



Significant News.

The news of the week is of a highly significant character in its relation to our own people. That news relates to five important matters: the advance of the British forces against the Germans; the destruction of Admiral von Spee's fleet; the defeat of the submarine raid in the Admiralty harbor at Dover; the rounding up of the rebels by Botha and the pacification of South Africa: the defeat of the Turks in the Persian Gulf and the surrender of the Turkish forces at Basra; and the decision in regard to the unification of Egypt. Lord Kitchener has just returned from France and his visit marks the turning point of the struggle in Flanders and neighbourhood, just as it did on the Marne. For a long time the tactics of the Allies have allowed the Germans to break themselves up on the Allies lines, par-ticularly in the case of the wild attempts made under the orders of the Kaiser to hack a way through to Calais The hacking costs the German forces dearly, and now the tide has turned, and the British have made a notable advance on their way to Brussels Yesterday we reviewed briefly the effect of the destruction of the German fleet in the South Atlantic. 



Isolated attempts on the part of the enemy to take the offensive, have given rise to engagements n the districts of Ciechanon and Przasnysz, as well as Pietrkow, and several other districts on our front. The result of the engagements has been unfavorable to the Germans. In the region of the passes of Vyszkow and Beskid (in the Carpathians) on Dec. 8th, during attacks on fortified positions held by Austrians, we captured four guns, several hundred isoners, and many waggons.



VICTORY. LONDON, To-day. While the defeat of the German cruisers in the South Atlantic evokes tions to mark the victories. British people have been too much wrapped up in the operations of the Allied armies on the Continent. Lack of news in Poland causes some uneasiness regarding the results of the prolonged battle between Russians and Germans, but the reports from France are considered here to be most favorable to the Allies. The French have been making slow progress on the western front for the past fortnight. A review sent by a French witness for the period from Nov. 27 to Dec. 5 claims that the ascendancy of the French infantry and artillery over Weary Tiredness the German has been established, that while the infantry advanced, the artillery smashed the German batteries. The report from French headquarters to-night adds little general knowledge, as it says the situation is unchanged, which indicates, however, that the positions taken have been maintained. Berlin, on the other hand, states that French attacks on their army have been repulsed. It is apparent, however, that by the withdrawal of German troops to strengthen the armies in the East, the Allies have been able to put their lines forward in many places. 

He regards all the people as loyal to the Kaiser and the spirit of militar-

"Long before the beginning of the war," says M. Davray, "the Socialists by their votes in the Reichstag, gave proof of their belief in the necessity of imposing upon the world the socalled benefits of 'kultur' and Germanic civilization. For them, as for the whole German people, the Kaiser even though defeated in this war, will remain supreme. They will continue to respect his authority and take their orders from him.
