A Great Russian Czar.

uary 28, 1725, was born in 1672 and became Czar in 1682 but a revolution resulted in his elder brother Ivan duct Stripes. The present shows and himself ruling jointly under Princess Sophia, their elder sister. In 1689, however, Peter took the reins of Government into his own hands, and shortly afterwards went to war with Turkey, whom he defeated. He then travelled in Europe for two years, and visited Holland and England, where he learned shipbuilding. As a result of this visit Peter realised the advantages of European civilisation, and on his return to Russia he built the city of St. Petersburg, to take the place of Moscow as the capital, thus indicating his desire to make Russia a Western instead of an Eastern nation. In 1686 he crushed a revolution of his soldiers, destroye the power of the nobles, and brought the Church under his own control Four years later Charles of Sweden attacked Russia, but was defeated by Peter in the decisive battle of Poltava. In 1719 Charles again opened nostilities against Russia, but Peter carried all before him, and in the Peace which followed he obtained Ingria, Esthonia Sivonica, and part of Karelia, and restored Finland to Sweden. In this way Russia ousted Sweden from her position of supremacy on the Baltic and took her place. Peter was cruel and savage by nature, as is shown in the execution of his son Alexis, and in other frequent acts of ferocity. Nevertheless, owing to her great capacity, Russia made enormous strides during
