\$50,000 DRIVE BY NATIONAL MUSIC UNIV.

(By The Associated Negro Press) Illinois, March—The Chicago. friends and students of the National University of Music Chicago, have set aside the first week in May to be known as National University of Music week, and ask all race loving people to assist in a drive for a \$50, 000 building fund for the purpose of permanent quarters for this great race institution. The University is not for profit, but for the purpose of affording a musical education to students from anywhere in the United States.

Some two years ago Miss Pauline Lee, founded the University. Aided by a few friends, she leased the old home of Madame Schumann-Heincke, the famous prima donna, located at 3673 Michigan Boulevard, for the rental of \$150 per month. At first the struggle to survive was a very difficult one, but the unfailing energy of the founder, coupled with the gradual recognition by the race of the great value of the institution, it has managed to continue to keep its doors open to the many eager students who seek a musical education.

The building in which the university is housed is about to be sold and it becomes necessary either for the members to purchase the building or provide other quarters. It is for this reason that the board of directors and friends have considered it advisable to make an appeal to the entire race throughout the United States to aid in the drive for the sum of \$50,000 to be used in the purchase and alteration of the present building, or the buying of a new one.

THE BROTHERHOOD

AND WORLD PEACE

The London Brotherhood Federation is to be congratulated upon the initiative it has taken to foster the spirit of world peace. A letter to The Free Prees from David Ross, President, says in part: "This peace movement demands that all asistance be rendered by hose who are leagued together to further, by every means available through 'men of goodwill' in all Christian churches; yes, and all organizations having for their object the betterment of human conditions by peaceful means, are called upon to co-operate in the attainment of World Peace. A letter will probably be sent to the clergy of several denominations and to leaders of other organizations soliciting their aid towards giving expression through a public meeting under the auspices of the London Brotherhood. To the Men's World, Brotherhood is due, in most part, the progress now made cause. towards peace. The motto of the organization, 'One is your Master even Christ and all ye are brethren,' explains the animating principle underlying all its work.

This attempt on the part of the Brotherhood to prepare the hearts and marks that organization as one of the most outstanding and forward thinking bodies of the present age. What sacredness of brotherhood and the folly of wars? Can we, the Christian nations, continue to butcher, maim and murder each other and at the very same time have the world believe that we are followers of Christ? Can we afford to harbor within our breasts, race prejudice, castel, greed, envy, suspicion, jealousy-those evils which make for war-and still claim to be following in His footsteps? Either we are liars and hypocrites, or we are ignorant of what Christianity implies. It is the aim of the Brotherhood to combat these evils in the lives of men by living examples of, "One is your Master, even Christ and all ye are brethren." And of "This is my commandment. That ye love one another as I have loved you." In commenting upon the present movement for world Peace a few days ing her for further examination. ago Vicar General D. O'Connor said:

"It is very simple. All that is needed is an international return to the Christian virtues of justice and Charity." Many of our leading statesmen are seeking to inject the spirit of the Sermon upon the Mount in national and international affairs and, be it said to the honor of the Brotherhood, that most all, if not all of these statesmen are Brotherhood men. "If the air force is to be governed by the Sermon upon the Mount, God help us," said Mr. White of the English Aerial Service. Although he spoke derisively, he propounded a great truth. For if our national and international dealings, if as nation to nation and as man to man our dealings with one another were governed by the spirit and principles of the Sermon on the Mount, we should be a much more happy world than wnat we are today. And we are convinced that until we do begin to listen to the pleadings of that magnificent sermon-wars, famines and miseries shall ever dog our pathway through this life and probably through the life beyond the grave.




