

Do Away With Government Credits, Is Advice of Lloyd Harris.

Ottawa, July 8 .- Canadian banks and inancial interests should now under take to finance those European countries which have heavy reconstruction problems, and the Canadian public should give whole-hearted support to this new enterprise. This is the message of Lloyd Harris, chairman of the Canadian mission in London, on his departure for England at the close of his six weeks' visit.

Trade With Europe.

"I have had a strenuous time," he said in an interview, "during which I have been more and more convinced that our public requires educating in the tremendous powers of trade with Europe. I am not in favor of granting further Government credits, as think our banking and financial interests with Government co-operation, could do the work more effectively and efficiently. These have the machinery and need only employ it. I believe a central organization can be formed, which would make the necessary advances. They would take in return the securities from foreign governments, and in this way the public could participate.

Would Help Exports.

"Such a method of procedure would have the direct effect of stimulating Canadian exports through the natural interest, which would be aroused there, and secondly, through interesting our producers in markets to which our banks had extended credits. Such a union of banking and financial interests is being formed on a huge scale in the United States. I consider a capital of \$390,000,000 if raised in this manner in Canada, would enable us to do trade up to perhaps five times this amount, if it was used as a kind of circulating credit. Prison, Fine and Confiscation For Those Who Speculate in

Foodstuffs and Ne cessities of Life. London, July 8 .- King Victor Emmanuel of Italy has issued a decree that profiteers will in future be fined 10,000 lire or sentenced to from three months to three years in prison, and will in addition suffer con-

fiscation of the goods, according to a Rome dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company. Unauthorized middlemen dealing in food will suffer similar punishment, it is said. The dispatch states that a general strike was declared in Naples of Monday. After looting outlying stores in that city a crowd attempted to reach the centre of the place, but was prevented by the police, who were occupying the principal thoroughfares. At Palermo the police have arrested 400 former convicts, who are alleged to be responsible for many

of the disorders on Sunday.

PRICE REDUCTION DECREED. Florence, Sunday, July 6 .- All the business houses of this city were

FRANCE LEADS WAY TO HELP PERSECUTED JEWS

Paris, July 7 .- A group of deputies belonging to various parties has written to Stephen Plohon, foreign minister, expressing emotion over reports of pogroms, massacres, boycots and persecution inflicted upon Jews in Eastern Europe.

The letter concludes by asking M. Plehon to officially make known the attitude of France in the peace conference in favor of the Jews.

In replying, M. Pichon assured the deputies that the French Government took the initiative on the beginning of the conference to insure a thorough examination of Lewish questions by a smit resposnible for what was done was not responsible for what was done with the plaintiff, but the question of damages was left for argument.

WILL HAVE CITIZENS APPEAL FOR THEM

Deputation Will See Minister of Justice in Effort To Let Vets Out For Peace Day.

Representation both by letter and by Mayor C. R. Somerville and a deputation personally will be made to the minister of justice at Ottawa for the release of the returned soldiers in the local jail who wish to celebrate on July 19 the peace for which they endured wounds and months of hardship.

J. Brigden, a returned soldier, who said that he did not belong to any soldiers' organization, addressed the city council on the matter on Monday evening, and was instrumental in bringing about this decision. He suggested that the city solicitor be asked to act on the matter. However, as the mayor and a deputation are going to Ottawa on other business, it was thought that they could bring action quicker.

In addressing the council, Mr. Brigden declared that the men were all serving for minor offences. As a result, he said, the city was almost brought to disgrace by the Toronto papers. The returned soldiers did not want to be Bolshevik, but they thought that something should be done for these men who had fought and won victories.
