## COMPROMISE MEASURES LIKELY ROOT TO BE ADVISED AS BEST MEANS ENDING BRITISH COAL STRIKE

Government Will Insist On Greater Production At Mines-Deadlock in Wales Likely To Be Broken in a Few Days -Further Curtailment of Shipping Services Is Feared.

London, Oct. 20.—The National Union of Railwaymen, the executive of the transport workers and the parliamentary committee of the Union of Railwaymen, the executive of the transport workers and the parliamentary committee of the Trades Union Congress all held meetings this morning to consider their attitude towards the coal strike, but thus far no decisions have been taken. The greatest importance attached to the National Union of Railwaymen's meeting, which was a full delegate conference with power to declare a sympathetic strike without referring the matter to the union members. After approximately two hours of discussion, James Henry Thomas, general secretary of Railwaymen's Union, said the whole situation had been reviewed and adjournment taken until Thursday. The executive of the transport workers and the Trades Union committee continued their meetings this afternoon.

A sharp difference of opinion prevails among the railroadmen, some of the delegates having come to the meeting with instructions from their branches to use every effort to secure a peadeful settlement, while meeting with instructions from their branches to use every effort to secure a peaceful settlement, while other delegates were armed with resolutions by their members demanding a sympathetic strike. Mr. Thomas personally desires peace, it is declared, but has a strong minority of the organization's executive working against him.

pendent Labor party passed a reso-lution today expressing grave up-prehension over the attitude of the Government towards the miners, "conveying as it does, an aggressive challenge to the whole working class movement."

The resolution requests the Labor party to convene a special conference.

Government officials and labor leaders, who outlined their positions before the opening session of Parliament, have shown their desire to reach an understanding, and belief was general today that proposals were in preparation by both sides of the controversy. Former U. S. Food Administrator Appears Before Commission.

New York, N. Hoover Presents Argument. Hoover Presents Argument.

"I cannot understand the argument that New York would suffer through the construction of this waterway," said Mr. Hoover. "The port of New York is great because of the commercial and general business prosperity of the country. New York as a great distributing plant will fall if production in the interior diminishes."



### SECRET MEETING WAS HELD HERE

London Had Curious Connection With American Civil War.

A curious connection of London with the American civil war was set forth by Public Librarian Fred Landon in a paper read before the London and Middlesex Historical Society last evening. Within the last few years certain documents have become available dealing with the gigantic plot in the summer of 1864 to separate all the northwestern group of states from the north and set up a separate confederacy. The leaders of the south were eager to see this carried out, knowing that it would weaken the north and strengthen their cause, and so from Canada, where they had residential agents, they formed connections with a large semi-political organization known as the Sons of Liberty, having about 300,000 members in the states north of the Ohio, where widespread disaffection with the Historical Society last evening where widespread disaffection with the administration at Washington pre-August 7-8 there was held in this

city, at the Tecumseh House, it is believed, a meeting between the Con-federate commissioners and the agents of the Sons of Loberty, and at this meeting plans were laid for the forfederate commissioners and the agents of the Sons of Loberty, and at this meeting plans were laid for the formation of the new northwestern republic. The federal prisons were to be attacked, and 30,000 Confederate prisoners held there were to be released, armed from state arsenals, and the whole government overturned in that part of the Union. 



The impression here tonight is that the Government, unless some new and striking facts are brought out in to-morrow's hearing, will rescind the order of the board of commerce altogether and let the law of supply and demand rule in sugar prices.

Norfolk reports that canning factories have finished with tomatoes and corn, and are now working on pumpkins and apples.
