To contemplate the Creator of these shining orbs, as our Maker and Benefactor is consolatory, but to be able to say upon a sure foundation, that he is our God, our Father, and our Friend, raises us as it were above this lower world, and the eye of faith pierces through the veil of mortality, and the glories of eternity appear to blaze upon our view, when we shall be perfectly blessed with Him in heaven.

Reader, that this be our happy privilege, may God of his mercy grant; then whether this year be our last we shall spend on earth, or our lives be prolonged, we may await the approach of the King of Terrors undismayed.

THE SOLAR SYSTEM.

What is the Solar System? An answer to this question introduces us to a spectacle of the vastest dimensions, and of the most exquisite workmanship. The great, awfully intricate, and beautiful, each inhabitant of our Globe is intimately interested in its mysterious machinery; and to procure some definite notions of it,

becomes, in some degree, the duty of each individual.

By the Solar System, we understand, a central body, with several other bodies, influenced by it, revolving round it. A lighted candle, with a few flies performing circular flights about its flame, may, for a moment, represent such a System. The centre of the Solar System is a body, whose vastness defies the imagination; and the specks which spin around it are mighty spheres,-Worlds, and their attendant Moons. The great Globe which we inhabit-with all its mountains, continents, and oceans,-with the forests, hills, ships, and castles, which like small dust mark its surface,-large though it is, even to bewilderment-is but equal to one thousandth part of the bulk of the centre of the Solar System: Ten thousand masses, each equal to our earth, would scarcely make a body equal to the Sun! This stupendous body dispenses light and heat through a vast space; and philosophers suppose, that itself is an intensely bright, hot, mass. It is situated, in the boundless fields of space, so far from our Earth, that to us it appears not much larger than a cannon ball. Around this incomprehensibly vast and brilliant body, seven mighty spheres revolve, the paths which they travel in their revolutions being called their orbits. Some of those, mystically supported and impelled, spheres, have attendant orbs, which revolve around them as they do around the Sun; these are called Moons; the spheres which they attend are named Planets. All of them, Planets and Moons, are kept in their orbits, and their inconceivably rapid, compound, motions are supported, by some amazing powers; powers understood only by their Maker, and, perhaps, by the angels who witnessed their creation, and, we may hope, by the spirits of just men made perfect. Thus this stupendous machinery works, noiselessly, regularly, without signs of decay; a continued miracle on the grandest scale; a rapture-demanding production of him who clothes the lillies of the valley in beauty. Each of those vast planets is enlightened and warmed by the Sun, and reflects his rays. When seen thus illuminated twinkling in the fields of ether, men call them stars, gems, lamps, forgetful of their vast sizes, and fearful motions; of the continued supervision which is necessary for their preservation; and of the ease by which he who made them could let them all run to destructive confusion, by merely withholding or withdrawing the secret influences which retain them in their places. The other small specks which mark, what we call, the heavens, are supposed to be other suns, and centres of other systems. The planets are distinguished by certain names. however, consists in the inconceivably great distance of 37 millions of miles) is called Mercury ; the next is named Venus ; the next, Earth; the fourth in order, Mars; the fifth, Jupiter; the sixth, Saturn; and the seventh is called Goergium, having been so designated by its discoverer, in honour of a King of Great Britain. Beside these there are four small planets, or parts of some former planet, called asteroids, which appear between Mars and Jupiter. Five of the planets, we perceive, are distinguished by the names of fabled personages, which only had existence in the imagination of an idolatrous nation ; one is simply named after one of the materials which compose it; and one has the name which, even in this generation, belonged to the venerated ruler of some Atlantic Is-Thus men-creatures a few feet high, whose existence is a span, and who spring up and are cut down like flowers-attach names, familiar to their puny race, to the spheres, whose sizes, motions, and courses, remind of Infinitude and Eternity. Yet is man, in giving the stars names, and such names, too aspiring, too presuming? Vast as are the orbs of heaven, stupendous as are the phenomena which they include, the exquisite frame which his soul inhabits is not less a miracle, in its mystical beauty, than is Saturn with its moons and rings. And the soul of the pigmy ! who will tell its worth? The memory, the imagination, the judgment, the ingenuity, which compose this spirit, in their god-like powers, laugh planets and suns to scorn. Everlasting in its nature, -when the orbs of heaven shall pass away with a great noise, the soul may be full of sublime peace and joy, -without fear of change or decay, exulting in the visible presence of the Deity, who will be the only Sun of that incorruptible World.

ECLIPSES.

In the Year 1836 there will be Four Ecr. PRES—two of the Sun, and two of the Moon; but one only of each will be visible at Halifax.

FIRST.—On Sunday, May 1st, the Moon will be partially eclipsed, (as follows) and visible here.

4 1-5 digits eclipsed on the Moon's Southern Limb, inclining a little to the West. Duration of the Eclipse, 2h. 4'. Moon sets 4h. 51'—just as the eclipse is going off. The Moon will first touch and enter the Earth's shadow on her south east side, and will be last in contact on her south west limb.

SECOND.—The Sun will be partially eclipsed and visible, on Sunday, May 15th—

The Moon will first touch the Sun's disc on his south western limb, and finally leave on his eastern limb, a little inclining to the northward.

In the North of England and Ireland this Eclipse will be central and annular. It will traverse the Atlantic Ocean, the Islands of Cuba and Jamaica, and Guatimala, just above the Isthmus of Darien.

THIRD.—On Monday, October 24th, the Moon will be partially eclipsed, but invisible here, as it will commence just as the Moon sets, and while the Sun is about rising in the opposite point of the heavens. The Eclipse, where visible, will be very small, not being one-tenth the part or her disc.

FOURTH.—A total Eclipse of the Sun will take place on Tuesday, November 8th, but invisible at Halifax or in the northern hemisphere. It commences at 6h. 40' in the evening

This Eclipse will traverse round the South Pole, and the only land that the line of central contact crosses, is a small part of the south west of the large Island of New Holland. A partial eclipse will be visible to part of the Chinese Empire, the Islands in the Chinese Sea, and the Islands composing New Zealand.

OCCULTATIONS.—There will be no occultations of the Moon and any of the Planets visible in this Latitude; several happen with Saturn and the Moon, but only visible in the Southern Hemisphere.

This Table shews how much faster or slower than the Sun a clock ought to be to indicate true mean time.

It is adapted to the meridian of Greenwich and requires a correction for any other meridian, being a proportional of the daily difference according to the Longitude being east or west of Greenwich.

DIP PARALLAX, SEMI-DIAMETER AND REFRACTION, For taking the Sun's Altitude, in order to obtain the Latitude

The arguments of this Table, are the height of the observer's eye above the sea, on the top; and the observed altitude of the sun on the left hand side. This correction is to be added to the observed altitude of the sun's lower limb, to find the true altitude. The monthly correction at the bottom, being the variation of the sun's semi-diameter is to be applied to the above correction, according to the sign of addition or subtraction.

To correct Altitudes observed on Land with an Artificial Horizon, the numbers under 16 feet must be increased by 4', and then applying the sum or the remainder, according to the title, to the Altitude observed, the result will be the true Altitude.

On July 24th, 1835, the sun's meridian altitude was observed to be 79° 44' 15", the zenith being north of the sun, altitude of the observer's eye 24 feet, in longitude by account 54° west required

On the RIGHT HAND PAGE—1st, the Days of the Month; 2d, the Days of the Week; 3d, the Situation of the Planets, Holidays, Sundays and Weather; 4th, the Moon's Rising; 5th, the Moon's Southing; 6th, the Moon's Setting; 7th, the Moon's Place; 8th, High Water at Halifax.

N. B. Alf Calculations are in Mean Time, except the Sun's rising and setting, which are given in apparent time.

The effect of refraction will cause both the Sun and the Moon to appear three or four minutes earlier at rising, and later at setting, than what is given in the pages.

HORTICULTURAL INFORMATION.

A horticulturist remarks, that applying fresh ashes about the roots of Pear trees, [about a bushel and half each, yearly] in the fall and winter, has caused the fruit to assume a new colour, and to become much larger.

VINES have been found unproductive from the following reasons: having flowers of only one sex, or the flower forming a basin which retains water and destroys the proper functions. The remedy is, grafting from a free-bearing vine, or the entire removal of the plant.

SUMMER MANAGEMENT OF VINES.—Keep the ground free from weeds, secure the Vines and spread them so as to admit sun and air, cut away the shoots which are unpromising.

QUINCE TREES.—Put coal dust, renewed once in about two years, about the stems. Manure, around them, occasions injury by worms and grubs.

Wood ashes is an excellent medium for preserving fruits and seeds. Lay the fruit in layers, on layers of ashes.

RHUBURB PLANT.—Do not allow the Plant to seed. Seeding has an exhausting effect on Plant and soil. The same of other Plants.

To procure good seed for Radishes.—Sow radish seed late in July, pack them in dry sand and place them in a cellar, next spring set them out, and gather the seed when ripe. Seed obtained the same season it is sown, will produce bad radishes, and worse seed.

TAPPING MAPLE.—Bore the root with 1 inch auger, and insert a crooked tube. This mode yields more than the common mode and is not so injurious to the tree.

Manure for Grapes and Asparagus.—For Grapes, coal dust cinders, and iron scales from blacksmith's forge, mixed with fine garden mould. For asparagus, finely pulverized oyster shells, mixed with the earth, or dug in about the roots of old beds, has an excellent effect.

WHEAT.-To prevent smut, select clean plump seed, pass it through water in a tub, washing and skimming off the floating matter, empty it into a basket to drain, lay it on a clean floor and rake in 2 quarts of slacked lime and one quart of plaster to the bushel of grain, stir it till all is covered with lime and plaster, let it remain in heap for one day, swead it and dry it daily, when quite dry it is fit for sowing .- You may sow tho' the land be wet.

Be careful in choosing good seed if you wish good crops.

RURAL ECONOMY.

POULTRY.-Let the poultry yard be large, and in a dry situation, well and high fenced, and of a southern Appropriate a part of the yard to gravel, lime from old bricks, clean shells &c. Keep the poultry house clean; this will tend to keep the hens from wandering, make them thrive and lay better, and will supply excellent garden manure.

TO RESTORE THE GERMINATING POWER OF SEED .-Steep it in a solution of oxygenated muratic acid, at a temperature of 46 or 48 Fahrenhirt. If any principle of vitality remain, the seed will germinate in a few hours, and will grow if planted in its proper situation as if it had evinced no torpidity.

TO PREVENT HORSES BEING TEASED BY FLIES. Take two or three handfuls of walnut leaves, upon which, pour two or three quarts of cold water, let it infuse one night, and pour the whole next morning into a kettle, and let it boil for a quarter of an hour: -when cold it will be fit for use. No more is required than to moisten a sponge, and before the horse goes out of the stable, let those parts which are most irritable be smeared over with the liquor, viz. between and upon the ears, the neck, the
