SHRAPNEL HITS **LONDON SOLDIER** WITH THE 'PATS'

Private John Cooper Injured in Repulsing Attack On Kaiser's Birthday.

HIS ARM IS SHATTERED

Two Western Canada Men Win Cheers of British Officers.

CAPTURED 12 GERMANS

After Successful Sniping, They Gather In Their Human Trophies.

Northern France, Jan. 30, -By courier to London.-The Princess Patricias helped in the birthday present to the Kaiser in the heavy German losses, for there was stiff fighting on that day, and the Germans got within 40 yards of the Canadian trenches-but not further. A terrific volley and machine gun fire stopped them.

More wounded who came down today tell me of the details of recent fights.

Private John Cooper, of London, Ont., who is in hospital with a shrapnel-shattered arm; Private Lees, of Calgary, shot through the hand, and Private Cowie, also from Alberta, are men who have been injured in the latest fighting.

TWO OFFICERS KILLED.

They are all doing well, but there are two officers and about half a dozen men who have been killed since I sent the last estimate of

losses. Lees and Cowie are two of the best snipers in the regiment, and have been located in a ruined farmhouse ahead of the main trenches. They helped to celebrate the Kaiser's birthday by capturing twelve Germans who ventured too far forward through frozen mud.

TWO CAPTURE TWELVE.

They killed or sniped off a detachment without their location being found out, and when a rather nervous remnant reached the burned cottage, out dashed two Westerners and demanded surrender, and the trenches saw the amazing sight of two bringing in twelve prisoners. They were complimented by the British offi-

LIEUT. PRICE GIVES LIFE. Lieut. Charles Price is

one of the officers killed, He had taken one company into the trenches for relief and was returning for another when a sniper, who had gained a clump of trees near the trench, shot him. He died before reaching the field hospital.

I am unable to trace who the other officer was, but the men are positive he was a lieutenant.

"WE ARE ALL HAPPY." Sergt.-Major Smith has a badly shattered arm, which he got in directing his company's fire when the Germans were within 40 yards of the trenches, and there are several cases of sickness which have been sent down to the base hospital. Austrian Government, Too, Takes Over Grain Supply

VENICE, via London, Jan. 29.-7:30 p.m.-The Austrian Government has decided to organize a grain monopoly on similar lines to that established by Germany. The Austrian minister of agriculture today announced that the army has procured supplies of grain sufficient to last until the end of August.

Owing to the quantities of barley and maize now being taken for breadstuffs, according to advices from Vienna, there is a serious shortage in the supply of fodder.

DROP IN U. S. STEEL FEATURE OF THE WEEK

C. P. R. Stock Declined Almost Eight Points During the Same Time.

[Canadian Press.]

New York, Jan. 30-(Weekly Market Summary) .- Passing of the dividend on the common stock of the United States Steel Corporation was the unexpected and unsettling feature of the week. The shares fell over eleven points as a result, the authorities of the exchange being impelled to reduce the minimum from 48 to 40, with enormous sales between those features.

Other prominent stocks suffered in lesser degree, losses of three to six points being quite general. Canadian Pacific declined more than any other high-priced railway issue, its loss of almost eight points from last Saturday being ascribed mainly to very unfavorable earnings. Much of the selling of Canadian Pacific and other internationals came from abroad, liquidation from that source being made easier by the removal here of the ban against future deliveries of securities.

Aside from the steel dividend suspension, conditions in that trade pointed toward improvement. Coppers also showed a better tone on the successively higher orices quoted for the metal, but general trade advices were more than usually conflicting. Bank clearings indicated some hesita. ion in the markets for general merchandise, but cash was in greater supply at all reserve centres.


