E. B. Deming, general manager of the Pacific American Risheries, which operate the largest salmon cannery in the world at Bellingham, gave out the first official figures on the sockeye salmon pack of Puget Sound, which appeared in the Post-Intelligencer yesterday.

From the pack statements which he has in his possession, Mr. Deming states that the total sockeye pack of the Sound is 750,000 cases, and for the Fraser river 800,000. Of the 760,000 cases which he credits to Fuget Sound, the company represented by Mr. Deming packed 200,000 cases and the Alaska Packers' Association the same number.

"The figures which I have are accurate," said Mr. Deming, "and including the other grades the total salmon pack will reach 800,000 cases."
