EXPERT ESTIMATE OF WHEAT CROP

Will Total 183,000,000 Bushels and Be Worth 165 Millions.

Winnipeg, Aug. 11.-The Winnipeg 'ommercial has the following on the crop situation: "After studying the different conditions in the numerous localities we have come to the conclu sion that the total wheat output of the west this season will be about 183,-000,000 bushels. This result is arrived at by reckoning on a general the three provinces. This average is considerably better than it has been

s the three provinces. This average is considerably better than it has been for several years, and when the extensiveness of the territory concerned is considered, it is a magnificent average. We have figured that the acreage under wheat is 17½ per cent higher than last year, and from the circumstances attending the preparation of the soil for this season's crop, there are likely very few who will disagree with the estimate."

Crop Area Expanded.

In a previous issue the Commercial referred to the fact that there has been but little criticism of the estimate of 200,000,000 bushels that has been spoken of all season, seemingly to the satisfaction of nearly all parties interested. If the crops were nearly all uniform throughout the country, the amount of 200,000,000 bushels would without a doubt be realized. The territory under cultivation has expanded so enormously, however, that every year most likely some part or other will experience backwardness in comparison with the more fortunate localities. There are some districts that will ...ot fare as well as others this year, and the inclusion of stose in making up the general average is what leads us to predict a total of a few millions less than the round number of 200,000,000.

1. Select one that "fits" the food intended to be cooked. 2. Grease slightly the inside of the bag, except in the case of vegetables, or when water is to be added.

3. When the food has been prepared for the bag, place the same on the table, and lift the uppermost edge of the bag while you insert the contents.

4. Fold the mouth of the bag two or three times and fasten with a clip, or pins, or in any other way that will secure as nearly as possible a hermetical closing.

Should it ever happen that a bag leaks, simply transfer it with contents undisturbed to another bag.

5. The oven, any kind of which will do, should be kept clean, and if properly heated, as with the old style of cooking, results should satisfactorily follow. Average oven heat should be about 200 degrees, Fahr., and when the bag is put into the oven this heat should be reduced by about 30 degrees. In the case of ovens with solid shelves, a wire grid should be placed on the shelf with a space between and the bag with contents on the grid. Experience will soon teach the cook when the oven is hot enough without the use of a

6. The oven door will not require to be opened every now and then "to see how the roast is doing." The whole force of the heat is playing upon the bag and from within

7. Exercise care in taking the bag out of the oven, and if gas is used the bag should be kept out of danger of contact with the flame.


