consequent inability to dispose of city bonds in payment for work done by them and who subsequently sold them in the bond market below par, has caused a slump in the sale of city bonds directly to the public, a method devised by the comptroller when the financial institutions failed to absorb the issues. The result is that one of the richest cities in the world, as far as cash is concerned, for the first time in the memory of living man. It is stated that there is about \$1,000,000 on hand to meet nearly \$4,000,000 of pressing obligations. Contractors who have long waited for their money threaten to quit work on public improvements, and the situation in this respect is said to be serious. Another result of the shortage in cash is that the new contracts except for absolutely necessary work are held up pending an easement in the situation. Unless the bonds find a market, however, there can be no relief until October, when the taxes are due.







HORRIBLE ACCIDENT

William O'Brien of Bathurst Had His Arm Torn Off in a Saw Mill

Moncton, N. B., Aug. 16-A shocking accident occurred at Beresford, near Bathurst, this morning, by which William O'Brien, of Bathurst, lost an arm but saved his life, by his great nerve and strength. O'Brien was working in his saw ill when his right arm was caught by a

mill when his right arm was caught by a belt. Quickly the arm was drawn around a pulley and there seemed no possible way of O'Brien saving his life with the deadly machinery drawing him to certain death. O'Brien, who is a powerful man, resisted with all his strength with the result that he saved his life at the expense of his right arm, which was literally torn from its socket at the shoulder.

The remarkable nerve displayed by O'Brien was wonderful. At Beresford he was able to walk aboard the train and alighted from the train at Bathurst without assistance, although in greatest agony. 



THE ZION CITY LACE FACTORY Indigestion

Marshall Field & Co. Purchased It for \$377,300.

After a good deal of controversy, the lace factory in Zion City, In the city founded by the late John Alexander Dowie, has been sold as a going concern to the well-known Chicago firm of Marshall Field & Co., for the sum of \$377,300. Many of the citizens were opposed to the sale; but it was generally felt that under the circumstances it was the best course. The total mortgage indebtedness of the city and its institutions amounted to a little over half a million dollars, and some of the claims, particularly a large one secured by the lace factory itself, had become very pressing. With over a third of a million dollars to be paid at once by Marshall Field & Co. all the pressing claims can be disposed of, and the remaining indebtedness can be secured at extremely low interest. Another consideration is that Marshall Field & Co. will inside a year probably be employing in the neighborhood of fifteen hundred people in the factory, instead of only three hundred, as at present.

The "Zion City News" in making the

The 'Zion City News,' in making the above announcement, says it is understood Marshall Field & Co. have signified their intention to maintain every provision in the present lease, and to co-operate with the city in every way to keep it a clean, Christian community. It adds: Intolerance, either ecclesiastical or political, is at an end in this city. The town is located in the United States of America, and there it will remain. The idea that the church and state (or rather estate) are one and inseparable, which has not been a fact for the past year or more, is not necessary to the prosperity or spiritual well-being of Zion City.

Wilbur Voliva, Dowie's successor, says the sale of the lace factory means the doom of Zion City as an institutional and distinct city, the only one of its kind in the world. As a result he will now lay plans for the establishment of a colony strictly agricultural, and will maintain his present headquarters only so long as necessary. He refused either to confirm or deny the report that the first colony will be at Las Vegas, New Mexico.



Lemonade with Rind—Squeeze out all the juice from six lemons and set it aside, then remove every bit of white portion from the rinds. Now pour a quart of hot sugar-and-water syrup over the yellow rinds and let it stand until cold. If the flavor be desired less strong, use less of the rind, or have the syrup cold before pouring it over. Ad the Iemon juice to two quarts of water and mix with the cold syrup. All fruit juice, except, perhaps, that of pineapple, currant and grape, is more agreeable if uncooked. Let the lemonade stand in a closed jar two hours before serving.

Currantade.—Crush one quart of red currants and half a pint of raspberries, and three-fourths a pint of sugar to each pint of juice.
