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THE MONTREAL LASTERERS LOCK-OUT. Letter from the Secretary on the Situation Regarding Press Despatches. (To the Editor of the World.) Sir: As the press despatches with reference to the Montreal lasterers lock-out are misleading-intentionally, I believe-and as many of your readers are very anxious to hear the other side of the case, will you kindly give insertion to the following record in this city which explains itself.

DEAR SIR: In the name of the lasterers' union and as their secretary, I hasten to give you the details of this unfortunate affair—the so-called demand of the lasterers. There are only thirteen large factories here. Allow me to give you the facts consecutively and in the interests of justice. We have been turned out of the factories at stock-taking time and the sections of the other branches of our trade are suffering, and the employer is taking advantage of their misfortunes to compel them to take our places. If we submit we do not deserve to live, for we are not working for wages, but for free men.

A law of Pennsylvania imposes a fine of \$1000 and one year's imprisonment on any person who shall playfully or wantonly point or discharge a gun, pistol, or other firearm, at any other person.

Religious banking has been abolished in the diocese lately provided over by Archbishop Farrell. Priests are forbidden to receive money for deposit or for investment from private parties. The church appears to be capable of evolving some good out of misfortune.

The gallant editor of the Indianapolis News declares: "There are no homely women. Some are more beautiful than others, that is all." This is pushing the theory of relativity to the verge. So considered, there is no badness in the world. Some people are better than others, that is all.

Ivan Ludwig Van Cabel, whose name is a misnomer the son of a major-general in the Russian army, is under arrest in New York for several small forgeries. The young man with the geometrical complexion, appears to have disgraced his family before leaving home. Really he is not a square man.

Since the ashes left in a cemetery are almost pure phosphate of lime, a London genius suggests that it would be a good idea to treat this phosphate with sulphuric acid, thus converting it into a sulphate of lime or plaster of Paris, from which a best statuettes or medals of the dead cremated might be made.

The Ay Burna monument trustees have completed the purchase of the cottage in which Robert Burns was born. The building has hitherto been used as a public house. It is to be converted into a museum in which relics of the poet will be gathered together. The house and grounds were bought for \$20,000.

The United States census shows that of the whole number of farms, the largest proportion occupied by actual owners is in New England, 91 per cent. The next largest is 82 per cent in the Pacific states; in the west it is 79 per cent; in the middle west and the middle group it is 78 per cent; in the south it is 69 per cent.

Since the close of the war the American people have paid out \$530,000,000 in pensions. At the end of the present fiscal year there were 85,697 names on the list, representing an annual outlay of \$54,236,280, and in the last year \$57,640,000, or an increase of 10,281 increased pensions have been granted, and there are yet 289,678 applicants.

Jan Lind now resides in London, and it is by no means the aged lady that some reports describe. She is sixty, but does not look fifty, her eyes bright and happy, and her form well preserved. The longest line of fence in the world will be the wire fence extending from the Indian territory west across the Texas Panhandle and thirty-five miles into New Mexico. We are informed that eighty-five miles of this fence is already under contract. Its course will be in the line of the Canadian river and its purpose is to stop the drift of the northern cattle. It is a bold and splendid enterprise and will pay a large percentage on the investment. The fence will be over 500 miles long.

Three French physicians in New York have a remedy for hydrophobia which they claim as infallible, and which consists in throwing the body into such a prostration that the poison will be forced out of the system through the pores of the skin. They are so confident of its efficacy that either one of them agrees to be bitten by a mad dog and undergo treatment by his associates in order to prove its efficacy, provided a pecuniary reward is offered by the government or by individuals for the cure.

A series of tests at Bochum, Germany, to determine the values of bituminous coal in the making of steam, show that washed slack, holding 18 per cent of water and 9 per cent of ash evaporated, and 1.7 per cent of water per pound of fuel; while the same coal, with only 3 per cent of water, made from 8 to 8.5 per cent of steam. Making due allowance for moisture by reacting a standard of like quantities of coal, free from moisture, there is to be a direct loss by using wet coal of 14 per cent.

Gordon's new huge dynamo-electric machine has been tried at East Greenwich, England, and has proved a great success. It maintained 1300 Swan lamps in a state of incandescence, while but a fraction of the full power was called into exercise. The inventor believes that only with generators of electricity capable of supplying from 5000 to 10,000 incandescence lamps at least, the problem of economical electric illumination can be solved. In the meantime just tried in the United States, which the electro-magnet evolved.

A few days ago the steamer Carmona, of 3700 tons, passed through the straits of the Mississippi from New Orleans, carrying 10,381 bales of cotton, besides a large quantity of wheat, staves and miscellaneous freight, and drawing 24 feet 11 inches of water. Before the straits were built a cargo of 4400 bales was considered an extraordinary feat. In view of the fact that the Carmona and other vessels of equal size, the Southern Pacific railroad is considering the advisability of putting on a regular line of steamer of from 5,000 to 6,000 tons to run between New Orleans and Liverpool.

In a recent performance at Savoy Theatre, London, the head-dress of a fairy being with an electric star, the light shone from the electric star, and the fairy disappeared into insignificance and patronized the grandest parade of diamonds that ever was used from a mine, some lady—probably American—very elegantly appearing at one of the theaters with a head-dress of such stars. Managers might admit such visitors free for illuminating purposes.
