It is now discovered at the Foreign Office that letters of the late Minister of Foreign Affairs, James G. Blaine, to the U.S. Minister at Hawaii, have been stolen from the department. President Cleveland has been of the im-pression that Minister Blaine had instruct-ed the American Minister at Honolulu to do what he could to dethroms the Queen. The theory is advanced at the Foreign Office this morning that some person still employed in the department who was a partyfriend of Blaine's has caused the papers to be removed for the purpose of concealing the record of the policy of the Harrison party, which stood for annexation of the islands, while the Cleveland party opposes it.

opposes it. Matters are taking on a serious aspect at both the White House and Foreign Of-fice. The present administration seems to fear that, unless something is done soon, fear that, unless something is done soon, there is grave danger that an alliance may be made by the islands with either Canada or England. It is known to-day for the first time that the day before the Hawaiian Minister to this Government, Thurston, left for Honolulu, he had a long conference with the English Minister, Sir Julian Pauncefote. It is supposed the matter of a proposed protectorate from either Canada or England was fully dis-cussed.
