The recent enactment of our Town Council to prevent children from roving the streets at a late hour of the evening is undoubtedly a step in the right direction and should be carefully noted by parents and guardians, so that children under their care will not be sent out after the hour prescribed. Those who are found out contrary to the by-law may then be considered voluntary offenders and will be dealt with accordingly. It is not necessary for us to emphasize the need of such a measure. We have lately been provided with object lessons sufficiently striking to convince all that it is necessary to take some measures to restrain even children from habits a danger alike to themselves and a menace to the community.

The attention of the Monitor has been called to a thoughtless practice on the part of residents throughout some of our best country districts, that causes no little inconvenience to the pedestrian. Throughout the winter the roads are used as timber and wood yards by parties who are hauling these commodities from the woods. When the snow leaves in the Spring the sidewalks to these roads are occupied by the piles of wood or timber, as the case may be, and the pedestrian on his way to church or business, is obliged to take the middle of the muddy road. Even when the obstruction has been removed, the sidewalk has been so cut or torn that its condition renders it unfit for use till a late time in the season. These sidewalks in thickly settled communities are valuable public property, and such a monopoly by private individuals is an infringement on the public at large. The offenders in this respect are mostly landowners themselves, who might as easily pile their wood and timber on their own domain, but for some reason prefer to make use of the highway. The question of good roads is coming to the front in this province, and it will not do to be a feature of its work to provide a foot path, where possible, that will, in a measure lessen the discomforts of mud in the Spring and Autumn, and dust during the summer months. When the influence of the good roads movement reaches a practical point there will no doubt be a man or men to see that such obstructions are not placed on country sidewalks. Under present regulations it should be the duty of road-makers to prevent it. It is, however, the carelessness or indifference of a majority of our road makers that has made the good roads movement necessary.

The meeting closed with votes of appreciation thanks to church officers, members of the Mite society, the choir, and St. James' teachers for services during the past year.
