Concrete Structures Best - How to Make Old Granary Micient-Flush Ewes to Increase 1919 Lamb Crop - Great Shortage of Fall Wheat Seed.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

TO hard and fast rules can be laid down for the erection of a convenient and efficient granary. Each problem requires a knowledge of local condiin enclosures on the barn floor, and constructed with 'coo little regard for strength, durability and convenience. These structures should be located Immediately over the feed room, each bin having a chute with a controlling slide, or a canvas distributor to convey the grain to the hopper of the grinder; or if the grain is intended for market, to a sack placed on the scales below the chute ready the grain, the floor of the bins should

ARTICLE 5 Whenever the intervention of the French Government shall become necessary for the erection of a mounment commemorative of a feat of arms of the British army or of one of its units, application shall be made by the mperial War Graves Commission. Should a request of this nature be made direct to the French Government, the latter shall refer it to the Commission before giving any decision, and shall consider, in agreement with the Commission, what action shall be taken thereon.

ARTICLE 6 The Imperial War Graves Commismission shall appoint a mix d Anglo-French Committee, to represent the Commission in France in its relations with the French authorities, both the military and civil, and especially to exercise in the name of the Commission all or part of the rights reserved to it under the present agreement This committee shall be competent to perform in the name of the Imperial War Graves Commission and within the limits of the powers delegated to it by the latter, all civil acts necessary to enable it to fulfil its object. ARTICLE 7

The mixed committee shall be com-

FARM LOANS for SOLDIERS



Agricultural Training For

Soldier Settlers A SOLDIER is entitled to the benefits of the Soldier Settlement Act if he can satisfy the Accionstruct. satisfy the Agricultural Qualification

Committee in his district that-(a) He has performed the required military

(b) He is sincere in his intention to make farming his permanent occupation;

(c) He is physically capable and is fitted in general to make a success of the farming business.

If he is otherwise qualified, but has not had sufficient practical agricultural experience, the Committee may recommend that he be given agricultural training. A generous scale of allowances for soldiers in training has been San Contract adopted.

Training Centres For Soldier Settlers

The applicant who is recommended for instruction in agriculture may first be sent to a Training Centre, specially operated for the purpose, where he will learn, by practical experience, how to handle and feed horses and other live stock; milking; the operation of farm machinery, ploughing, etc.; general farm building work; farm blacksmithing; the different kinds of soil and rotation of crops; the selection and independent and tion of crops; the selection and judging of live stock and the marketing of farm products. Short lectures on the business management of a farm will be given.

With A Selected Farmer

After the course at the Training Centre, the length of which depends on the progress of the individual but

will not exceed three months, the man is placed with a carefully selected farmer in the district in which he intends to settle, to complete his training. During this period (not exceeding one year), the soldier is visited from time to time by representatives of the Soldier Settlement Board, who check his progress and recommend when he is considered qualified to take up a farm of his own.

It will be evident that by this system of preliminary training the soldier settler will gain a thorough practical knowledge of farming without expense; will learn to appreciate the responsibility involved in the venture, and at the same time gain a clear conception of just what farm life means.

On His Own Farm

When a settler is deemed qualified by the Agricultural Qualification Committee, the Board will assist him to become established on a farm of his own, and will, through its Agricultural Advisers, continue to co-operate with him in his work, thereby ensuring his success and consequent ability to discharge his obligations and become permanently established.

Fair To Both

The procedure outlined not only gives the soldier an opportunity of first becoming familiar with his environment and of acquiring the experience requisite to success, but ensures adding to the nation's fundamental industry only competent and satisfied producers.





Moreover, they buy annually nearly \$2,000,000,000 worth of raw material. mostly in Canada. Around these factories are congregated a hundred other forms of business. All these are your customers, and statistics show that this home market is four times as valuable to you as your entire foreign market. Decrease its buying powers, and your sales lessen and your prices drop.

How A Minority Seek to Sever Our Alliance

The Prairie Grain Growers are urging the Government to throw down the tariff wall between Canada and the United States because they want to save a little money (mainly on freight rates) by buying from the United States manufacturers just south of them. They, who constitute about 20 per cent. of the agricultural population of Canada; ask all the other farmers, who constitute the remaining 80 per cent., to change the policy which they have supported for forty years.

Furthermore, to raise the Dominion Government revenue, they would substitute for the tariff, which collected last year about 60 per cent. of that revenue, an increase of income taxes, inheritance taxes, corporation taxes and taxes on unimproved land values. As it is quite obvious that such taxes would affect the farmer but little, this is the inducement they are using to get you to forsake us and follow the free trade prophets no one knows where.

We think this appeal will fail. First, because it seems to be founded on the assumption that the farmers of Canada want to slip out of paying any increased taxes that may be needed for soldiers' pensions, gratuities and

re-establishment. We have found in all our experience that the farmers of Canada are not this class of men. Second, because the argument is unsound. It requires little reflection to see that if our market is thrown open and flooded, many of our manufacturers, caught in the struggle to re-adjust themselves from war to peace conditions, will not be able to keep going. Would this not result in many of our people, unless they were able and willing to take up farming, leaving for the United States? Would not the rest of the population then, which might consist chiefly of farmers, have to pay all the taxes?

The Grain Growers do not represent the entire population of the Prairie Provinces. They do not represent the business population; they do not by any means represent all the farmers. The Prairie Grain Growers' Associations are dominated by a group of free traders whose one idea seems to be to get free trade all over the world. Unfortunately for their theories, just at the present time all the rest of the world seems desirous of getting protec-

Tariff Policy of Other Nations

GREAT BRITAIN is shutting out the goods of other countries (except the Dominions). FRANCE and ITALY are shutting out the goods of other countries by import restrictions.

THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY in the United States. which advocates low tariffs, seems to be going out of power, and the Republicans, who always support high tariffs, have now a majority in both Senate and Congress. Do you think that this means that the United States' tariff is going up or down?

SOUTH AFRICA is increasing its tariff. Australia New Zealand, Newfoundland, Japan, Brazil and Portugal are all jealously maintaining their tariffs.

Why is this wave of protection sweeping over the world? In a word, because the various countries are trying to produce all they need at home, in order to provide work for their own people-many of them returned soldiers.

Why then is this Western minority of the farmers of Canada determined to go in the exactly opposite direction?

In opposing the demands of the Grain Growers, we do not in any sense intend, as they sometimes say, to show hostility to them. They are our customers. Is not our prosperity affected by theirs? Beyond all this, if the farmers do not prosper, neither we nor the country can prosper. Agriculture and industry are the basis of the country's strength. But we feel that these demands of the Grain Growers aim a deadly blow, not only at industry but at the whole farming community.

What justifies the Grain Growers in demanding that their personal grievances be cured at the expense of the rest of the country? Are they in a desperate position? Have they been losing heavily? Are they suffering from too much adversity or too much success? Are they in any danger comparable to the one great danger in Canada now?-

THE DANGER OF UNEMPLOYMENT

the danger which may place thousands in need of shelter, food and clothing? Most Canadians feel strongly that until this danger is avoided, and the country safely restored to a peace basis, the nation should not be disturbed by any tariff controversy at all.

When this danger is passed, and the country knows where is stands, and what other countries of the world are going to do, then the tariff question should be taken up and such a tariff should be framed as will suit, not the manufacturers merely, nor the farmers merely, but the country as a whole, and by adding to the prosperity of the nation, add to the prosperity of each and every class—the only safe path to prosperity for any country or any class in that country.



of the Great Divide. This ridge is penetrated by two comparatively easy passes; the Simpson, and the Vermillion which lead into the Valley of the Kootenay River, a region aboundetl south of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Between the Kootenay River and the Columbia through which the Sinclair Pass and Canyon provide an easy road. When the first surveys were made for an automobile road between Banff and Windermere it was planned to use the Simpson, Governor of the Hudson's Bay Company, who made this emission. the same time more beautiful, and contruction of the Highway of the Great Divide was commenced from opposite Castle Mountain in this direction. At the same time the road, from Windermere through the Sinclair Canyon was also commenced and at the time of the outbreak of war a gap of only thirty miles separated the two roads War put an end to construction, and a great washout destroyed several miles of the western end, so that the project seemed to have been abandoned. Now, however, the Dominion Government has made an arrangement with the British Columbia Government by which the route of the road comes un-der the jurisdiction of the Dominion Parks, and a substantial appropriation has been allotted to finish the work. In this way there is every prospect of the early completion of what will be

Information reaching the Canadian Trade Commission from England points to a great demand for honey see-keeping has been seriously inerfered with throughout the British Isles by the inability to get suitable and through the extreme restrictions a 15 on sugar for winter feeding of bees. It is pointed out that the opportunity for the Canadian production this year will therefore, be unequalled. Last year's crop in Canada approxmated eight mililon pounds, and conicering the mildness of the winter end the demands which have been nade for new hives, it is not unreaonable to expect an increase of 5 per cent. should the weather in the next few months be fairly good and pen. Producers may be assured good prices.

NEW STANDARD

At the last annual meeting of the Holstein-Friesian Association a motion was passed to raise the standard of qualification in the Record of Performance to at least 400 pounds of fat for a mature cow, with the same rate of increase between the standard for a two-year-old and a mature cow as under the former rules.
