A FURIOUS BOMBARDMENT. The Czar's Fleet Driven Back With

Heavy Losses. London, Tuesday, March 1. - A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Yin Kow, dated Feb. 29, says:

"Fifteen Japanese warships furiously bombarded Port Arthur from 10 o'clock Russian cruisers Novik, Askold and tack. They were, however, forced to retire. The Askold was in a sinking condition, the Novik was badly damaged, and a torpedo boat was sunk. The Russian battleship Retvizan was again damaged. The Japanese withdrew in good order.'

The pause in the war operations in the far east has been broken by another Japanese attack on Port Arthur, of which only the foregoing brief account is yet to hand. A St. Petersburg dispatch says: Direct confirmation of the report from Hakodate that Vladivostock is blockaded by Japanese vessels cannot be obtained here, but it is considered not improbable. The battleship Retvizan, which has been acting as a floating battery since Togo's first raid, has also been damaged. This last naval attack has been expected for some days, it being anticipated the Japs would utilize it to cover the landing of troops, but as yet there has been no report of land operations near Port Arthur. From Korea comes little that is dedefinite. Beyond occasional clashes of outposts and scouts there has been no fighting. Vladivostock is believed to be blockaded by a Jap fleet. The Czar is anxious to go to the war in person. Japanese troops have won the race to Ichio Yang in Korea, that city also being the objective point of the Russians. Government Intends to Keep Up Two-Powers Standard.

POLICY IS A DEFENSIVE ONE

Many More Cruisers To Be Built for the Defense of the British Mercantile Marine.

estimates in the House of Ernest G. Prettyman, secretary to the admiralty, justified the ncrease in the estimates on the ground that "the two-powers standard" must be maintained. The Russian battleship programme and that of other naval powers had been considered. Russia and France together had built or were building 64 battleships, and France and Germany combined were building or had built 61 battleships, while the British total was 63 battle-

In considering the cruiser programme the Government was not governed by this standard, but by the mmense preponderance of British seaborne commerce. While regretting the increased expenditure the admiralty regarded it as being insurance.

saying the naval policy of Great Britain was purely defensive. Recent events in the far east showed the necessity for preparedness to strike the first blow, and so obtain incalculable advantage. The greatest power for peace throughout the world, he added, was the British navy, which was also the most powerful instrument of war in

This makes to unseat any member of this year's board, no matter how irregular the election may have been. 




