From Valdes to Dawson on Horseback.

The first man who has ever been known to bring a horse from the Copper river country to Dawson is Mr. Harry Edwards of Salt Lake City. On June 16th Mr. Edwards, in company with his parener, Ed. Wolfskilf left Port Valdes for this city by the all-overland route. Each man rode a horse and in addition they brought two burros, loaded with 150 bs of grub. From Val test they struck inland and came out on Copper, or Alma river, as the Indians term the stream, about 166 miles from the mouth at a point culted Copper centers.
