



Murdock was released from the dock, where for a short time he had sat with Pavall Stefoff, convicted murderer, and stepped forward to thank the judge.

From there he went straight to the girl, who was the complainant in the case and they shook hands, as he did a moment later with her father. He was about to leave the courtroom with his aged mother when a hawk-eyel constable noticed that he had omitted one in his round of reconciliation. He turned the lad back and he obediently yeart and shook hands with the sister of his erstwhile victim, who had also been a witness against him.




