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

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

The run of sockeye salmon for the season has about concluded, and the pack, it is now positively known, is very much larger than was expected at the beginning of the season. Sound cannerymen believe that the ensuing run of silversides will be equally as great in proportion as that of the sockeyes. Shipments of canned salmon over the various lines from Seattle are now going on at the rate of from four to ten carloads per day. This enormous business is handled by the Great Northern and Northern Pacific, which lines distribute it among the various lines from Missouri common points to the East and South. Already nearly 100 cars have been shipped from Seattle this season. Freight rates to Atlantic coast points are neither higher nor lower than usual, being 70 cents per hundredweight, carloads, lake and rail, to New York, Boston and common points.
