

CHANGES COMING IN THE CABINET

Beautiful Shuffle Expected Before Laurier Goes to Country.

Murphy and Guthrie Both After One Job and Sir Allen Aylesworth Holds It --- Other Changes.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, June 12.—Before the general election Sir Wilfrid Laurier will set his ministerial house in order. That this will be a troublesome task all Ottawa knows, and developments within the last few days have not served to make the travelling better. The immediate difficulty, which has grown mightily since the Laurier departure, has to do with the justice portfolio, and explains the unexpected recall by Sir Allen Aylesworth of his announced decision not to run again for North York. Sir Allen is to hold on to his portfolio until the claims of rival aspirants for his shoes are disposed of. Hon. Charles Murphy secretary of state, wants to be minister of justice and his active friends among the Irish Catholics say that he is going to be minister of justice. But there is another man to be reckoned with, Hugh Guthrie, of Guelph, has been slated for the portfolio of justice for months and has been training for the part. After being twice passed over, once to allow Jacques Bureau to become solicitor general, and once to M. MacKenzie King as ministerial prestige to capture North Waterloo, Mr. Guthrie has finally got into first place on the waiting list with the justice portfolio as his objective point. If Sir Wilfrid makes good with Mr. Guthrie there will be a row in the Murphy camp, and if he gives the portfolio to Mr. Murphy there is likely to be a need for a new Liberal candidate in South Wellington. Other cabinet changes to be made before the election, include the translation of Hon. L. P. Brodeur to the Supreme Court Bench and the selection of a successor. If Hon. Frank Oliver is not dropped before the election he will be beaten at the polls. It is stated that two new men will come in when he goes out, the big interior department being divided, one branch being given to Dr. Michael Clarke, and the other, including the lands branch, to J. A. Calder, of Saskatchewan, the leading member of the Scott government in Saskatchewan.

MONCTON ON THE VERGE OF A BOOM

Another Big Industrial Concern Regards Railway Town As Favorable Site For Establishment Of A Plant.

Special to The Standard. Moncton, N. B., June 12.—At tonight's meeting of the city council, called to meet the deputation of the Board of Trade for the consideration of the proposition of the Burton Saw Co. of Vancouver, to establish a branch factory in Moncton, Mayor Reilly stated that an American company, capitalized at a million dollars, was looking for a site in Canada and regarded Moncton as a favorable site on account of natural gas and other advantages. He said this company did not ask for any bonus. No action was taken. Mayor Reilly reported that the L.C.R. board of management said the company was willing to enter into a fifteen year contract for water supply at 7 1/2 cents per thousand gallons.

NEW OPERA WINS A KING'S PRAISE

King And Queen Of Italy See First Presentation Of Puccini Opera and Congratulate Composer.

Rome, June 12.—King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helena attended by their court tonight witnessed the first presentation in Rome of Puccini's opera, The Girl of the Golden West. The performance was of high class and at the end of each act, the composer and the singers were enthusiastically applauded, the latter being called many times before the curtain. The king invited Puccini to the royal box and congratulated him warmly on the success of his opera.

PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY ON LIVE ISSUES

Menace of Mormon Community to Canada, and Effect of Ne Temere Decree Discussed at Yesterday's Sessions.

Ottawa, June 12.—The menace of Mormonism to Canada was emphasized at the Presbyterian general assembly today, which went on record in favor of an active campaign against it. The matter came up on the report of a special committee which was presented by Rev. Dr. W. L. Clark, of Montreal. That the Mormons were, as a rule, a sober and industrious people was the opinion of Rev. Dr. McLaren, of Vancouver. But their religion propounded some abominable principles and their morals were a positive danger to Canada. The number of marriages and progeny appealed to a Mormon, but was distasteful to a Canadian. They had attained power in the United States and talked of getting the balance of political power in Alberta if not in all Canada. The Mormons voted together and a corporate vote was always dangerous and not desired in Canada. Mormonism was more of a menace than Roman Catholicism, because the Mormon priest had a greater hold on the people. "We don't want that sort of thing in Canada," said Dr. McLaren, "and the main remedy is to preach the Gospel in the very centres where Mormonism is making a stand." Continued on page 2.

A VIGOROUS ATTACK UPON PROTECTION

United States Representative Entertains The House With Two Hour Dissertation on Theme Of Free Trade.

Washington, June 12.—An attack upon the protective tariff system by an American manufacturer who claims to have studied labor and manufacturing statistics in many countries of the world, held the close attention of the house of representatives for two hours today. Representative Wm. C. Redfield, of Brooklyn, a new Democratic member, a manufacturer of machinery, and long connected with export trade declared to the house that American manufacturers are abandoning the protective principle as unnecessary, as they develop more scientific management of their own plants, now carried out in the more advanced American factories. "The protective tariff has simply enabled the American manufacturer to sell at such high prices that they have not studied their own conditions closely," said Mr. Redfield. "They have relied on government support rather than upon close business management. Its effect has been to stifle the development of plants until they are now so large that products must be sold abroad. In this condition the manufacturers no longer want to pay the high prices necessary for material under a protective tariff." Mr. Redfield declared that instead of foreign labor being cheaper, American labor is really the cheapest in the world, that no labor produced as much in proportion to wages received as American.

SAYS RECIPROCITY WILL PASS SENATE

Senator Lodge Declares That United States Senate Will Vote In Favor Of Canadian Trade Pact.

Washington, June 12.—"Reciprocity will go through the senate all right," said Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts at the White House today. "Whether the Root amendment goes through is not so material. Even if it does not, the agreement will be just as effective." Senator Lodge said he had abandoned his idea of offering an amendment for the protection of fishermen in his state.

Good Progress Made at Valley Ry. Conference

Hon William Pugsley and Hon. J. K. Flemming, Acting Premier of the province, arrived in the city at noon yesterday and at 5.30 p. m. a meeting was held in Mr. Pugsley's office to discuss the Valley Railway question. Hon. John Morrissy, Chief Commissioner of Public Works, and Hon. Robert Maxwell, were also present as representatives of the Local Government. It is understood satisfactory progress was made towards an agreement. A further conference will be held this morning at 11 o'clock. While no information as to the result of the conference so far is available, there is reason to believe that a settlement of outstanding difficulties in the way of the construction of the Valley Railway will be arrived at by the representatives of the two governments.

PROBING THE DOCKET FOR THE SUGAR TRUST

Stockholders Of American Sugar Refining Co. Received Dividends But Little Information Of Company's Affairs.

Washington, D. C., June 12.—So carefully guarded were the operations of the American Sugar Refining Company up to less than two years ago, E. F. Atkins vice-president and acting head of the corporation, told the special sugar investigating committee of the house today, that stockholders were accorded no information as to how the company was being conducted. The condition grew so onerous, the witness said, that the New England stockholders combined to take control and when they did so, they discovered to their astonishment that H. O. Havemeyer, the presiding genius of the organization, had maintained his supremacy with only 2,000 shares of stock. "That was a surprising discovery as it had been generally supposed that Mr. Havemeyer owned the greater part of the stock," said Mr. Atkins. Referring to the work of a committee he said, "we found that there were 18,000 New England stockholders, and 10,000 of these were women. They were helpless as far as representation was concerned, and I was urged to take a place on the board, which I did." He explained how control for the New England stockholders was secured by his election and the election also of Samuel Carr, Chas. H. Allen, W. H. Thomas and Edward Marston, all of whom now are present that majority of the stockholders known as the New England syndicate.

RECIPROCITY WITH THE WEST INDIES

Member Of Barbadoes Legislature Says Closer Trade Must Come Between Canada And Islands.

Ottawa, June 12.—Dr. C. E. Gooding, of the Barbadoes legislature, who is in Ottawa today, states that there is every indication that reciprocity between Canada and the West Indies was a thing of the near future. "The people of the West Indies, particularly those of Barbadoes, are strongly in favor of reciprocity," said Dr. Gooding, "there will be no difficulty in reaching an agreement with my island, at least."

WANT GRAND TRUNK TO EXTEND TO BOSTON

Montreal, June 12.—Cy. Warman, of the Grand Trunk, has received from Boston a box containing 100,000 names of persons inhabitants of the New England states, petitioning the Grand Trunk Railway to extend its lines to the city of Boston. It is doubtful if such a numerously signed petition has ever been seen in Montreal before.

St. Petersburg, June 12.—The sinking of an over-crowded ferryboat on the Volga, near Uglich, is reported. Thirty persons were drowned.

WILL PREVENT "AERIAL" BOMBS

DR. NESBITT WILL REMAIN OUT OF CANADA

Not Likely That Man Concerned In Farmers' Bank Smash Will Ever Return — Crown Not Hunting Him.

Toronto, June 12.—The News says today: "Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, the original with the seven leagued boots, who has simultaneously fought in the Mexican war, played priest at Hamilton, eaten oysters at Baltimore, and trimmed hair in Minneapolis, is not voluntarily coming back to Canada. "The News received this morning assurances from several sources that the crown authorities are not expecting the former president of the Farmers' Bank and are making no efforts to locate him or involve him further in the prosecution proceedings. "The first thing we want Dr. Nesbitt for is forgery," stated Inspector Duncan this morning. "After that we want him for several of the charges on which Travers was committed to the penitentiary. There is a long list of allegations."

CHILD MEETS AWFUL DEATH

Little Girl Crushed Between Elevator and Wall in Her Father's Home in Grosvenor Square, London.

London, June 12.—The little daughter of Marshall Roberts, grandson of the late Marshal O. Roberts, of New York, was killed in an elevator accident at her father's residence on Grosvenor Square today. The girl's head was jammed between the elevator car and the walls. It was necessary to demolish the wall before the body could be liberated.

PROPOSED SYDNEY PLANT TO GET NAVAL CONTRACTS?

Rumor That Sir Henry Pellatt And His Associates Will Secure Bulk Of Canadian Naval Work.

Ottawa, June 12.—There is an unconfirmed rumor in circulation here, that the new British-Canadian ship building company, of which Sir Henry Pellatt is chairman, is almost certain to secure the bulk of the contracts for the building of the vessels of the new Canadian navy. The rumor regarding them. No official confirmation of the rumor is therefore obtainable, and the contracts cannot be awarded until the minister returns.

FRANCE DOES NOT APPROVE OF SPAIN

Powers Signing Algeciras Act Not Agree With Recent Action In Morocco.

Paris, June 12.—Official confirmation was given this evening to the statement published here that France has notified the powers signing the Algeciras act that she has informed Spain she cannot approve of Spanish occupation of Elarajah territory in Morocco. For the moment, it is declared, France will treat with Spain.

FRENCH TROOPS ENTER A MOROCCAN CITY

Mequinez, Morocco, June 8, via Tangier, June 12.—Gen. Moineau's column arrived here today after a long and arduous march from Fez. The French troops had engagements almost daily with the Beni Mair tribesmen. The gates of the city were opened after a slight resistance and the pretender Muley El-Zin surrendered on receiving a promise that he should not be harmed.

LONDON WILL POLICE EVEN THE SKIES DURING CORONATION WEEK

Airships Will Not Be Permitted to Operate During the Coronation Ceremonies --- Police Regulations Vigorous.

London, June 12.—Acting under the powers conferred by the act recently passed by parliament, home secretary Churchill has issued an order prohibiting navigation of air craft of any description over the county of London on the three days of the Coronation processions, and also over Windsor and London on the three other days devoted to events connected with the Coronation. The penalty for failure to observe this law is imprisonment for six months, or a fine of \$1,000. The police regulations to insure public safety on Coronation Day are becoming so rigorous as to be almost calculated to deter the general public from any attempt to witness the procession. It is now announced that all the barrier gates will be closed not later than 8 o'clock in the morning, possibly much earlier than that, and that all seat holders must be in their places by 7 o'clock. The Admiralty announces that Coronation Day will be observed by the Navy by a revival of the ancient custom known as "splicing the main brace," which means the grant of an extra allowance of grog to the men. The Coronation performance of Sheridan's "The Critic" at His Majesty's Theatre on June 27, will have a cast almost as brilliantly representative of the theatrical profession as the recent Drury Lane performance of "Money," given in honor of the German Emperor.

BALTIMORE IS STORM CENTRE

Electrical Storm Which Did Such Damage In New York Reaches Maryland — Great Property Loss.

Baltimore, M. D., June 12.—A terrific electrical storm with rain, hail and wind broke over Baltimore at 6 o'clock tonight, putting practically all the telegraph and long distance telephone wires to the north, out of commission and doing thousands of dollars' worth of damage to property in the suburbs. The storm was of short duration but after a brief interval another heavy rainstorm set in which lasted for several hours. So far no loss of life has been reported. New York, N. Y., June 12.—Electrical storms such as have raged intermittently over New York and vicinity during the past 48 hours, with great damage from lightning and wind and flood, were reported to the immediate west and north here tonight. Terrific storms struck Baltimore at 6.30 o'clock and half an hour later both the Western Union and Postal Telegraph Companies reported the loss of all wires between Philadelphia and Baltimore. The exchange of news between eastern and western points had to be made by roundabout routes, and then was carried on only with the greatest difficulty. A violent electrical storm was also raging in Syracuse and other up-state points at dark tonight, and communication was practically cut off up to a late hour.

SUFFRAGISTS IN STOCKHOLM

One Thousand Delegates At The Opening Session Of Congress Of The International Women's Suffrage.

Stockholm, June 12.—The sixth congress of the International Woman Suffrage Alliance opened here today, there being present a thousand delegates from Europe, the United States, Australia and South Africa. The address of welcome was made by Mrs. Anna Whitlock, of Sweden, after which Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, was re-elected president of the Alliance. Riksdag Deputy Beckman spoke warmly in favor of the suffrage women and then Mrs. Catt delivered a long and eloquent address on the history of the movement. Mrs. Frederick Nathan, of New York, proposed the formation of an association of Swedish men to work for women suffrage. The congress will sit until Saturday.

GERMAN COMMITTEE SELECT THEIR BOAT

Kiel, June 12.—A final selection has been made by the committee of Tilly XIV, Wamoose and Siebrand III, as the German representatives to race the American boats in the Sonder class events on June 19.

PULP MEN ON STRIKE

Glens Falls, N. Y., June 12.—Three hundred employees of the Ticonderoga Pulp and Paper Co. went out on strike for an eight-hour day. The men, it is claimed, have been working eleven and thirteen hours a shift. The strikers are all members of the International Brotherhood of Paper Makers.

AND STILL THE FARMERS' BANK.

The Farmers' Bank tragedy will not soon be forgotten, nor will its victims be easily silenced. The fight has been, for the time being, fought out in Parliament, but a long drawn out series of contests still loom up before the courts.

The circumstances surrounding the application for and the granting of a certificate to the bank have been set forth in part in the discussions in Parliament, and the preliminary proceedings of the courts.

The victimized shareholders have determined to resist the double liability claim and have perfected their arrangements and secured able counsel to present their case.

The certificate was, they contend, illegally granted, and got by men who had violated every section of the Bank Act, which prescribes the necessary steps to be taken, and this illegality, they affirm, was made plain to and known by Mr. Fielding before he granted the certificate.

THE BRITISH CENSUS.

Preliminary reports of the recent census in Great Britain and Ireland, are now practically complete, and assuming the figures to be substantially correct, the total population of the United Kingdom is as follows:

Table with 2 columns: Country and Population. England and Wales: 36,075,269; Scotland: 4,759,521; Ireland: 4,338,778; Total: 45,223,568.

Compared with the 32,527,843 of the 1901 census, the figures for England and Wales show an increase of 3,547,426, or 10.91 per cent.

In the provinces, in strong contrast to Scotland's experience, there are practically no signs of rural depopulation. With the exception of West Suffolk and Cumberland, which are stationary, every county shows an increase, large or small.

The Irish figures show a decrease since 1901 of 69,997. Although the shrinkage of the population has been continuous since 1841, the percentage of loss for the last decade is the lowest on record.

One of the first steps in the formulation of a law of the air has been taken in Great Britain, where Mr. Churchill has introduced a bill "for the protection of the public against dangers arising from the navigation of air craft."

The words of Le Canada, the Laurier French organ, are coming true. Le Canada persisted in saying that Laurier was going to the Conference to repel the aggression of those who would involve Canada in closer imperial bonds.

A woman writer says that women are much more generally dressed for hot weather than men. Probably she is right. Yet when one thinks how some fine men would look in a peep-a-boo waist cut low at the neck, it is hard not to have doubts.

There are just two possible policies for Canada, one is commercial union with the United States, and the other is commercial independence. We are making our choice now.

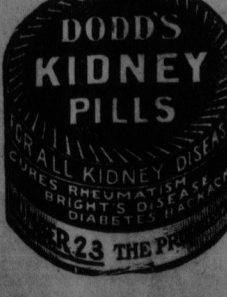

FINANCIAL WORLD

TRADING ACTIVE ON RISING MARKET

New York, N. Y., June 12.—For a time following the opening of the stock market today trading was active and prices advanced vigorously. The demand included virtually the entire list of active stocks and the market appeared to be well established on a level which showed substantial gains. This advantage was held fairly well during the first hour with no appearance of the pressure which had been exerted so steadily during recent days as to give rise to various reports of the operations of a powerful bear clique. Before noon, however, selling was resumed on a heavy scale, and the tone of the market changed suddenly.

United States Steel and Gould stocks exhibited marked weakness and nearly all of the important railroad and industrial issues shared in a reaction which cancelled gains and in some cases resulted in net losses. During the remainder of the day the market was dull and trading was largely professional in character. Toward the close trading became more active and prices were bid up sharply.

Stocks of the Gould and southern lines were the weakest on the list. Gould shares reflected the uncertainty as to the action of the directors tomorrow in regard to the dividend on Denver and Rio Grande preferred. Despite reports of continued hot, dry weather in the cotton belt, despite predictions of rain, depressed the shares of southern roads. Almost the only stocks to exhibit sustained strength were those of the copper group. Amalgamated copper, Anaconda, Utah Copper, Tennessee Copper and American Smelting all responded to the improvement in the copper metal market, and reports of larger domestic and foreign demand.

The conflicting movements in the market today represented a continuation of the hesitation and weakness which were prevalent throughout last week. Uncertainty as to the outcome of investigations of corporation and as to the maintenance of dividend rates reports of the effect of the drought in the south and southwest and disquieting acts of the determination of the powerful operators to break the market, particularly U. S. steel, are advanced in explanation of the sensitive condition of the market. All these are factors which doubtless have their part in the formation of speculative opinion.

Underlying them, however, is the belief that the outlook for the general industrial situation is still clouded. The expected improvement apparently having been discounted to some extent by the recent rise in stocks, the market, in the opinion of some observers is awaiting more definite signs of better business conditions and in the meantime is reflecting the same symptoms of hesitation which are manifested in the various lines of commerce and industry.

General business in the west so far as traffic returns of the roads in that section indicate, is holding steady in most directions with no movement toward extensive expansion. Grain receipts at Chicago last week fell off heavily.

The annual report of Westinghouse Electric, showing a new high record for both gross and net earnings, had little effect on the stock which declined sharply after an early rise. The stock shared in the recent improvement of electrical shares, and the announcement that no dividend would be paid at present, prevented a further gain. Bonds were irregular. Total sales, par value, \$3,490,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.
