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

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

The Right Honourable SIR ROBERT BOND,

P.C., K.C.M.G.

HIS RESPONSE TO THE CALL OF DUTY.

(Editor Evening Telegram.)

SIR,-

The time has, I think, arrived when I ought to set at rest all doubt as to whether I shall claim exemption from the duties I have hitherto discharged in connection with the public life of Newfoundland, or again place my services at the disposal of the Liberal Party. As you recently intimated in your newspaper my resignation of the leadership of that party has been in the possession of its Executive for more than three years. I would add to this information that my friends throughout the country were long ago apprised of the same, and, that after thirty odd years of laborious public life I considered myself entitled to retire from its exactions on the present opportunity. But I have found it impossible to obtain their acquiescence, and I have been honoured by their request that I should reconsider my resignation of the leadership of the Liberal Party, and once more enter the political

Before determining whether I should again offer to assume a charge of grave responsibility, and one rendered especially onerous by reason of the financial obligations and difficulties that face the country, I have reviewed, with great care, a number of considerations, both public and private. The result is I have decided to respond to what appears to be a pretty general desire, and to lead a United Opposition to the polls at the General Election in November. This decision is dictated to me by my personal views as to public







14 Years For Two Robbers Who Beat Victim.

Fourteen years in the Penitentiary was the sentence imposed by Judge Bazin in the Court of Special Sessions on Victor Derepentigny and Arthur Dufour, found guilty of robpery with violence.

Before sentence was passed, the prisoners were asked if they had anything to say. Derepentigny said nothing, but Dufour asked the court to suspend sentence, promising to leave the city and go to the United States as soon as he was released.

"The United States, no more than Canada, have any need of men like you," said Judge Bazin. "The proper punishment for characters like you would be a good whipping. Both of you should be sentenced to the lash. You are evidently too hardened criminals, beyond all redemption, as the records before me prove. You have both been in the penitenutiary for terms of years and have spent a reat part of your lives in jail. The enitentiary is the only place for you, and I sentence you each to 14


