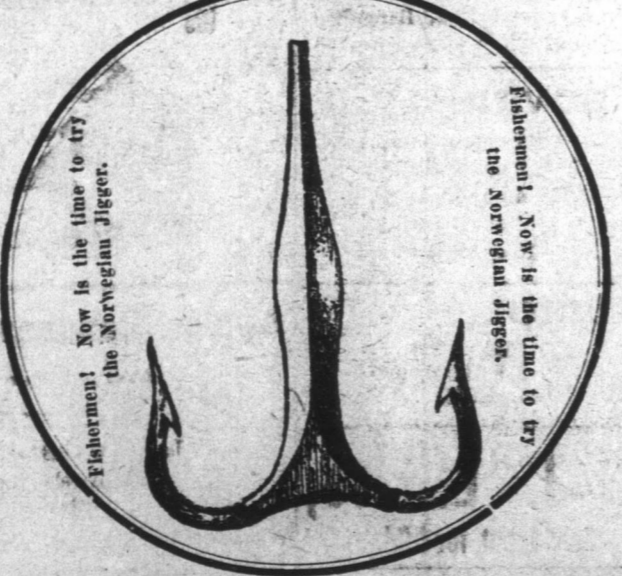

Public Notice.

CENSUS, 1911.

The following Regulations in connection with the Census are published for general information:—

1. The father of a family, if alive and present, is the proper authority to give information of his family; if the father is dead or absent, then the mother or person in charge shall speak for him;

(a) Provided that any child over sixteen years of age objecting to be classified in religion by the parent may be permitted to name his or her religion to the Magistrate;

(b) That the wife, boarder or servant or other person of full age present in a house, may speak for themselves, and can have alterations made by applying to the Court of Revision.

2. No person who has been continuously absent from Newfoundland for eighteen months immediately preceding the time of taking the Census shall be included in the Census, but this shall not be taken to exclude (1) Any child who is absent at school; and (2) Any head of a family who is employed out of the Colony, but whose family continues to reside in the Colony.

3. Every person resident in the Colony at the time the Census is being taken shall be included without reference to the length of time during which such person has resided here. In other words, the name of every actual and bona fide resident must be included.

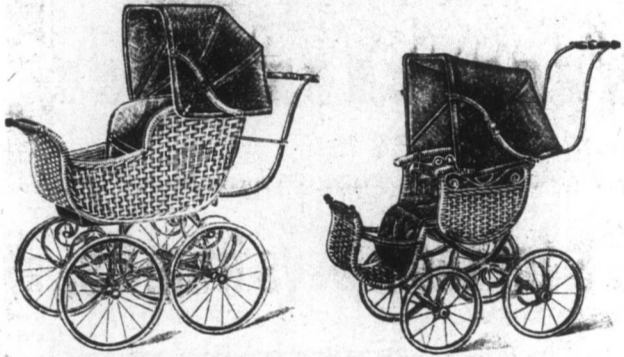

The Evening Chit-Chat

By HENRI CANNON



Headlines a child by encouraging habits which were sure to lead to some physical defect.

Of course not. And yet how often you come into contact with cases in which mothers have handicapped their children by encouraging habits of mind which led to mental defects.

I am thinking especially just now of the child who is afraid of thunderstorms.

In nine cases out of ten when a child is unreasonably terrified by a thunderstorm it is the mother's fault.

Sometimes she is to blame because she has deliberately encouraged the child by letting him see that he can hold the centre of attention whenever there is a thunderstorm if he will yield completely to his fear, and by talking in his presence about how terribly he suffers during thunderstorms and about his high strung and nervous temperament.

More often she is to blame because she does nothing or not nearly enough to overcome the child's fear.

Most children are naturally terrified by heavy crashes of thunder and vivid lightening.

But there are two ways of treating that terror.

One is to sympathize with it and make much of it and increase it by all the power of suggestion.

The other is to pass it off as lightly as possible and interest the child in other things or even in the beautiful

impressive aspect of the storm itself. I was with a very wise mother the other day during a terrific thunderstorm. It was the biggest storm her little four year old daughter had ever witnessed and of course at first she was inclined to be much frightened. Instead of yielding to, and sympathizing with this terror, the mother drew her little girl's attention to the great beauty of lightening, got her to watch for especially magnificent zig-zags, told her the dear old folk story of Heudrik Hudson rolling his great balls in the mountains, explained to her how little real reason for fear there was and soon had her interested and comforted.

The child will doubtless grow up without the needless discomfort of terror every time the sky darkens as if for a thunderstorm.

I am convinced that there are a very few people—and I mean a VERY few and its a thousand to one you are not one of them—who are so full of electricity that a thunderstorm does affect them physically.

They CANNOT wholly overcome their terror.

Furthermore there is a certain amount of absolutely reasonable alarm, natural fear of being struck when a thunderstorm is close at hand. That you cannot blame anyone for feeling although I think that "to reckon danger too seriously," to hearken too intently for the threat that runs through all the winning music of the world to hold back "the hand from the rose because of the thorn and from life because of death," is to loose half the worth of living.

But aside from these two conditions, I think that fear of a thunderstorm is something to be very much ashamed of and that the mother who does not do everything in her power to help her child overcome it, or better still keep him from acquiring it, is doing a very wrong thing.

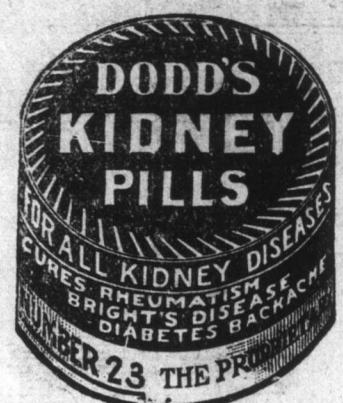

Why Have They Failed?

We again draw attention to the failure of the Government to supply a record of the state of the foreign markets to which our staple is shipped. The Premier has promised fishermen a weekly report in order that they may have a record of facts on which to form a fair and reasonable opinion as to the prices which should prevail locally.

Mr. Piccott, the Minister of Fisheries, has had this project in hand, and has failed signally to supply regularly information from our chief markets which is of any practical value. Why he should fail is a matter of comment. Considerable information is published weekly in New York by the Fishing Gazette. Why the Government cannot get it as speedily as the New York Fishing Gazette is remarkable. In the issue of September 2nd, which is before us, we have prices quoted in the New York wholesale market, for Newfoundland, large Maderia, 112 lbs., \$8.00 to \$9.00; Newfoundland, Porto Rico butts in bond, \$22.00 to \$23.00; Newfoundland, Rio, tubs, c.i.f., \$8.75 to \$9.00.

We also notice the report of Holmwood & Holmwood, of the Oporto Fish market, dated Aug. 17th; S. Ramirez & Co.'s weekly report of the Porto Rico Fish Market, dated San Juan, Aug. 22nd. Besides these there are reports from Havana, St. John's, Nfld., St. John, N.B., Halifax, etc. This goes to show that information is available if proper steps are taken to secure it.

Why, then, have Premier Morris and Minister Piccott failed in their undertaking? Since writing what appears above, we find that the effort to obtain prices abroad has been resumed and to-day the Minister of Fisheries has received two messages, one from Bahia and the other from Pernambuco.

We hope he will continue his efforts until the criticism given above is unnecessary.

Presented With Photograph.

Census Enumerators Go on Strike

We learn to-day that 6 or 8 men who were employed to take the census here, quit the job. They say that it is physically impossible for any man to undertake the work of taking the census in any district. They had to ask about 200 questions and must make entries in 9 books which they are compelled to take around with them and added to this no definite amount of remuneration has been allowed them for travelling expenses. The soubriquets given to the Tory party by the Telegram of late are put enough but these men say another should be added and that the present Tory Government should be called the "Bum" Government for they are trying to get men to do their work for little or nothing while the Premier and his pals are spending money in thousands.

Police Make a Seizure

Head Constable Daws was a very active man the past 24 hours working up the case against the parties who sold old metal to B. Kesner, the junk man, Water St. West. Four barrels of old brass and other ends of metal were seized and taken to the police station last evening by the order of Head Daws. Some of the property was identified as having come from the premises of one of the telegraph co's, operating in the city. The employee of the company who sold the stuff to Kesner, on being confronted by Head Daws, said that he had had permission to gather up the old odds and ends in the store and do what he liked with them. They sent out city carriers to-day to all the merchants of the wharf, telling them that they will not handle Nfld. Produce Co's freight.

Rushing Steam Coal to Scotland.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Noon. While the English naturally have been greatly exercised over the Moroccan negotiations, there has been no excitement over them, except for a few days following the arrival of the German gunboat at Agadir. The varying optimism and pessimism of the reports left Englishmen unmoved. Officials circles, however, are anxious because of the view they take of the dispute. This view has not been changed by a receipt of a summary of Germany's reply to the French proposals telegraphed here. It is true, the diplomats point out that Germany appears to agree to the principle of the establishment of a French Protectorate over Morocco. She, however, makes such reservations as the agreement. What Germany now asks would place her on much the same footing in Morocco as France in the matter of railway connections and their administration, as well as in regard to roads, telegraphs and other enterprises. France, said a high official, is prepared to give Germany every guarantee that she will receive equal treatment with other nations, but it is impossible for France to give the economic advantages now asked. For the moment the point of interest is not the extent of territorial compensation, and the importance of the German note lies in its Moroccan proposal. While no one professes to believe war probable, there is no doubt of Britain's readiness. The Admiralty has taken the unusual course of placing orders for 20,000 tons of coal at Cardiff, without regard to the ordinary list of collieries. The order is to obtain the best quality. At heavy cost this coal is being rushed to Scotland off the coast of which the Home Fleet is now exercising.

Germany's Story.

Special to Evening Telegram. BERLIN, To-day. The Emperor before starting for the scene of the army manoeuvres yesterday had a conference with the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Billard, the local armiger in what is said to be an inspired article says Germany does not demand any special rights whatever in Morocco. She seeks mainly guarantees from France against the monopolization of public works, mining and trading rights, and against certain privileges in customs administration, guarantees that would benefit all countries equally. The only subject requiring a special arrangement between Germany and France would be the paper says, a treaty defining territorial indemnity. All other points could be covered by an amendment to the Algeciras Act, provided that the other signatories accept the German proposal, commencing France to take over the Protectorate of Morocco with the obligations involved to maintain order.

Dutch Arming.

Special Evening Telegram. HAGUE, To-day. Owing to the alarming war news arising from the prolonged Franco-German negotiations over Morocco, the Dutch Government is making full preparations to resist all possible interference with the neutrality of the Netherlands. The fortifications along the German frontier have been occupied by strong garrisons and the coast defences have been fully manned and an order issued calling out the National Reserves for army manoeuvres. The Government is buying provisions to keep men and horses supplied for six months. The price of rice has risen to its highest point since the war. Rice is being ordered from the Colonias.

Japanese Navy Valueless Now.

Captain Ota's Speech Before Military Committee Causes a Sensation. Tokio, Sept. 6.—Quite a sensation has been caused in naval circles by an address delivered by Captain Ota before the War Affairs Investigation Association. It is not often that a Japanese naval or military officer permits himself such liberties as did Captain Ota on this occasion, and there is some talk about the application of the disciplinary law by way of punishment for the views he ventured to express. 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The gist of Captain Ota's philippic is that the naval authorities are making a mistake in being too eager to complete the works on land, seeing that the navy necessarily has its efficiency on sea and naval strength can be increased only by the construction of a powerful fleet.

To illustrate this contention Captain Ota pointed to the five naval stations on the coast of this country. In establishing these naval stations the country was divided into five artificial sections, a naval station being established in the best harbor in each division but at the same time none of these has any real significance. Each Japanese naval station is presided over by an admiral or a vice admiral, with a rear admiral for chief staff officer. Outwardly they are very imposing as compared with the big naval stations of the foreign navies, however, viewed from a strategic standpoint none of them are valueless.

In this connection the captain stated that attacks by an enemy's fleet would come from the southwestern side of this country, as more than once during the late war. The captain reviewed the various naval stations, denouncing Misaki as not only useless but rather harmful, since its presence hinders the quick movement of the navy. He admitted that with the substitution of Cores the naval station projected at Chatham Bay might be necessary, but even here he deprecated the outlay of gigantic capital. So long as Japan's main naval force is concentrated at Sasebo it is unthinkable that a small section of the enemy's fleet will trespass on the Sea of Japan to squander their stock of ammunition. Captain Ota also says that in the Japanese navy official posts are given for personal consideration. A lieutenant commander may command a war ship, but in the Japanese navy officers of this rank occupy much better posts. Again, under the present system of organization torpedo squadrons transact the business of fish

torpedoes and submarine mines, whereas in England the management of submarine mines is left to the army. Seeing that the one is for offensive and the other for defensive purposes, the placing of the two under one and the same management is calculated to cause considerable inconvenience and friction. According to Captain Ota, if radical reforms were effected in the present Japanese naval organization, the annual expenditure would be reduced by one-third.

Another evil is the lack of uniformity in the guns with which Japanese war ships are equipped. Whereas 12-inch guns are recognized as composing the main battery, subsidiary 8-inch guns are generally carried. At first sight this may appear a happy combination, but in practice it is otherwise, seeing that the war ships have to store shells of different sizes, a circumstance calculated to entail great inconvenience and confusion in the supply of shells during actual engagements.

In the course of an explanation of his reasons for making this expose of the defects of the Japanese navy, Captain Ota is quoted as saying:—

"When I came back from Europe for the second time after the war with Russia, I could not but muse when I saw the inner workings of the knowledge I had of European navies. I state emphatically that our navy is formidable only in appearance—the heart is rotten. If the existing defects are not speedily remedied the nation will some day have to pay the penalty and in the interim to bear even larger and larger appropriations to no useful purpose."

The Captain said that he had resigned because the naval authorities had turned a deaf ear to his representations.

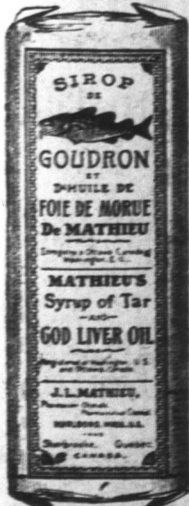
