Trotzky Not Returning to Brest as Reported, According to Petrograd.

London, Jan. 29 .- The Boisheviki have split on the question of peace, a majority being against the conclusion of peace on the German terms and in favor of a holy war, an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Petrograd says. As the present Government is unable to carry on war, the formation of a coalition of all Socialist factions was proposed.

WOULD CONSULT AUSTRIANS. Petrograd, Friday, Jan. 25 .- M. Joffe rest-Litovsk, has sent a request mission to go to Vienna to confer with representatives of the Austrian people regarding peace. In a telegram to the Smoiny Institute today, M. Joffe said that his action was prompted by a general belief that the Austrian people were most anxious for peace, regardless of the views of their Government.

The Petrograd newspapers emphasize the importance of disorders in Vienna and Cracow, and claim to have information that the unrest is spreading throughout Austria-Hungary.

The Vechernia declares that Austria-Hungary already has offered to make a separate peace with Russia, regardless of the action of Germany.

WHO SHOULD BUY STOCK IN INDUSTRIALS.

It is quite common among men of means to argue to themselves that their money should only seek investment or be invested in organizations of capital which they or their clique of financial friends can control, and the absence of their names among the subscribers makes it a difficult matter for the organizer to secure the needed money from others of smaller means who would otherwise invest-to become even interested to the point of investigation.

Is this right? Does such an attitude toward anything new in the way of industrial enterprise become the public-spirited man? Is he doing his part toward the building of an industrial city? Should he not at least take sufficent interest, when he knows the business proposed, to look into the project and satisfy himself first, whether the industry proposed is needed; whether, in his own judgment, there is a demand for the product; whether the city and its conditions affecting the prospects of success for such a business are favorable or unfavorable; whether the killed labor for it is easily obtainable at a reasonable wage; whether the company is over-capitalized and projected out of proportion to wage; whether the company is over-capitalized and projected out of proportion to the business that might reasonably be expected to come to it, and lastly, and most important of all, whether the prospective management is experienced and capable of handling successfully the piant proposed? We all know that every added industry means increased population, that these must have homes, and homes increase consumption of commodities; that added pay rolls are also as a proposed distribution of money weekly, and the spending of this money weekly. mean increased distribution of money weekly, and the spending of this money for necessities of life, in food and raiment, education and recreation, increases the merchants' turnover, makes its contribution to the city taxes, makes possible better schools and places of amusement, to say nothing of its quota to religious institutions, in a word, adds to the value of real estate and makes or a better city.

OTTO KAHN ON GERMANY.

Most Powerful of German-American Bankers Hated and Loathed Prussian Spirit.
Otto H. Kahn, of the banking house of Kuhn, Loeb & Co., addressing the Harrison Chamber of Commerce recently, denounced in no weak terms the German governing party. Mr. Kahn said that he had watched the spirit of the Prussian governing class, using every agency for moulding the public mind. He had watched it proceed with relentless persistency and profound cunning to instil into the nation the demoniacal obsession of power-worship and worlddominion, to modify and pervert the mentality, even the very fibre and moral

substance of the German people.
"I have hated and loathed that spirit," continued Mr. Kahn, "and hated it all the more as I saw it ruthlessly pulling down a thing which was dear to me -the old Germany to which I was linked by ties of blood, by fond memories and cherished sentiments.
"From each of my visits to Germany for twenty-five years, I came away

more appalled by the sinister transmutation Pruss'anism had wrought amongst the people and by the portentous menace I recognized in it for the entire

"And when this war broke out in Europe, I knew that the issue had been joined between the powers of brutal might and insensate ambition on the one side and the forces of humanity and liberty on the other, between darkness and Mr. Kahn then makes a strong plea to foreign-born Americans, concluding

with "He who, secretly or overtly, tries to thwart the declared will and aims of the American nation in this holy war, is a traitor and a traitor's fate should be his."



For Pimento Salad.

Dear Miss Grey,—Please publish in your Cook-Book Column pimento salad and dressing, also what accompanies it; also recipe for one or two fruit cocktails, or more if space permits. J. A. K. Ans.—Pimento Salad—Dissolve half a box of gelatine in one-half cup vinegar; and one-half cup sugar, junce of one lemon, scant teaspoon salt, one cup boiling water. Mix with six canned pimentos, two cups of chopped celery, one cup shelled pecans. Mold into individual molds, serve on shredded lettuce with mayonnaise. This is enough for twelve guests.

Mayonnaise Dressing—Yolk of one egg, one cup olive oil (or some use melted butter), half teaspoon salt, pinch caycane, pinch of mustard, two tablespoons vinegar. Use a soup plate and silver fork to mix; have everything very cold. Beat egg yoke, adding seasoning, add oil, very slowly at first, and beat continually as it thickens add a little of the vinegar, beat, then more oil, and proceed until all issued. If dressing curdies, slowly add another egg yolk, beating constantly.

Fruit Cup or Cocktail—Two bananas. 2 oranges, ½ pineapple, 1 grape-fruit, ½ pound large white grapes, wannet meats; dice oranges, grapetiruit and pineapple, slice bananas, and cut grapes in half, removing seeds. Mix well in large bowl, add sugar to sweeten very cold in gaasses, garmishing the top with nut meats and candied cherry.




