks



the nerve has no business elephant hunting, says Sutherland.
"There is no calling, except prize fighting," says the veteran huntsman, "that requires a man to be so physically fit as does elephant hunting. Absolute control of one's nerves is necessary. The elephant has the advantage over the hunter. He is higher up, he can see over the tall grass and locate the hunter. The great beasts charge through the forests directly at the hunter and especially if wounded are extremely dangerous."

Sutherland's closest shave, as he deplares, occurred in 1908, when he had trailed a herd of five bull ele-phants all day. He secured four of the beasts with little trouble. The fifth was wounded near the heart when it charged the hunter. Now in elephant hunting there are only four vulnerable spots and they are small spots, too, which one must hit to have his shots count. There is the brain shot, between the eyes, the shot shot, between the eyes, the shot through the small opening in the ear, bullet in the vertebrae of the neck or one in the heart. At any other spot on the great carcass a bullet is likely to fly off at a tangent, or make

This particular big bull, irritated by a fiesh wound, was charging the hunter. One does not shoot elephants for a lifetime without learning to hold one's nerves in control and wait until the quarry is near enugh to insure a shot in the vital spot. There

insure a shot in the vital spot. There is not much use in missing the vital spot, because if you don't get the elephant with a single shot the chances are very good that the elephant will get you.

Sutherland's second shot at this pachydern took effect in the eye, gouging out the optic, but not halting the beast. In an instant the elephant was crashing through the bush and was crashing through the bush and had tossed him with a blow from one of its tusks. Before he had time to scramble to his feet Sutherland was seized about the waist by the elephant's trunk and flung aloft. He landed on the beast's back and slid off. The third attack of the bull ledged the hunter high in the branches of a tree, unconscious. One of his native servants fetched him his gun and assisted him to recover con-

Pulling himself together, his gun supported by the native, Sutherland fired his third shot, when the elephant advanced to within a dozen or 15 yards. Although it brought the bull to its knees, it did not stop it, Nerving himself with all the re-serve energy he had, groggy though he was, the hunter managed to put a fourth bullet in the elephant's

brain.

The hunter has visited the wilderness camps of Henry M. 

Fhirty persons subscribe \$5,000 for con-templated trip from Barlin to San Francisco in 1915.

New York, November 3.—Prospect for a trans-atlantic voyage by sirehip seems to be a matter of the immediate future, according to the statement that A. L. Oronemeyer, of the Hamburg American Line, gave out resterday atternoon. He is the passenger traffic manager of the line, and recently returned from Hamburg, where he saw the managers of the company that operate the Zeppelin dirigibles over a passenger carrying route from Berlin.

Mr. Cronemeyer said that this company contemplated the construction of a huge dirigible that would be fixed enough to tross the North Atlantic and these fix over the United States to the Panama Pacific Exposition at San Francisco in 1915. The design of the big dirigible has not yet been wholly formulated, but he declared that it would have the capacity for sufficient fuel to last on speli a long voyage and wpuld possess a speed of about sixly miles an hour.

The transatiantic Zeppelin would have passenger accommodation for 30 persons, and, according to Mr. Cronemeyer, that aumber have already signified their intention of taking passage at the rate of \$5.000 each.

Hopes to settle street-car strike

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 7.—Indianapolis will not be placed under martial law and the entire State militia, that was brought here yesterday for strike duty, will remain in its present quarters as long as there is a possibility of settling the street-car strike. This announcement was made by Governor Ralston after he had conferred with both sides to the controversy early to-day.

"I am very hopeful of having this trouble settled by arbitration," said the Governor, "and as long as there is a possibility of bringing this about I shall not place the troops in control of the city."

The Governor yesterday and last night was trying to bring about a settlement of the strike through the Public Utilities (Commission, which is acting as an intermediary.

The recognition of the union seemed to be the bone of contention between the strikers and street car company.

Everything was quiet on the streets this morning and there was no demonstration of any consequence made against the troops during the night.

If the Powers support action of United States.

Berlin, Nov. 7.—The correspondent of the Frankfort Gazette in Mexico City telegraphs to-day that he has the impression that General Huerta may perhaps retire from office as provisional President if the Great Powers support the action of the United States, as by so doing he will avoid the appearance of yielding to American pressure alone.

The correspondent mentions a plan of the Provisional President to receil the Mexican minister from St. Petersburg to-assume the provisional presidency.

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BRIDGED AN OCEAN

The Lost Atlantis That Was Swallowed by the Sea.

A NATION OF MANY LEGENDS.

Plato Got His Story of the Continent and Its Ruin From Solon, the Old Lawgiver—The Theories That Were Built by Ignatius Donnelly.

Far out beyond the Pillars of Her

cules, where the Atlantic ocean stretches broad and deep today, men of imagination like to believe there lies a buried kingdom. The sea washes over its once fertile plains, and creatures of the deep float in and out among its topless towers. Seaweed and silt have Here, scientists of a romantic turn will tell you, lies the lost island of Atlan-tis, where once there ruled the richest and most powerful of the earth, a world power while wolves still howled upon the seven hills of Rome and the glory that was Greece lay yet undreamed.

But today all that remains of the lost kingdom is a little group of islands the Azores: mountain tops these that were not wholly overwhelmed when the proud island sank into the sea. Many years ago an Irishman, Ignatius Donnelly, who possessed an active imagination and a mind which worked along interesting and unusual lines, wrote a book about Atlantis, in which he proved, to his own satisfaction at least, that the lost kingdom really ex-isted and was not a fable. The earliest authentic information

about this mystery land we find in Plato, who averred he had it from his grandfather, Solon, the famous law-giver, who had spent some years among the Egyptians. Plato told of a great continent which had existed 9,000 years before lying to the west of the Pillars of Hercules and making war nnon the nations to the east. Athens and Egypt were able to withating the onslaughts of the Atlantans, and then suddenly, "in a day and a night," the island was overwhelmed and sank into the sea. This was the story Solon had from the Egyptians and which his grandson wrote down, and the legend has persisted ever since.

Diodorus Siculus, a Roman writer, tells how the Phoenicians discovered "a large island in the Atlantic ocean between the Pillars of Hercules, sev-eral days' sail from the coast of Africa. This island abounded in all manner of riches. The soil was exceedingly fer-tile. The scenery was diversified by rivers, mountains and forests. It was Chocolates the custom of the inhabitants to retire during the summer to magnificent country houses, which stood in the midst of beautiful gardens. Fish and

game were found in great abundance; the climate was delicious and the trees

bore great crops of fruit at all seasons

of the year. Soundings made by British and American vessels have shown conclusively that surrounding the Azores there is a submerged plateau, which it does not require much imagination to identify with the "rich plain" mentioned by Plato. From this lost continent Donnelly believed that ridges of land ran to the present coasts of South America and Africa, originally, so that before the time of which Plato wrote the eastern and western hemispheres were connected by land. Thus he accounted for many similarities in the plants and animals of the two hemis-pheres which otherwise are very dif-

ficult to explain. The continent as described by Plato was mountainous, but was surrounded by vast fertile plains. It was rich in ous metals and had numerous tem

precious metals and had numerons tem-ples and statues of gold and silver and ivory.

In the sudden and violent destruction of Atlantis, "In one dreadful day and night," Donnelly believed he saw the origin of the legend of the deluge, so niversal among the followers of all eligions. The Biblical deluge, the flood in which the Greeks befleved, from which only Deukalion and Pyrrha escaped, the overflow which Chaldean legends tell of all these, Donnelly be-lieved, had their foundation in the destruction of Atlantis.

Plato tells us that the race of the estate and committed sins, and the Zeus determined to overwhelm them. An earthquake preceded the sinking of the land, and there came a great torm which brought the sea rushing n over the once fruitful land. Before this deluge Atlantis was the reatest power in the world, Donnelly

aid. Not only had it made war against the infant nations of Europe, conquer-ing France and Spain and Africa as far as the Nile, but colonies were es-tablished in Mexico, in Central America and along the valley of the Missis-The mound builders were coloists from Atlantis. After the destruction of the parent continent the eastern and the western hemispheres lost all remembrance of each other, as both of them at last forgot the great Atlantis, or if they remembered at all reered it only as a legend, a faint

and shadowy tradition.
Only a few of the thousands of inhabitants of Atlantis escaped, but these few carried to Europe the seeds of the white man's civilization. They settled in Egypt and in eastern Europe and ere the forbears of the Aryan race.-Kansas City Star.
