London, Nov. 24. - The Atlantic Transportation Company's steamship Massachusetts, which left New York on Nov. 12, for London, carrying as a cargo the greater part of Baruum & Bailey's menagerie, arrived off Gravesend today. Except on the first three days she had a smooth passage. A dispatch from Gravesend says that the giraffe died of a broken neck on the night of the 14th. Four horses also succumbed.

> THE G. O. M. IN LONDON. London, Nov. 24.-Mr. Gladstone ar rived in London from Hawarden yes-terday afternoon. The ex-premier is looking much better than was expected, and in spite of the disagreeable weather and the prevalence of a thick fog, a large crowd was assembled at the station to welcome him, and greeted him with hearty cheers. Mr. Gladstone will start for Cannes on Friday. In the meantime he will consult physicians in regard to the continuous facial neuralgia from which he suffers.

AN ALL-IMPORTANT CONFER-ENCE. London, Nov. 24.—There is widespread interest in the conference between the representatives of the employers and the delegates of the striking engineers, which commenced this morning behind closed doors, after many weeks of negotiations. The discussions are expected to be prolonged. The employers discussed the freedom of the management of their works without the interference of trades unions, and submitted resolution on the subject embodying their views. The engineers submitted amendments to this resolution, and no agreement had been reached when the conference adjourned.

London, Nov. 24.—The inhabitants of London, as a result of the outcry which followed the great fire of Friday last, are much agitated in regard to the alleged inefficiency of the fire brigade. At a meeting of the London County Council the chairman of the fire brigade committee defended the organization of the London fire department, claiming it is ahead of that of New York, Montreal and other cities, adding that every appliance used by the New York fire department is employed by the London firs brigade. He believed the London fire brigade had better engines and other appliances than were in use elsewhere In spite of this, most damaging testimony has been furnished by a member of the firemen of Herring & Co., who have written a letter to the Times saying that the engines employed in extinguishing the flames at the great conflagration of Friday last were short of coal and water. 

John Ratza's Trial Results in a Verdict of Manslaughter.

Pembroke, Ont., Nov. 24. - John Ratza was brought up for trial this morning for the murder of Antoine Kurze at Barrie, Renfrew county, on Monday, April 19 last. Kurze and Ratza quarreled ten years ago, but to all appearances were friends. While at Drohan's hotel, on the night of April 19, the conversation drifted to the old quarrel. Both got angry, and agreed to settle the matter by fighting. They went outside, but friends interfered, and peace was restored for the time. They went back to the hotel, when Kurze struck Ratza a blow in the face with his fist. Ratza then went out, but returned shortly, and taking a poker from the wood-box struck Kurze a blow on the back of the head, fracturing his skull. Kurze dropped to the floor unconscious. He was taken to the general hospital, but he never regained consciousness, and died on the following Saturday.

Ratza was arrested and charged with murder. The grand jury found a true bill and the trial proceeded. The defense said the blow was delivered in self-defense. Ratza was found guilty of manslaugrter and sentenced to three years in Kingston penitentiary.

Canadian route was 36 cents, against 53 cents by the American route. This was a striking difference. 

Turkey-Bone Soup-Take the and scraps left from roast turkey, or and scraps left from game. Lay aside any nice pieces, no matter how small. Remove all the stuffing and keep that by itself. Break the bones and pack them closely in a kettle. Cover with cold water. Add one small onion, sliced; the o'ter stalks and leaves of a head of celery; one teaspoonful of salt and a saltspoonful of pepper. Simmer two or three hours. until the bones are clean. Strain, and remove the fat. Put the liquor on to boil again, and for every quart of liquor allow three saltspoons of salt and one saltspoon of pepper. Add one cup of cold meat cut into small pieces and half a cup of the stuffing. Or omit the stuffing and thicken the soup with flour. Simmer until the meat is tender, and serve at once. This is much better than to boil the meat, bones and stuffing together. In that case, the stuffing absorbs the oil and

gives a very strong flavor to the soup. Tomatoes (a pint) to a quart .f stock make another pleasing variety. The bones of a twelve-pound turkey one of Jack Glasscock's chloride of should furnish stock for three dinners.

Add also to the milk the beaten yolks of two eggs, one teaspoonful salt and one-half teaspoonful pepper. Put a layer of fish in a baking dish, then a layer of sauce, and so continue until all is used, having sauce on top. Sprinkle over the top with bread crumbs and put in the oven to brown. Serve in baking dish.
