HARD ON THE CATTLE.

The severe weather in the Northwest has caused the death of a large number of valuable cattle. Reports have been received at the Agricultural Department from Fort McLeod to this effect. The snow is five feet deep and the thermometer 33 degrees below zero. There was no possibility of grazing for the stock, and prospects are disagrous for cattle on the ranges. If the ranchers could corral the cattle, then prospects might not be so bad, but the stock has drifted and the snow is so deep that the owners could not round them up. Writing again, the same official reports that during the last month the cattle suffered terribly. They had nothing to live on but brush for 17 days, and the ranchers could not hunt them up to feed them. It is estimated that fully 50 per cent. will die from starvation and exposure. In part he said: Everything points to the conclusion that these fiendish crimes were comthat these fiendish crimes were committed by an insane man. Whoever the man was, he has appeared before you in this court, but he has appeared in a far different guise than he did when he committed that crime. If you have formed any opinion as to this case, you are asked to suspend judgment until you have seen on the witness stand the defendant himself, and heard him tell the story of his innocence. The proposition which the Government is bound to prove beyond a doubt is not who killed Capt. Nash, but did Thomas Bram kill him? Brown is the Government's princ.pal witness, but did Thomas Bram kill him? BRIBERY BY AGENT PROVED.

The Judges Decline to Allow Mr Bennett to Step Down.

Saving That Corrupt Practices Might be overed Up by Allowing the Sitting ings-Mr. Horrell Proved to Have Bought the Vote of William Arthur of Victoria Harbor and Agency Ad-

Barrie, Dec. 23.-(Special.)-When the court re-opened this morning to proceed with the trial of the election petition against Mr. Bennett, it was at once apparent that the rumor of last night was about correct and that

the fight was over. Counsel on both sides proceeded to spar for an opening, endeavoring to find a reason sufficiently strong to satisfy the court that the election satisfy the court that the election should be voided, and some very clever skirmishing was indulged in all round. The court, however, reminded the counsel that the respondent could not under the statute law, as at present constructed, relinquish his seat merely on request of counsel, or by agreement, as this proceeding might effectively conceal corrupt practices of such a nature as should be investigated, and such as might disqualify the respondent.

William Arthur of Victoria Harbor was examined, and deposed that he had voted at that place on election day that on the night before, after he had gone to bed, Mr. Horrell came to the door and knocked. Witness arose and let him in and Mr. Horrell asked him to use his influence for Mr. Bennett, to which he replied by wanting to know if the candidate had sent any money down, as others in the neighborhood had got some. Horrell then extracted a couple of bills from his pocket, and, nolling them up, tossed them to him, saying, "Now you can support Mr. Bennett." Witness picked the money up after Horrell had gone and had heard nothing more from him about it.

AGENCY ADMITTED. This evidence was sufficient to prove corrupt practices, and it remained to be shown that Horrell was an agent of Mr. Bennett's, when the charge of bribery by agent would be complete. Mr. Aylesworth thereupon arose and stated to the court that he had been instructed by his client to admit agency in this case, and it was at once apparent that the trial was over.

Bribery was again proven in the case of one Burgle of Victoria Harbor, but it was uncertain whether or not Horrelf had been the agent, as witness had found the money in his pocket on election day after having talked with Horrell and several others in the village.



St. Louis, Dec. 22.—A special from Mayfield, Ky., says that at 3 o'clock this morning every man of that town and every boy who could carry a weapon was on guard there for an attack by an army of negroes, who were expected at any moment. For 48 hours news had been received at Mayfield from different points that the negroes were organizing in large bodies for the purpose of visiting the town and wreaking vengeance upon those who lynched Jim Stone on Monday morning. A Nashville, Tenn., special, dated 3.10 o'clock this morning, says the wire to Mayfield has been lost, and it would probably be impossible to obtain any more information for several hours.

Will Suet, a negro aged 18 years, was shot and killed early this morning near the railway depot. A number of guards were watching the incoming train for negro refugees. Three negroes alighted, and when ordered to halt they refused to do so. One of the deput exopened fire, and Suet fell riddled with builets.

The killing of Sust has groused the negroes to madness and they swear to wipe out the town to-nght. This morning the Town Council held an emergency meeting. All women and children were ordered to remain off the streets after 6 o'clock to-night. Hundreds of farmers came to Mayfield today, and are being armed to assist in saving the town if hostilities commence. At 3 o'clock this afternoon the citizens held a mass meeting, and organized into companies for mutual defence against the negroes.







It soon developed, however, that they were really orders from the other side. When that became apparent they became more influential. It was a coincident that the foreigners, after keeping out for a month or more came in just when they did when the financial situation should have had such a depressing effect. The buying in the pit was led by private whre houses, Milmine, Bodman and all those other firms which have closest relations with the other side. There was
