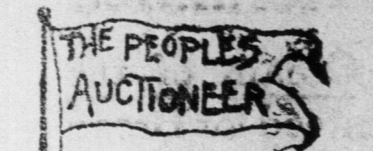

"Yes," said my neighbour, "I've been just as blue as can be all day. A n y thing the matter? It rains like this for two or three days in succession. I'll be all right when the sun comes out, but just now I'm so depressed I don't know what to do. That's the way with all our family. My sister fidgets herself almost sick if we have two or three bad days, and my mother was just so. We are all very sensitive to weather."

My neighbour concluded this speech with an air of self approval as unmistakable as it was inexplicable. What possible cause for pride is there to be found in the fact that one is upset by such a trifle as a little rain?

And yet I know many people who are similarly depressed and thrown off their poise by the accident of bad weather. I think they are both unfortunate and foolish. Don't you? Unfortunately, because bad weather must come; "some days must be dark and dreary," and it is too bad to add that cause for depression to the innumerable legitimate causes that crowd the ordinary life. Foolish, because such a tendency can be controlled.

Comes a second rainy, drizzly day right on the heels of the first rainy, drizzly day, (I do not think many people mind one rainy day. If it comes after a period of sunshine, it may even have a restful charm. It is the second successive bad day that brings the blues) and you say mournfully: "Oh, dear, I am sorry it is raining. Rainy weather always makes me so blue," and straightway you justify your expectations of yourself by feeling blue.

Just as people who expect to be seasick and who go down into stuffy cabins and make all the odious preparations usually are seasick. But suppose you did not allow yourself to think anything about the matter beyond the cheerful thought that it is likely to clear soon, and that anyhow the rain is doing the crops and the flowers much good. Suppose you brought up all the cheerful things you had in your mind treasury; said something unusually pleasant to someone; hummed a little song about your work and amused by trying to see how well and how swiftly you could do that work; and then, when your tasks were done, suppose you read some especially absorbing book or made a call on some particularly interesting person, or even went out for a splendid invigorating walk right in the rain, do you think you could be blue very long?

Try it sometime. Who knows but that the very rainy day you will be able to greet and dispel the gloom with our optimist poet's philosophy: "It ain't no use to grumble and complain. It's just as cheap and easy to rejoice; When God sorts out the weather and sends rain, Why rain's my choice."

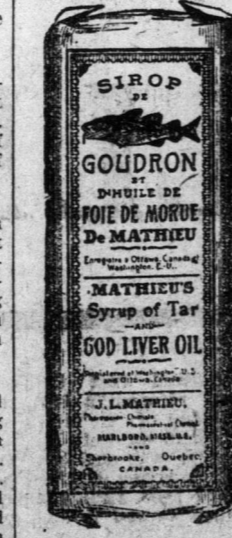

The Socialist Movement. BY ANDANTINO.

IX.—GENERAL DEMANDS. The collective ownership of railroads, telegraphs, telephones, steamship lines and all other means of social transportation and communication and the extension of the public domain to include mines, quarries, oil wells, forests and water power. The present Pope has said that if only the principles of Christian Justice and Christian Charity had been observed and enforced on the relations between Capital and Labour, abuses never could have arisen. What a condemnation that is of our present day business life. The former part of the above demands is simply an enlargement of the State control that exists at the present time. That there would have been more satisfaction and better service if the wireless were under State control was amply shown in the Titanic disaster. No one would think for a minute of giving the Postal Service to a private company to manage, and with State ownership of transportation facilities a large sum in subsidies would be saved to the service. That a sixty per cent reduction was made in the cost of local telegrams when our Government started their system is typical of the condition that exists in an industry when separated from the rapacious man of a dividend seeker. In railroading there are many high-salaried officials who could be done without under collective ownership as their chief efficiency consists in a shrewdness in getting over their rivals, and it has been stated that if the railways of the United States were managed as a unit instead of by competing companies, such management would effect an economy of Two hundred million dollars a year. And the evidence of many European countries which have the railways under State control amply justifies the policy by lower rates, and more comfort and consideration of passengers. The telegraph business is similar. The Western Union was capitalized at One hundred million dollars. It is estimated that the cost of laying the lines actually used was not more than twenty millions; eighty million dollars therefore, have been wasted by the existing system, which encourages private companies to construct lines with the result of compelling other companies to buy them up. Professor Ely says that it cost England nearly as much to make the telegraph a part of the Post Office as it did all the other countries of Europe put together, because in these the telegraph has been from the beginning a

tain months can be taken—we say that only within certain times can birds be shot—and other limitations have been placed upon man for the good of all. "We would be indignant if we saw a stout fellow thrust himself up to a table where some hungry children were being fed and reach his arm over their heads and take their bread from them. But the world is not the least indignant at a man who has stoutness of thought and swiftness of capacity who uses his intellect to take the bread out of the mouths of all the other men in the town who are of the same trade with him; or uses his power to gather some branch of the commerce of the country into one great cobweb, of which he is himself to be the central spider, making every thread vibrate with the points of his claws." See the injustice of it all; and the awful results of the up to date business maxim: "Buy in the cheapest market and sell in the dearest." And as I said before, if we limit man's freedom to kill birds and seals surely, what Christian would not say 'yes' to a law that would limit man's inhumanity to man. (Continued in Wednesday's issue.)

American Fish Markets.

MR. HICKMAN Visits Brazil, Panama and States. He Reports Norwegian Cutting into Our Markets, and that Our Prospects are not Favourable.

Mr. and Mrs. Hickman, who had been on a trip to the United States, South America and Canada, arrived here by Thursday night's express. Mr. Hickman is the manager here of the Smith Co. Ltd., one of our largest exporters of codfish. Yesterday the Telegram had an interview with Mr. Hickman as to fish conditions generally. Mr. Hickman remarked that he had gone down through South America to Brazil and being Consul here for the Republic of Panama, also paid a visit to that country. Mr. Hickman says that the Norwegians are sending their fish into South America, especially making a set on Southern Brazil. Norway has a considerable portion of the large Norwegian catch, and this is the fish she is now running to the market. This is gradually supplanting the Newfoundland article and the European rivals are underselling us. They have not yet sold their goods in Northern Brazil but they are after that market and have introduced small samples of their catch there and to gain a foothold are curing their cod exactly like we do and putting it up in packages exactly similar to ours. The large Norwegian catch, Mr. Hickman thinks, would not affect the consumption in the United States, because the people there do not use cod fish, and Mr. Hickman thinks that the past spring is better than of the previous spring. The Porto Rico market being poor and taking little fish now from the States, forces them to sell to their own people at lower rates. The great Norwegian catch must be sold, must come into competition with our fish, and Mr. Hickman thinks that the prospects are not favourable. Of his visit to Panama, Mr. Hickman says, it was an experience which he can never forget. He went right to the workings of the Canal, and says that the unhealthy climate has been transformed, and the deadly malarial and yellow fever which had killed thousands heretofore, have disappeared owing to American methods, consisting mostly of draining the marshes and purifying the water with powerful chemical solutions. He found the climate delightful, and says that the death rate now, owing to proper hygienic and preventive measures, has reached the normal limit.

The Department of Marine and Fisheries will increase the strength of the expedition which is to go by sea to Hudson Bay this summer to determine the respective merits of Port Nelson and Fort Churchill as a terminal for the Hudson Bay Railway. The Minto and Arctic will both go north and are now being equipped with wireless telegraph instruments. The Arctic will sail June 15th and the Minto some days later. The Minto will be in command of Capt. Anderson, who will have with him Lieut. Knight and the Newfoundland navigator, Capt. Bartlett. The ships will remain in Hudson Bay waters until driven out by ice, and will bring back definite information as to the length of the navigation season.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day.

Sydney Buxton, President of the Board of Trade, yesterday appointed a committee consisting of nine prominent naval architects to advise him as to the best method to secure safety at sea by means of watertight bulkheads or other internal subdivisions in vessels.

Clean Up Day.

The Council yesterday at the meeting determined to ask those who intend co-operating in the work of "clean up day" to send their horses to the sanitary stables on Thursday at 7 a.m. It is hoped citizens will respond generously in this respect. The material collected will be dumped at Sumner's farm, Freshwater Road, and Rose's farm, Quidi Vidi, so that it may not endanger the public health.

Duff Gordon Examined.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day.

Sir Cosmo Duff Gordon, on the witness stand gave an absolute denial to stories that either he or his wife protested against the life-boats returning to the rescue, saying the question of returning was not even mentioned. He repeated the story of his leaving the Titanic and said his wife refused to leave him, although attempts were made to force her into one of the boats. They waited, he said, until boat No. 1 had been loaded and asked if they could not go in it. Officers replied: "We should be glad if you would." Sir Rufus Isaacs: "Can you give any explanation as to why the boat left with so few?" Sir Cosmo: "There were no people in sight." Sir Rufus: "There must have been people nearby." Sir Cosmo: "I thought they would go away in port boats."

Gordon then told of rowing away from the ship. He thought they were about a thousand yards off when the ship went down. The men then started rowing again. Sir Rufus: "You cried of drowning people, there was room in the boat. If you had returned you could have saved some." Sir Cosmo: "It is hard to know what I was thinking about. At the time I was looking at my wife. I did not think of it being possible to go back, nor did the idea of returning enter my mind." Sir Rufus: "You know now that you could have saved many." 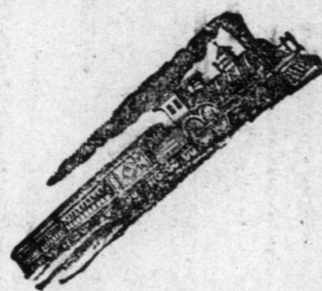


