The total assessment is \$62,727,630, an increase over 1904 of \$14,512,630.

The population which is rapidly increasing, is placed at 100,000, and although for the past few years there has been a scarcity of dwellings to comfortably house the population, still with the large number of residences, apartment blocks, and hotels that have been erected during the year, the situation has been very much relieved, and today there are houses open for rental for the first time in several years. The value of building permits taken out during 1905 has been beyond all expectations, amounting to \$10,829,000, an increase compared with 1904 of over \$1,000,000, and the indications for 1906 are that it will again be quite as great.

MASON DID TIME BEFORE FOR SHOOTING WOMAN

L'Etang Prisoner Shot Grand Manan Girl and Went to Prison for It-Sorry He Hit Holland, But Would Not Care for Penalty if He Had Shot Mrs. Garnett—Sent Up for Trial at St. Andrews on February 27—Case Recalls Murder of Thirty Years Ago.

St. Andrews, N. B., Feb. 12—(Special)—
It developed today that William H. Mason, arrested in connection with the shooting at L'Etang on Saturday night, spent some time in the penitentiary at Thomaston (Me.), for wounding with a revolver shot a girl named Griffin, of Grand Manan, who had rejected his advances.

This lends an added interest to the present case, for the story of the shooting in the past is somewhat similar to this last offence for which he is once more in the custody of the law.

At the time he shot Miss Griffin both were working in a canning factory at Lubec. When he found that she did not welcome his attentions, he fired upon her, then turned the weapon upon himself. Both were wounded, and the result of his conduct was a term in jail at Thomaston (Me.)

St. George, N. B., Feb. 12—(Special)—Before Justice Martin McGowan today, and in the presence of a gathering which filled the court room, Wml H. Mason, who, on Saturday night, shot Daniel Holland and the five-year-old sor of Mrs. Mary Garnett, was sent up for trial. This afternoon he was taken by Town Marshall McAdam to St. Andrews, there to await the opening of the court.

Mason, it now transpires, was formerly a New Brunswicker. The family removed from Brocklyn to New Brunswick, and settled up the St. John river, and Mason was born there. But of late he has been residing in North Lubec (Me.)

At the preliminary examination today, evidence was given by Marshall McAdam, Daniel Holland, Mrs. Garnett and Dr. Taylor. Holland appeared in court with his head in bandages. The five-year-old child, who was also shot, was in court with his mother. The testimony was in line with the story published in The Telegraph.

He was brought here today from St. George to await trial. He was handcuffed, and in charge of Marshall Maddam, but he made no troubile. The trial will commence Feb. 27, and the charge is attempting to kill cocupants of Daniel Holland's hossefold.

In discussing the matter with the marshall Macon again expressed regret that he had wounded Daniel Holland. It is reported that when he ascertained whom he had shot, he assisted in trying to tataunch the flow of blood from Holland's Wounds.

He asked Marshall Maddam what the genalty for murder is on this side of the woundn't have cared had he only shot the woman. 


