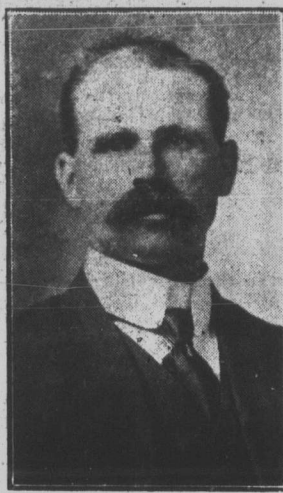

TOWN COUNCIL MET ON TUESDAY

Small attendance of Members.
The Apportioning of Assessments Still Left Over

SEWER EXTENSION

The Town Council met on Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There was present at opening of session Councillors Alexander, Ellsworth, Luman and White. The minutes of previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Communication was received from the Board of School Trustees notifying the Council that \$6800 would be required for school purposes. Letter was laid on the table.

Communication received from Geo. Gould asking for a rate for electric power for the Campbellton Steam Laundry. Referred to Electric Light committee.

Communication from W. J. Christie notifying the Council that he had disposed of his old building on Victoria street and asking the Council to arrange other quarters for the hose reel. Referred to Fire Protection committee.

The following reports from committees were received and adopted:—Councillor Alexander from Water and Sewerage committee recommending payment of accounts totalling \$68.89; Councillor Luman from Police and License committee recommending that license be granted C. LeBlanc on payment of \$10.00; Councillor White from Fire Protection committee recommending payment of accounts totalling \$356.00.

Tenders were then opened for the construction of sewer extension from Sugarloaf street to J. Pichette's property. Three tenders were received—Thos. E. Stevenson \$262.00; W. J. Christie \$214.00; and S. D. Harriman \$212.85. On motion that of S. D. Harriman's was accepted, the work to be commenced at once.

The Town Clerk was requested to instruct the secretary of the Board of Health with regard to insanitary premises on the Tobique Road and to ask that this be remedied.

On motion it was resolved that the Board of Health be notified that in the opinion of this Council it is advisable and necessary to have all householders and lessees within the sewerage district connect their premises with the sewerage system, and any person failing to do so after a reasonable time being given to be prosecuted under the by-laws governing the same, and that the Board of Health report to Council on this matter next Tuesday evening. Council then adjourned.

Clean Sweep of all Old Members and only Two Opposition Men Elected in Madawaska.

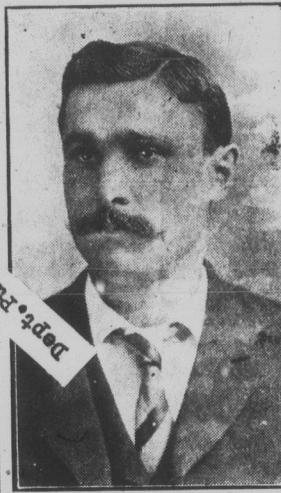
THE STANDING OF PARTIES

ROOSEVELTS FORCES MAKE NEW MOVE

Now Plan to Capture Convention by Independent Action.

NEW CANDIDATE

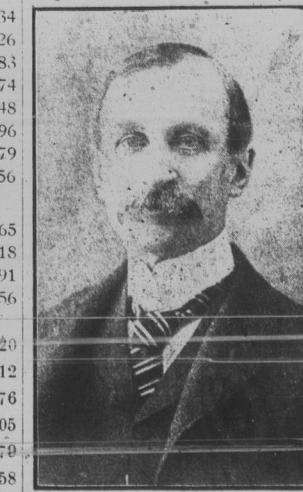
Chicago, June 13.—The long expected crash in the Republican ranks came tonight. The Roosevelt forces, acting, they said, under the personal direction of the Colonel himself, began to lay their plans for independent action in the National Republican Convention. As a forerunner of the more drastic action expected in the convention tomorrow or Friday, the Roosevelt members of the committee on credentials withdrew from that body tonight, withdrew in person and in effect, withdrew all of the Roosevelt contests, which had been scaled down from 92 to 78. Colonel Roosevelt tonight was in the midst of a series of exciting conferences, and was busy figuring on the local delegates whom he could expect to carry with him out of the convention, or rather into a separate convention on the convention floor in event that a crisis is reached.

People who talked with the Colonel tonight declared there was no longer any doubt as to his attitude. Convinced that the credentials commission was against him and would retain the contested Taft delegates in their seats, Colonel Roosevelt decided to go no further with his futile action of contesting the delegates. The Missouri delegation in the convention held a caucus tonight for the purpose it too was reported, of formally launching a boom for Governor Hadley for President. The remarkable demonstration given the Missouri executive in the convention today, together with the sudden turn in affairs, it was said, to have strengthened their belief that the time was ripe for bringing forward a compromise candidate. In the meantime there was much talk of Justice Charles E. Hughes, of New York as the candidate of the convention.

Some of the leaders ventured to suggest a ticket of Hughes and Hadley. All sorts of wild rumors were current as the crash came. Senator Dixon declared tonight that one final appeal might be made to the membership of the convention.

"We shall have exhausted then every legal and moral duty developing upon us. The future will have to take care of itself."

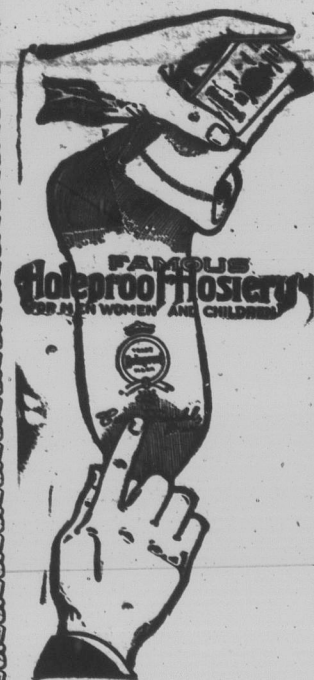

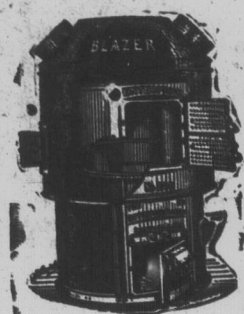

THE ELECTIONS

The general elections for the provincial elections are now past over and after the dust and smoke of battle are cleared away, there remains only a feeling of sorrow. The final result is certainly surprising, for not even the most optimistic supporter of the government ever dreamed that such a landslide was imminent.

It is a great pity for the good of the province that so far only two opposition members have been returned; for a government is never at its best unless beset by a strong opposition. It has been shown on many occasions and in many parliaments that an administration which has no check upon its doings runs rapidly to seed, and is often killed by its own supporters in internecine strife. The work of the government and its probable checked career will be watched with interest by both sides of voters.

In Restigouche Hon. C. H. LaBillicois drops out of the game after nearly thirty years representing the county; and his loss will be keenly felt. His record is one to be proud of and even his most bitter political opponents cannot but admit that Hon. C. H. LaBillicois was one who can ill be spared; and general regret is expressed in government circles over his reelection in his own county.

The turnover in the voting is remarkable; the increase in the conservative vote being very large, for whereas LaBillicois polled only a hundred votes less than in 1908, the conservative vote is increased four hundred, D. A. Stewart leading the poll with 1575 against J. E. Stewart in 1908 with 1041 and A. C. Culligan polled 1475 against 1033 in 1908. Later reports give Culligan 1576.

Taken all over, the results are disappointing from the standpoint of the good of the country and the workability of the government, but then the rush to be on the side of power was unprecedented, many falling over who will as quickly swing back again.

TARIFF TINKERING

Having cut the cement duties in two in the hope of gaining political favor in Saskatchewan the Big Interests Government has offered some compensation to its friends, the manufacturers, by removing the duties on a number of articles which are used by manufacturers as raw material. The list includes the following:—Rattan, flat braids of glazed cotton, celluloid xylonite or xylonite, hard rubber in strips or rods, crushed artificial abrasives, peroxide of barium, binitrotoluol, trinitrotoluol, perchlorate of ammonia, fine glass plates or discs for optical instruments, and silk thread, when made out of cotton or wood. It has also decided to lower the duty on colodion, metal parts for cameras in the rough, peppermint oil, undyed typewriter ribbon, silk for neckties and paper matting. Drawn iron under fourteen gauge is to be free when imported from Great Britain. All these items are manufacturers' supplies, and only as such will they be entitled to the free or reduced tariff. Importers who are not manufacturers will have to pay the old rate, and the "clamorous consumers" will derive precious little benefit therefrom. The net result of this latest exhibition of tariff tinkering by order-in-council is a gift to certain manufacturers, who, the Government organs tell us, have been pressing for the concessions. The Government will lose the amount of the reductions in revenue, and the amount will go into the pockets of the manufacturers.

WOULD HAVE FATHER CAMPBELL THEIR OWN

People of Delano Parish Inaugurate Movement for Erecting Parish House There.

The people of St. Mary's parish, Delano, have started a movement for the erection of a parish house and are endeavoring to have the Rev. Father Campbell, pastor of the Delano and Delano churches, to change his residence to that place. It is stated that the parish will attempt to raise \$1200 or \$1500 for the residence.

Rev. Father Campbell, who at the invitation of the Sisters of the Academy and Mr. J. M. McCarthy, has been attending the commencement of St. Augustine's school and distribution of prizes, returned home yesterday by auto at the invitation of Mr. and Mrs. Cate of Delano. Father Campbell expressed himself in the highest terms of the people and places visited and seen.

The Rt. Rev. Mgr. McCarthy was also a student of the Propaganda college, Rome, Italy, where Father Campbell, after studying four years, graduated in 1896. The Rev. LETTERS TO EDITOR

Dear Editor:—

Your article relating to Y. M. C. A. deserves attention. The need of such an institution for all classes of our young men and boys, is quite evident to anyone who has given thought to the lack of such a work in our community, as the Y. M. C. A. is doing in other towns through out Canada.

That we need such an institution there is no question but whether we can equip and maintain a successful working Y. M. C. A. with the prospect we have of raising a yearly budget to cover expenses is quite another question, and one with which we should deal squarely.

When the citizens of Campbellton got together a few years ago, and gave their earnest thought to the establishing of such an institution here they were met with this advice (from those whose experience in Y. M. C. A. work both in large and small towns in this country) "Do not undertake this work, unless you have a proper equipment suitable to your prospective membership."

After going into the subject quite carefully, as to the needs as then in evidence (and conditions are not much different to-day) we were advised, unless we could build and equip such an institution, in a thoroughly and up to date manner we would not be in a position to attract and hold our membership.

It was with this plan in view, that the I. R. C. authorities, were asked for a site, on which to build a permanent structure of brick or concrete, whether they would allow us to put up a building of a temporary character on the site, they have leased to the Y. M. C. A. we cannot say. At all events, the Town by Laws would prevent this.

If a suitable home for the Y. M. C. A. could be obtained elsewhere in a central part of the town, the lease we hold from the I. R. C. could be surrendered, and the rent applied to the running expenses as you suggest. Those interested in the original plans are still trusting, that some time we may be able to build, on the beautiful site leased from the I. R. C. and therefore would not care to give it up.

If there is a possibility of organizing on a small scale, for carrying on efficient work, let us by all means, get to work, and as the work develops, we will have a better idea of what we should do in regard to permanent buildings and equipment.

With this end in view, we would suggest a meeting of those interested-being called to consider ways and means.

He said—there can be no better field furnished outside the home and mother. The home is of course the missionary centre and the strength of the nation." He mentioned the S. S. as being the richest field for activity, as some one has said, "If you save a man, you save a unit, if you save a boy, you save a whole multiplication table." In imparting missionary instruction, the man or woman at the head of affairs must be full of zeal, enthusiasm, and courage, remembering it is God's work we are doing, and a hand on high is drawing us on by the cable of His love, and giving us His help and guidance. One way of stimulating missionary interest is by the circulating of missionary literature among the children, such as lives of Paton, Mackay of Uganda, etc., and thereby creating in the child's mind a taste for literature of this kind.

Rev. Mr. Ross then gave a short talk on the graded lessons, pointing out the difference between them and the regular International course of study. He gave a brief sketch of the different helps, Primary, Intermediate, Senior, etc. A short discussion on this subject took place, several questions being asked, and answered by Mr. Ross.

The next item on program was "How to teach the lesson." Mr. Kelly spoke on this subject for a few moments.

The three problems confronting the teacher are:

1. How to interest the pupil, and get him to the school.
2. How to impart the subject matter of the lesson.
3. How to bring about the development of the best christian character in the boy or girl.

The teacher must be perfectly familiar with his subject, so much so that he need not confine himself to his text, and use a good number of illustrations, together with the use of the blackboard.

Rev. Mr. Hardy then spoke for a few moments, laying particular stress upon finding the point of contact between the lesson and the child, and strongly advised questioning the child to find out whether the teaching had laid hold of his mind.

Rev. Mr. Ross then spoke briefly on this subject, advising teachers to learn the art of story telling, and to let the story make its own moral application.

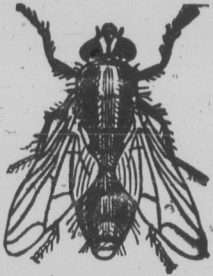

AN OLD SEA TRAGEDY RECALLED

A Halifax Writer Tells of the Loss of the Atlantic and How Hon. W. S. Fielding Made a "Scoop"

The Halifax Morning Chronicle of recent date contains an article by F. W. Bowes, formerly a resident of Sackville. The Titanic catastrophe recalls to his memory another marine disaster which occurred very near the coast of Halifax.

On Tuesday, the 20th of March, 1873, the steamship Atlantic of the White Star Line under command of Capt. Williams left Liverpool for New York, having on board 33 cabin passengers, 776 steerage passengers and a crew of 143 men, total 962 souls. They had favorable weather until the 24th, when heavy gales were encountered lasting for several days. The speed was thus retarded and on the 31st there were but 127 tons of coal aboard. The ship was then distant from Sandy Cove 460 miles, making 8 knots an hour. Under these circumstances the Captain deemed it best to bear up to Halifax. At midnight the ship was about 48 miles from Sambro Light near the entrance of Halifax harbour and at 3:30 a. m. she struck on the rocks of Prospect Cape, a rocky peninsula projecting about 70 feet high.

The Captain and his officers endeavored to save the passengers. But it was too late. The ship was fast on the rocks. The sea breaking over her with tremendous force carried away the port boats and within ten minutes the ship careened heavily, rendering useless those on the star board side. Capt. Williams tried to induce such of the passengers as had been able to reach the deck to climb into the rigging and outside the rails where the ship was highest and less exposed to the water. The third officer and the quarter masters by this time having established communication with the outlying rock about 40 yards distant by means of a line got four other lines to the rock along which 200 people passed. Between the rock and the shore was a passage 100 yards wide. A rope was passed along this by which means a number reached land in safety though many others were drowned in an attempt to cross.

About six o'clock boats appeared from the shore and rescued those on the rock and along the side of the ship. These were cared for by fishermen. Large numbers had died in the rigging from cold and fright. The Captain said he remained on the ship until he felt his hands and legs becoming useless when he entered one of the boats and went ashore leaving great number of the passengers clinging to the rigging and portions of the wreck.

The chief officer, Mr. Firth had a terrible experience. After the crash came he tried to free the boats but the heavy sea swept them away. He clung to the mizzen rigging climbing higher and higher for safety. Through the thick spray he saw men on the rock but did not know how they got there. At daybreak he counted thirty-two persons, the only ones left alive on board in the rigging, including a boy and one woman. As soon as it was light enough to see most of them tried to reach the rock by means of the lines but it was then so rough that they were all drowned. At last none remained but

himself, the woman and the boy. A heavy wave swept the boy overboard. Mr. Firth secured the woman firmly in the rigging but, after bearing up with great endurance until noon, she died and he was left alone. He was finally rescued by the Rev. Mr. Ancient (who passed away within the last few years). When he was taken off, the body of the woman was left, her eyes staring from their sockets, her mouth foaming, her hands sparkling with jewels.

The survivors were taken to Halifax in a most pitiable plight, ragged, careworn and sick. It was found that the Atlantic with her splendid saloons and state-rooms, was horribly overcrowded by 100 decks. She was run by a set of drunken, carousing sailors and officers and her coal was of a cheap quality in keeping with her crew.

When she struck, in the dark night the evils of overcrowding became terribly evident. The immense throng surged up the narrow gangways leaving its dead behind or precipitated through the ports into the sea. No women and children or but one or two, reached even the deck in that frightful press. It is devoutly to be hoped that never again will occur another disaster like that which strewed the coast of Nova Scotia with dead on which the over crowded ship became the scene of an unheard of barbarity when women and children were driven to the wall and of the fierce and dishevelled man who had ridden over from Meagher's Head only for themselves and the feeble were cast aside.

How different the scenes on the Titanic were practically none of the men and nearly all the women and children were saved.

In connection with this wreck Hon. W. S. Fielding made the greatest newspaper "scoop" of the age. He was then editor of the Chronicle and returning home in the early morning after an editorial grind, when he encountered an excited and dishevelled man who had ridden over from Meagher's Head and reported the disaster. Mr. Fielding wrote an account and wired it to a leading paper in London, New York and Boston. Those journals got out special editions and Halifax was deluged with telegrams for particulars. It was April 1st and the story was first regarded as an "April Fool." Later in the morning it developed that it was anything but a hoax.

A few months later a picture show toured the provinces showing scenes of the wreck. They had moving pictures even as long ago as that, 39 years, but they were slightly different from those of today. They were painted on canvas and rolled on a big wooden cylinder. Mr. Bowes remembers this show exhibiting in Bowes' Hall in this town. One of the pictures was a beautiful and almost nude girl being cast upon a rocky shore at the feet of a hardy fisherman. The Sackville ladies became hysterical gazing at it and some fainted. The building in which these pictures were shown is still in existence, an old tenement house on Charles St. A monument was erected to the

COFFIN FAMILY ROMANTIC HISTORY

Brilliant Services in South Africa and Elsewhere by Head of Family.

In Tuesday's issue of The Monton Transcript under the head of record purchase of New Brunswick farm lands, it states a Mr. W. G. Pine-Coffin, the proprietor of large landed estates in England, had purchased seven farms in the Province.

It may be of interest to our readers as well as being a historical fact, that Mr. Coffin is not the first Englishman of that name who has secured land in the eastern part of the Dominion.

In 1798, Admiral Sir Isaac Coffin, when cruising in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, took a notion that he would like to own the Magdalen Islands. He very easily obtained a grant of them from the British government, and was then designated as Sir Isaac Coffin, Baronet, Admiral of the Red in His Majesty's Fleet, proprietor of the Magdalen Islands. Since then this estate has always had an agent on the Island, and the occupants of land pay a rental of twenty cents an acre annually, one seventh of the Island being reserved for the support of the Church of England Clergy. In the collection of the latter rental last year there was some trouble between the tenants and the clergymen, and a Commission was sent by the Anglican Bishop in Quebec to investigate and report on the matter, with the result that a more happy understanding exists to-day, and both the tenants, who are mostly Catholics, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners are on better terms than formerly.

In a financial sense the Magdalen Islands are not a paying investment for the Coffin estate, but apart from that it is something to own a Canadian Archipelago.

The present head of the Pine Coffin family had a distinguished career in South Africa during the Boer War, and in the final stages of the campaign commanded a mobile column in the Free State, or what is now "Orange," he was a very mobile officer, as also was his column, and did considerable damage to the Boer Commandoes that were operating in that part of the country.

It was well known that immediately a British force vacated a camp it was the custom of the Boers to descend on it and collect all the ammunition they could find. The average Tommy Atkins is careless as to his rifle and ammunition, and rather than carry a bandolier containing one hundred rounds which is weighty, he would leave some of it behind.

As the Boers had many Lee-Enfield rifles, these cartridges were used by them. Pine-Coffin thought out a plan to deter the Dutchmen from using the ammunition, and loaded a number of the cases with a very high explosive, and had them strewn about the bivouac. It had the desired effect, many of the Boers having their rifles blown to pieces, and in some instances themselves. Had the Dutchmen succeeded in capturing Pine-Coffin, he would have had very short shrift.

Several years after the war, this same officer was on a shooting expedition in Upper Egypt, and was murderously attacked by some of the inhabitants of an Egyptian village, it was said, owing to his shooting pigeons, which are to some natives sacred. Several of the natives were publicly executed for the affair, and in was reported to have had a satisfactory effect on the community. The Mr. W. G. Pine-Coffin referred to in The Transcript is descended from the Admiral Coffin of 1798.

victims of the Atlantic at Terence Bay. It was unveiled late in the year 1907. The money for the stone to mark the resting place of these hundreds who met death when they reached the new world to which they had come expecting to better their condition, was furnished by the White Star Line.

COST OF LIVING STEADILY CROWS

Government Record For May Shows an Increase

Ottawa, June 17.—The cost of living continues to ascend in Canada. According to the latest reports of the Department of Labor the continued rise in prices was maintained in May, though not in such a marked extent as during the preceding month. The department's index number which went up more than a point during April, reached the highest point in the record of the department during May. This rise of nearly ten points in one year constitutes a record in the history of the department, and it is a noticeable feature that during the last year the lowest point was recorded during May and June, while the figures for May this year show an advance over those of any previous month. Animals and meat advanced to unprecedented levels during May, an unusual feature of the market being that all low grades have advanced as steeply as the choice grades. Grains and fodder showed an increase during the month as also did fruits and vegetables. Increases, on the other hand, were recorded in the case of dairy products and fish.

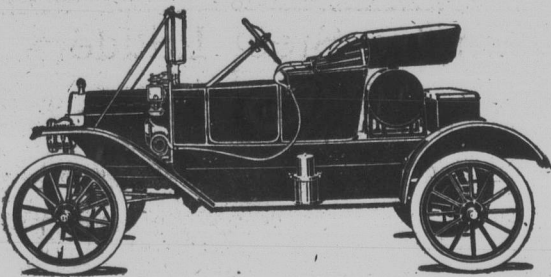

THRILLING INCIDENT ON HIGH STREET, MONCTON

Little Child Saved From Death By a Cool-Headed Motor-Driver

Moncton, June 2.—On High Street on Saturday morning there was a thrilling incident, which caused the hearts of the on-lookers to stand still.

It was a marvelously narrow escape from instant death of a little child, and a warning to mothers that increased looking after little children is in these days of street cars and automobiles needed.

About 10 o'clock, a street car was going down High Street when a little two-year-old boy sitting at the side of the road, without the slightest intimation of his intention suddenly rushed out in the middle of the road between the rails about a rod in front of the advancing car, and playfully held up his hands.

The motorman jumped down and picked the child up and it was unconscious for a minute. It had lost its breath. He gave it a quick tap or two and the child commenced to breathe again.

WASTE OPPORTUNITIES IN MARITIME PROVINCE

Ottawa, June 17.—The British manufacturers arrived here yesterday, and are being entertained by members of the government. "One thing that impresses me with the general run of Canadians I have met," said Mr. James Deuchar, president of James Deuchar, Ltd., a Scottish corporation capitalized at \$4,000,000, "is that Canada does not require brains. What is needed is capital. Canadians have impressed me as being an exceptionally brainy people." Speaking of farming in the Maritime Provinces, he said: "I never saw such a waste of opportunities. The farmers do not get all they should out of the land, I fancy one reason is that the farms are so small, most of them being between 100 and 200 acres with the farm necessarily having a limited capital. In the east of Canada I have gained the impression that the farmers do not make the most of their opportunity at all events. There is very little scientific farming, excepting at the experimental station and agricultural colleges."

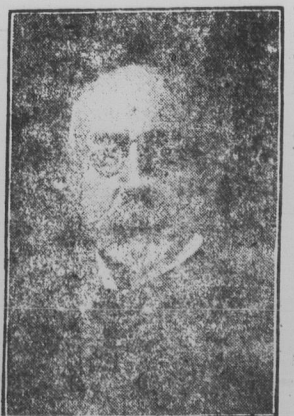
