


Form London Cigarmaker Died in the West.

In Detroit, they have a reducer, operated by a aprivate company, but the results have not been satisfactory. They are now unanimous in advocating incinerators, and the council will this year spend \$200,000 in installing incinera-

City Clerk Baker has prepared some nteresting vital statistics which show that London is not doing much in the natter of births and marriages, alhough in the matter of deaths ecord is an enviable one. Figures for eighteen cities in the province are aken, and the results for 1910 sub-

Port Arthur is the banner city from the standpoint of births. In 1910 there were 109.7 births for every 1,000 of population, more than double the next in line, Niagara Falls, where 44 births per thousand population were record ed. London is away down the line, in fourteenth position, with 21.9 births per thousand. Kingston, Belleville, Woodstock and Chatham follow in order.

If there is any liking in the heart for s, why not let it appear, instead of saying what rasps and irritates? There wouldn't be half so many family jars if the members would cultivate tact, instead of permitting themselves that trutal frankness that would be tolerated nowhere save in the home. Possibly what is said is not really meant to hurt; it merely sounds ugly. But one is obliged to remember "Out of the ullness of the heart the mouth speaketh."

There are many good people in the world who have a fatal facility in the way of saying things other people would infinitely prefer should remain unsaid. They blurt out something we didn't want mentioned. They remind us f statements we have made and now wish to repudiate. They make indisreet admissions, and supply unnecessary facts. There isn't a pennyworth of tact in their whole make-up; they haven't even the grace to keep silent when speech is dangerous. And, though they may be really good-hearted and well-intentioned, they are feared rather than liked, because, as a victim Dice expressed herself, "I never know what she's going to say, only I'm sure t'll be something I wish she wouldn't."

Probably one of a woman's greatest trials is to have to endure the pres ence of the untactful relative, as mother, or sister, who in addition to being untactful has a spiteful and envious temperament. It seems sometimes as if such a p rson deliberately undertakes to mortify and humiliate her by social gaucheries, or public discussion of family affairs. There are women of that kind-women who through jealousy and littleness of spirit take that way to vex and annoy those to whom they are beholden for a home. Toronto, April 4. — That organic church union so far as the Presbyterian Church is concerned, is not feasible at present, is the opinion of the special committee appointed to the General Assembly.







TO NOT DRAIN LAND

Bigger Crops Are Insured If Seasons Are Very Dry,

Guelph, April 5 .- During the excepionally dry season of 1911 land that was underdrained produced on the average about \$16 50 more per acre than land that was not drained, according to data collected by the department of physics at the Ontario Agri-

cultural College. Reports were received from a large number of farmers, of whom 25 were able to give definite figures on yields on drained and undrained land. Three of the number said they saw no difference, but all the others reported increases. Eleven counties were represented in the reports, from Durham, in the East, to Essex in the West. The value of increases, including straw, was figured at October, 1911, prices, and March, 1912, prices. The former showed an average of \$1597 per acre, and average of \$16 50. The three who reported no increase were counted in obtaining the averages.

In wet seasons the results are even more marked, but even at \$16 50 per acre, drains more than pay for themselves in two years.

The O. A. C. is again renewing its offer of assistance to farmers in lay ing out their drainage systems. The department of physics has a special staff of drainage advisers for this work. There is no charge for the services of these men, the only outlay to the farmer being the travelling expenses, which are low. 
