He is a wealthy man. The Conservatives, however, were a small factor in the contest. Mr. Parnell, being determined to rule his

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party, no matter how much his confessed isconduct with Mrs. O'Shea may have injured him, has endeavored to make the contest a personal one. He has tried to make the Irish people believe the tries to the tries tries tries to the tries tries tries to the tries believe that the reasons for the opposition to his leadership are to be found in jealousy and self-seeking upon the part of the large majority of his following, and hatred of the Irish people by Eng-lishmen and Scotchmen. It is unfortunate that at this critical juncture in the agitation for giving to Ireland a greater share in her own government, the man who has been a leader in the movement should first fall by the way and the strive to regain his lost position by stirring up bad blood between the two peoples. Every unprejudiced person must under-stand that Parnell has himself alone to blame for his humiliation and downfall, which has been rendered all the more marked because of his determination to brazen it out, despite the almost universal demand of public opinion that he should, at least for a time, retire from the Irish leadership, and atone in some measure for his shortcomings. during the year, 342 remained on 30th June last, 2 escapes and I death occurred, while the increase for the year over last was 20. Dorchester, N. B., Penitentiary shows an increase of 12, there being 174 prisoners a

the close of the fiscal year and60 discharged during the year, 1 death and 1 escape. The Manitoba Penitentiary is the most extravagantly conducted penal institution in the Dominion. Money must be shame-fully wasted at this institution, as can be seen at a glance from the comparative statement of the charges for maintenance there and elsewhere. It took \$736 to main tain a daily average of 69 prisoners during the year, while at Kingston only \$243 was pent daily for 557 convicts. The net cost per diem in Kingston is 65 cents; St. Vincent de Paul, 66 cents; Dorchester, N. B., 61 cents; British Columbia, N. B., 61 cents; British Columbia, \$1 29, and Manitoba, \$1 35. British Columbia Penitentiary is the only one which shows a decrease, there being 15 prisoners less during the year as com-pared with the previous year. There were also no deaths, no escapes, no new cases of insanity. Altogether there was an increase of 56 convicts during the year, the figures being 1,195 for 1889 and 1,251 for 1890. In the course of the year the pena 1890. In the course of the year the penal prison at Kington for the isolation of evil-disposed and habitual criminals will be completed. It is a new experiment and it is expected that the 108 cells of this special prison will accommodate the bad and untractable characters under sentence, not only at Kingston, but at other institutions, whom it may be deemed necessary to isolate.

Grau, the manager, was running things,
and his resignation has been accepted. The
association has been conducted too extravagantly for the amount (\$4 a week per person) charged for meals. Mr. Grau now
says the project will be a failure and will go
under before many weeks. It is claimed
that \$7 a week for each person should be
charged.

charged.

The plan which has been in operation until this time is about as follows: The bills of fare are sent around 24 hours in advance of the meal ordered, and the order-blank is of the meal ordered, and the order-blank is sent back at once. The meal prepared is then placed into a contrivance which is kept warm by hot water and is sub-divided into compartments for the various edibles. These are distributed by a wagon at the residences of the subscribers. Bread is furnished each morning freshly baked and milk, cream and fruit are delivered daily. Each week the lady of the house makes a requisition for butter, coffee, tea, cocca, sugar, pepper and salt, which are prepared at home. The ladies are still enthusiastic, and they say they will not allow the scheme to fall through.




