TOILERS' TROUBLES

Some of the C. P. R. Employes Start a Strike.

Powderly Denounces the Reading Railway Deal-"Middlemen Are Leeches."

A British Miners' Federation Decide That Work Shall Be Besumed on Monday.

(Special to the ADVERTISER.)
WINNIEG, Man. 17.—The agitation among the conductors and brakemen on the Western division of the Canadian Pacific Railway culminated in a strike last night at 12 o'clock. At that hour nearly all the conductors and brakemen who had not already been dismissed, and most of the switchmen and yardmen employed on that division, quit work. It is understood that this action was taken against the vigorous protest of a large majority of the men themselves, and in response to the command of the representatives of the Brotherhoods in the United States who have been here for the past few days. According to [Special to the ADVERTISER.] hoods in the United States who have been here for the past few days. According to the statement published by the company during the busy months last year freight conductors appear to have earned from \$90 to \$180 per month each, and freight brakemen from \$60 to \$130 each, while during the two or three dullest months of the year, freight conductors earned from \$65 to \$105 a month and freight brakemen from \$55 to \$85. To the uninitiated it would seem that the company should find little difficulty in obtaining all the men they require at these wages. The passenger trains are all running, but no doubt the strike will impede freight traffic for a few days.

AT OTTAWA.

OTTAWA, March 117.—Superintendents Spencer, Durie and Singleton, of the C. P. R. are here to-day. They waited on the train hands in this division to ascertain their attitude in the event of the extension of the strike to the eastern division. Seventeen non-union hands were dispatched from here last night to Winnipeg to replace strikers there.

THE HESLOP MURDER.

Chief McKinnon Gives His Testimony.

Goosey's Sister Creates a Sensation-Detective Greer Examined—Close of the Evidence for the Crown

HAMILTON, Ont., March 17.—The Heslop trial was resumed at 9:30 this morning. Thomas Young and Francis Marshall were called for the Crown, but were absent. Hugh McKinnon, chief of police, gave his evidence.

The chief accompanied Detective Green The chief accompanied Detective Greer when Goosey was taken to jail and placed in the corridor, where Lottridge was. 

It is hardly within the bounds of any probable action on the part of grand lodges that the desired authority would be delegated to a general council, but supposing this were done we have little faith that the burning questions of the time could be satisfactorily passed have little faith that the burning questions of the time could be satisfactorily passed upon by so heterogeneous an assembly. A congress to talk over important matters related to the interests of Freemasonry would do no harm—might possibly lead to good results; but a congress or "council" to legislate for the craft, and perhaps restrict the independence of grand lodges, does not seem to be required by any oxigency that now exists.—[Freemason's Repository.

Ewes that are nursing lambs require to
be well fed, in order that they may have an
abundance of milk for their lambs. Good
wheat bran mixed with warm water, ground
oats or boiled whole oats are all good feed
for milk. In every sheep-house a place
should be made where the lambs can come
by themselves and eat feed, such as wheat
bran wet, and not be disturbed by the ewes
—a small hole through the partition into a -a small hole through the partition into a different room; the lambs will soon learn to occupy it when they want a play spell and to eat a little food, and in this way they will

different room; the lambs will soon learn to occupy it when they want a play spell and to eat a little food, and in this way they will grow rapidly.

When the ewes and lambs are turned out to pasture in the spring and begin to get a bite of young grass, then they will begin to refuse hay. Give them hay just as long as they will eat it. As they gradually leave off eating hay, increase your foed of grain a little until they begin to get a little feed of grass, and then decrease your feed of grain gradually as the grass comes up to a full feed. In this way both sheep and lambs will keep right along grewing both in wool and mutton. Remember, you can stunt the growth of the wool on your old sheep as well as the growth of body and wool on your lambs.

Sheep will live on almost any kind of pasture, yet the best kind of grass, in order that they may do well, is an untritious, grassy pasture, growing on a dry, firm soil, with a good deal of white clover.

Sheep should not be shorn until the old wool is raised from the body of the sheep and the weather is warm. In shearing, the new wool should not be cut; shear between the growth of the new and old wool. It is a great mistake to shear sheep close to the skin, as many do. In doing so you lessen the weight of the coming fleece every year. Sheep well cared for the year round, and not too close-sheared to the skin, their fleece would weigh, when washed clean, from eight to twelve pounds, according to age and breed. Sheep have a very soft and tender skin, and when sheared close to the hide and exposed to the heat of a burning sun, their skin gets sunburnt and destroys the growth of the wool. Or if the weather should be wet and cold after shearing and the sheep get chilled, this, too, will shorten the wool crop, and in both cases the ewes should be wet and cold after shearing and the sheep get chilled, this, too, will shorten the wool crop, and in both cases the ewes that have lambs will dry up largely in their milk, and the lambs will get a set-back that will be seen and felt when sold to the butcher. Sheep, when newly shorn, should have a shade to protect them from a burning sun, and also a place of shelter to protect them from cold, driving rains.

No lambs will grow well if infested with ticks. They hinder the growth of the wool both on lamb and sheep. Now, what is the remedy? Feeding the sheep sulphur coca-

sionally mixed with salt will injure the ticks somewhat, but the hest of all remedies I ever used is Cooper's sheep-dipping powder. It makes a clean sweep of all the ticks, cleans the skin and promotes the growth of the wool. I believe it is manufactured in England and sold by R. Francklyn & Co., No. 5 South William street, New York. Its eost is small, not over 3 cents per sheep, sold in no less than ten-pound packages.

In large flocks lambs should be wesned from four to five months old, and at that time should be made to weigh at the least 100 pounds live weight. After the first four weeks of a lamb's age, until it is 4 or 5 months old, it should gain in weight at least three-fourths of a pound daily on an average. Those lambs that are kept for store sheep should have a nice, sweet, fresh piece of grass in readiness for them on being parted from their dams. Their feed should be good until the setting in of winter. Lambs of any kind should be kept growing from the day of their birth until they get their full growth. This is the great secret of raising sheep to make them profitable. As soon a the cold heavy rains begin to fall in autumn lambs should be housed nights, and as wither approaches they should be fed and sheetered from the cold. The ewes, on weaning their lambs, should be put on dry, short pastures until their milk dries off, and then on feed which rapidly increases their flesh so as to be in good order when winter begins. To let ewes become thin before whiter renders it difficult and far more expensive to winter them safely and well. If they are not in a good thriving condition when pu

renders it difficult and far more expensive to winter them safely and well. If they are not in a good thriving condition when pu with the ram they will very seldom have twins, and their product of wool will be greatly diminished in quality as well quantity. To make sheep husbandry profitable they must be well fed and bred and cared for, so the wool and all lambs over and above one lamb per head for each ewe will pay for the entire expense of keeping and care, and the product of one lamb per head should be clear gain. best of the flock. Let them be the offspring
of strong and rugged rams and ewes. Rams
should be in good, fair order before they are
put with the ewes. They should never be
tied to crowbars or sving-poles, but should
have a lot properly fenced where they can
be kept in good feed until they are needed
for service. When you wish to part with
your old ewes on account of age, wean the
lambs, and as soon as the ewes are dry of
their milk, shut them into a lot by themlambs, and as soon as the ewes are dry of their milk, shut them into a lot by them selves where there is good full feed. Feed a pound of ground grain once a day to each sheep. Oats and corn make a good mixture to put on fat. If your grass feed gets short, increase the grain, and before winter sets in your sheep are ready for the butcher. Turnips will answer in the place of grain if fed enough of them.

OTTAWA, March 7.—The papers relative to the recent mission to Washington were laid on the table of the House yesterday. Of the four matters about which something was really done, reciprocity in wrecking, the Alaska boundary, the Bay of Fundy and State of Maine boundary, and the protection of fish life by close seasons and other means, none are of prime importance save the reciprocity in wrecking. The Canadian proposal to secure the admission of Canadian fish into the United States in return for such privileges free as are now granted for a license fee to American fishermen under the modus vivendi does not appear to have been entertained by Mr. Blaine. If the question of reciprocity in trade was discussed it was purely in the shape of an informal conversation, and must have been nipped in the bud by Mr. Blaine. The following purports to be the substance of the propositions made by the Canadian delegates: Canadian delegates

THE ALASKA BOUNDARY. It is proposed that a reference to some impartial authority be made by Great Britain and the United States for the purity and deciding funding Sritain and the United States for the purpose of ascertaining and deciding finally the true boundary, regard being had to former treaties on the subject. Also that a commission of four experts be appointed to sport to the Governments of Great Britain and the United States as to the best mode of delimiting the boundary as established by the award to be made under the foregoing article. PROTECTION OF FISH.

It is proposed that a commission of two experts be appointed, one by the Government of Great Britain and one by the Government of the United States, to consider and report as to the restrictions and regulations which should be adopted on the following subjects:

THE ATLANTIC FISHERIES.

It is proposed that in the United States and Canada all duties shall be removed from fish of all kinds (except fish preserved in oil), and from fish oil, whale oil, seal oil and other products of fish being the produce of fisheries carried on by fishermen of the United States and Canada, as well as from United States and Canada, as well as from the casks, barrels, kegs, cans and other usual and necessary coverings containing all or any of the products above named, and that while the aforesaid articles are allowed to be brought into the United States without duty by British subjects, the privilege of entering the ports, bays and harbors of the coast of Canada shall be ac-corded to United States fishing vessels by small annual licenses free of charge for the following purposes, namely:

ollowing purposes, namely: 1. The purchase of provisions, bait, etc., eines, lines and all other supplies and out-

1. The purchase of provisions, act, etc., seines, lines and all other supplies and outfits.

2. Transhipment of catch for transport by any means of conveyance.

Wasting the Grain Feed. At the Ottawa Experiment Station under the direction of Professor Robertson, an interesting feeding experiment was under-aken in feeding cows. The experiment was

taken in feeding cows. The experiment was in the feeding of three groups of light weight milch cows. The report says: With one lot of cows we commenced an experiment on a ration of corn ensilage and meal. The following is the ration:

Pounds.

Total..... Of that mixture each cow consumed on Of that mixture each cow consumed on an average a fraction over 92 pounds per day. The cost per day was 19.37 cents per cow. After a month's feeding of that ration we increased the ensilage to 90 pounds with the same quantity of meal. The ration as then arranged stood:

otton seed meal..... Total..... Of that mixture each cow consumed an average of 95 pounds per day. The cost per day was 15.77 cents per cow, or nearly 4 cents per cow less than in the former case. The reduction in the cost by increasing the proportion of bulky feed did not interfere in any way with the yield of milk. We have made a similar reduction in several cases, for the purpose, mainly, of illustrating that when farmers use an excess of meal in feeding milking cows, they do not get any extra milk or value in any other way. There is no appreciable gain in the weight of the animals consequent upon the heavier feeding of meal. I do not find many cows that can use to advantage more than 7 or 8 Of that mixture each cow consumed as that can use to advantage more than 7 or 8 pounds of meal per day. At the same time I have had letters from many farmers in I have had letters from many farmers in different parts of Canada informing me that they are feeding from 14 to 17 pounds of meal per animal per day, and asking for an expression of opinion as to why their cattle did not thrive under such treatment.

In the case of three other cows we commenced on a ration as follows:



"SUCCESS CROWNS THE IN FAMY."

The Toronto Telegram, an independent Conservative journal, continues its exposure and denunciation of the tactics by means of which the great London fraud was carried out. Its latest utterances are worthy of reproduction, and the ADVER-TISER prints them with the double object of giving Londoners an opportunity to read what outside independent authorities think of the infamy which has brought the city so much unenviable notoriety in recent weeks and of briefly commenting upon one contention. Our contemporary says:

"Now that they have withdrawn their deposit and abandoned the thin pretense of appealing to the Supreme Court, the managers of the Conservative party in London reveal themselves to the country in their true colors. What they wanted was not a fair judgment upon the merits of the case, but a chance to stuff the voters' list with names which their own revising officer dare not violate his conscience by keeping on the rolls.
"Judge Elliot played their game. Eight

judges in two courts unanimously held that the notices of objection were good. One county judge holds that they were bad, and the scandal of it is that under the Franchise Act his will is superior to the

"No blacker crime, no fouler outrage stains the Parliamentary annals of the race than that which installs Hon. John Carling in a seat that belongs to another man. Had King Charles been protected by an outfit of Judge Elliots and Revising Officer Frasers he would have kept Pym, Hampden, Hollis and Cromwell out of the Long Parliament. Tyranny never dared attempt the crime which a representative Government has in London, in the darkest rs, and it is sad to see the right to a fair election frittered away in a miserable parti-

san squabble.
"Canadians in their capacity as partisans wink at too much. Some things they cannot afford to wink at. When a judge invades the sacred right of free electors, every Canadian loses more as a citizen than he

can gain as a partisan.
"Were the boot on the other foot Grit

It is a duty not to be shirked because it is painful. It is diagraceful that an offense like that of London should be attempted. It is infamous that it should succeed, and the Government that puts its great strength to such poor use might be warned by the history that proves that no Anglo-Saxon Gov-ernment has ever yet been strong enough to disgrace itself by defiant wrong-doing."

AMOUNT OF FOOD REQUIRED. Advance proofs of the forthcoming Canadian Health Journal devote attention to food requirements of the human body, and fancy cookery. A large number of experienced medical practitioners have given it as their opinion that over eating, directly and indirectly, gives rise to more disease than any other one cause. It is the quantity of the food eaten and not so much the quality that gives the trouble. Everybody has heard or read Abernethy's saying that, on an average, one third of what people eat nourishes them and the other two thirds they "eat at their peril." As proof that over eating causes disease, it is found that abstinence—a certain degree of fasting stone, often in a short time restores the diseased to health; that almost all persons of advanced age were throughout their life, or most of it, abstemious, usually very, in regard to the amount of food con-sumed; and that many who at middle age had suffered from disease more or less serious, on adopting a rigidly strict and abstemious dietary, improved and lived afterward in good health to very advanced life. Furthermore, theoretically it is plain that in the efforts of the excretory organsefforts often vain to throw off from the body the excess of food eaten, these organs must be unnaturally overtaxed, and eventually prematurely injured or destroyed. Certain it is that disturbances and symptoms of all sorts and conditions follow the

habit of over-eating.

Modern fancy cookery with its vast array nd variety of highly palatable viands does incalculable harm by tempting, irresistably, to harmful excess in cating. The cookery is altogether in advance of the present degree of human self-control. Doubtless a great deal of true legitimate pleasure may be derived from eating what may be regarded as fancy dishes, dishes rendered highly palatable by the art of cookery, when not of too "rich" or compound a nature, as well as from simply good, well cooked, plain dishes. But as everyon cannot enjoy the "wine when it is red," in moderation, or without drunkenness, so it is not everyone who can enjoy the highly palatable fancy dishes in moderation, or without gluttony-who can resist the temtation to continue to gratify the palate or sense of taste when sufficient for the need of the body has been eaten. "One may have a sufficiency without having enough the needs may be satisfied but not the

given to freely indulge the sense of taste.

Civilization immensely increases our leasures, while it also increases our pains; ut it would increase our pains less, it need hardly be written, were we to exer cise a greater degree of self-control in the enjoyment of the pleasures, our indulgence in which is absolutely certain to be fol lowed by the penalty-pain. especially the case with regard to the sense of taste and food; eating a supply

of food being the one great essential of How is one to know when one has eaten only sufficient for the needs of the body— only a safe quantity? If we never had been accustomed to eat any but plain natural food and she sense of taste had been used only as a guide to its quality, and not as a sense or source of high gratification and pleasure, the natural desire would instinctively be safe to rely upon. School Library.—Can the teacher of a public school get up a library for such school by soliciting subscriptions from the pupils to purchase books, and if not how can he be prosecuted? Ans.—A school library can only be legally established and maintained by the trustees. The trustees should prevent the teacher from interfering with their legal powers, and if necessary they might dismiss him, as the School Act expressly provides that no teacher shall in any way promote the sale of any school, library, prize or text books, etc., apart from the fact that the teacher in establishing a library would necessarily be neglecting his duties, which would justify the trustees in removing him.
