TRAIN HELD UP AND LOOTED

Boat Robber Stopped Golden State Ltd. and Robbed the Passengers.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., Nov. 9.—The operator at the Chicago and Alton Railroad station here reports that the Golden State Limited passenger train east-bound, on that road, was held up and robbed in the middle of Glasgow, about 2:30 o'clock this morning. The bandits went through the sleeping cars robbing the occupants, their chairs and day coaches by the conductor of the train who locked the doors. No one was injured, and the cars were not damaged. It is not known how many booty was obtained, nor how many men were concerned in the hold-up. The robbers jumped off the train and escaped in the darkness.

PHILIPPINE ASSEMBLY

The First Election in Philippine Islands Will Be Held July 1, Next if Natives Behave.

MANILA, Nov. 9.—According to the proposed election law the coming Philippine assembly will consist of 81 members representing each one a population of 90,000. The election of members of the assembly is to be held July 1, 1907, and the assembly is to convene within 90 days after election. The Philippine commission will submit the proposed law to public discussion after November 23. The election must be ordered by the president after March 7, 1907, the expiration of the two years of peace provided in the act of congress. If there is an insurrection before then it will be necessary to wait two years. The proposed law was decided upon after much discussion, participated in by representatives and leading Philippine, provincial governors and others. The Filipinos are generally pleased with the proposed law which is based on election laws of New York, Massachusetts and California.

LEAD PENCILS GOING UP

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—The wholesale rate on all lead pencils costing \$3.00 or less a gross has gone up, according to announcements now being sent to stationers by domestic manufacturers, from 5 to 25 cents a gross. New price lists of some lines of foreign pencils are also being sent to dealers. The reason for the advance is the higher cost of labor and material.

NUN ON TRIAL WILL REBUILD UNION STREET

Charge Being Reheard After Three Years--Since Trial It Has Been Shown That Accuser Was a Liar and Mentally Deficient.

BERLIN, Nov. 9.—Freudina von Heuser, a Bavarian noble family, who was lady superior of the convent of St. Maximilian, near Berlin, is standing for a second time on trial on a charge of attempting to murder her servant, Minna Wagner. The first trial concluded on March 9, 1902, when Heuser was found guilty of attempting to murder Minna Wagner by poison, and sentenced to six years' penal servitude. After serving three and a half years of this term great doubt has arisen regarding the woman's guilt. Fresh evidence which has been collected shows that Minna Wagner was herself the principal culprit at the last trial, was hysterical, mentally deficient, an habitual liar, and altogether a weak witness, whose testimony ought never to have been regarded as sufficient to condemn the prisoner.

Says the Victoria Colonist: "It is proposed in Seattle to erect a monument to William H. Goward. No man deserves one more, and no city in the world has more cause to recognize him than Seattle. If it had not been for him, Alaska would not have come into the possession of the United States, and even his influence was almost unequal to the task of convincing the senate that country that the purchase of the Territory for \$7,200,000 was a good piece of business."

Toucheing the gas question as it affects the city of Montreal, the Witness of that city says: "Alderman Gedbois and L. A. Lapointe deserve our thanks, the one for refusing to sign a scandalous and artfully intended report, the other for championing a public demand for the appointment of a royal commission to investigate the Montreal Light, Heat & Power Company and all its works, with a view to finding out the cost of gas and electricity, and either abrogating, modifying, or annulling the company's charter."

When the citizens of Moncton threatened to provide a telephone service of their own, because of the arrogance of the company holding a monopoly of the business, the latter sent in haste its general manager to confer with the mayor and president of the board of trade. As a result, an agent of the company to whose methods exception had been taken has been sent elsewhere, and the town has set a good example.

Although Bryan endorsed Hearst, the defeat of the latter, the Boston Post believes, makes Bryan once more the most conspicuous figure in the Democratic ranks. "It is yet a far cry," says the Post, "to the presidential convention of 1908, but the dominating personality today, made such by the elections of 1906, is that of William Jennings Bryan."

The value of new buildings for which permits have been taken out in Winnipeg this year is estimated to be \$11,700,000, but to this the building inspector says 10 per cent. should be added, making almost \$13,000,000 in all. This is a remarkable record.

DR. J. W. DANIEL ON THE MILK SUPPLY AND ITS CONTROL

In the course of a paper read by Dr. J. W. Daniel before the St. John Medical Society, on Wednesday evening, on "The Milk Supply and Its Control," the speaker read the regulations which the St. John board had adopted for the sale of milk in this city, and which have before been published, and said: "We are only at the commencement of this crusade, and we have not got as far as we have without a great deal of work, a great deal of tact, and a great deal of firmness. It is always difficult to inaugurate a new system in health matters, in bringing people under regulation who had hitherto been a law to themselves, but by tact and firmness I think the dealers themselves are recognizing the necessity of the care insisted on. This has been the more easy of accomplishment since finding an epidemic of typhoid followed the rounds of one dealer; we were able to demonstrate the presence of typhoid bacilli in a portion of his milk, and thus give the dealers an argument they could not resist."

One of our greatest difficulties was in getting the dealers to carry out section seventeen, which requires the milk cans to be cleaned and sterilized before they are returned to the farms, they perhaps not unreasonably thinking that this should be done by the farmers. They have, however, acquiesced in this very necessary regulation and are carrying it out. The whole subject is one of the utmost importance and if people generally will take an interest in it, and insist on getting clean milk, having the proper proportion of butter fat, I believe they will get it, and the dealer who supplies the best milk will get the best price."

TIMES HAVE IMPROVED

Rev. Dr. MacGillivray Says There Was No Restriction to Political Corruption Forty Years Ago.

KINGSTON, Ont., Nov. 8.—The Rev. Dr. MacGillivray, D. D., of Chalmers church does not consider we have fallen upon evil days. In a sermon, speaking on political corruption, he said forty years ago there was no restriction to bribery. The voting at this time was open, and lasted for two days, and all the votes were allowed to be open, and some of the voters became so much under the influence of liquor that they did not know who they were voting for, and both parties would be after their votes.

"It was a shocking carnival from nine o'clock to the morning, and five o'clock of the second day," said the preacher. "It was a most deplorable condition. At an election now you will hardly see a drunk man, and what bribery is done now is done quietly. We have grown since those times, and when trouble breaks out like that in London or New York, we are shocked, and rightly so. At an election now the hotels are closed and before they had liquor in public and drunk out of a dipper. Are not things better now?"

"We have many rents and flaws in our life that need repairing, but we have much to be thankful for. We should pray God to stop our backsliding and to draw together the edges of these rents in our characters and keep us more faithful."

APPLY THIS TO HALIFAX

(Montreal Witness). George Hannab, of the Allan line, says that a fast steamship service to Halifax all the year round would not pay. He declares, and that is the general experience, that the travelling public is very much averse to long rail journeys; that he had found among those who used the Allan line steamers there was a desire to remain on board until they reached Montreal. Mr. Thon, of the Dominion line, has expressed similar views, and should indicate to the government that the money it is said to contemplate spending at Quebec may be of little service to that city. These steamship experts have declared that the traffic will not go there, but to Montreal, which should be a great incentive to Mr. Brodeur further to deepen the ship channel with all speed. If it is cheaper to carry freight by water, and if, as the Canadian Pacific official quoted says, none of that line's first class steamship passengers have any desire to stop off at Quebec and take train to Montreal, then surely the best use of money for the nation's commerce will be in developing the channel with which nature has so grandly endowed our country. We presume the statement with regard to first class passengers applies equally to all passengers who are not as stigmatized "roustes" by their tickets. We may take this remark as evidence that just as soon as the channel is deepened the Empress steamers will come to Montreal.

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CANADA'S STRUGGLE AGAINST CORRUPTION; WHAT THE LAW PROVIDES

(Mail and Empire.) "Cured is the man who's bought and sold, And barters liberty for gold; For if election is not free, In vain we seek for liberty; And he who would sell his single right Would sell this country if he might."

It is important to know, in view of the confusion that prevails, where we are on this subject, so that a reasonable remedy may be devised. The truth is that we have a large body of law prohibiting corruption, and aiming at the punishment of those who practise it. Our first Act of Parliament, and if one election is found to have been corrupt, the election proceeding it may be quashed. The Commission is required to report its discoveries to parliament, and to name persons who are found guilty of corrupt practices. The persons so named shall be proceeded against by the attorney-general for Canada, and after trial the usual penalties shall be prescribed. These are imprisonment and disfranchisement. Another law dealing with this question was one passed in 1894 on the initiative of Mr. Weldon, the former member for Albert, N. B.

The Weldon Act aims at the disfranchisement of the corrupt element by a simple process. When there has been bribery in a constituency, and the matter has not been brought before the notice of the courts in an election trial, five electors may petition the tribunal which tries election cases, setting forth that there has been bribery and asking for action. A judge is then to be detailed by the Election Court to hear the cases. If electors are found guilty of receiving bribes they are disfranchised for a term of seven years. It is clear from this summary of our legislation that there is plenty of law to put down corruption, and that what seems to be needed is some way to make the law effective. One statute does not seem to be active operation unless there is an election trial, or unless private individuals sue for penalties. Another is dead letter unless there is a report from the judges, and a third rests upon the action of the people of the locality concerned.

ACTIVITY NEEDED. The situation calls for some means by which the wrong of corruption can be fought as an other violation of the law is, namely, by the action of the prosecuting authorities. This brings us to the proposal of Mr. Dorden that there shall be an official with freedom such as that given to the Auditor-General to enforce the law, regardless of the action of the parties who have been engaged in the contest. This appears to be the only solution of the difficulty

IN THE WORDS OF SPORT

BALL PLAYERS HAVE NARROW ESCAPES ON THE RAILWAYS

The clubs of the big league travel approximately 300,000 miles a year during the training and playing seasons, and the wonder is that one seldom hears of a base ball club being in a railway accident.

"Where were you during the wreck?" asked another.

AGRICULTURE THE TRUE SOURCE OF OUR WEALTH

Under the above heading a recent number of the "Scientific American" discusses the problem of the food supply that will be required for the vastly increased population that will probably occupy this northern continent before the present century has half run its course.

The present tendency to regard manufacturing and trade as the only forms of progressive activity, and the false notion that riches can be built upon these at the expense of the agricultural resources, is at the same time of checking that deplorable migration from the country to the city, which has lowered the whole body of persons engaged in general occupations in the United States from 44.3 in 1880 to 35.7 in 1900.

This is sound political economy and it needs to be urged in Canada as well as in the United States. The latter's abundance of agricultural resources has tended on this continent to turn men's minds to the development of less strenuous industries at the expense of these.

It is a sad fact that the agricultural industry has been taxed and checked and burdened the natural unimpaired supply of wealth to produce artificial and artificial wealth to produce artificial wealth.

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EFFORTS STILL BEING MADE TO RESCUE WRECKED SAILORS

Heavy Seas Make it Difficult to Reach the Ill-Fated Vessels. --What is Being Done at Richibucto and the P. E. Island Coast.

Richibucto, N. B., Nov. 8.—Much indignation is beginning to be expressed here at the lack of any life saving apparatus at the lighthouse stations facing the Richibucto bar, where the wreck of the Norwegian bark Adona occurred, resulting, it is now confidently believed, in the loss of the entire ship's company, consisting of eleven men.

The Adona carried a crew of twelve, but a little faster than away from the ship the night before she went into the harbor, thus escaping the fate of his comrades.

At the funeral service of the two sailors whose bodies have been recovered, which took place this afternoon, Rev. J. R. Manning, minister of the Baptist church, in an interview with your correspondent, referred to the report that the life of one of the men might have been saved had the lighthouse keeper been competent to render first aid.

He thought an investigation into all the circumstances should be demanded by the people of the province, and that the government should be held responsible for the wreck since yesterday. The gale last evening brought the bark nearer shore, but there is no sign of life on board.

A raft has been washed up, which has been identified by the stevedores as made of deals from the Adona, but no other bodies have been recovered. The weather is moderating, and it may be possible to board the vessel tomorrow, when the mystery which surrounds the fate of nine of the men may be further cleared up.

John Kelly, St. John, inspector of light stations, arrived in town yesterday, and this morning visited the scene of the wreck for the purpose of forwarding a report to F. J. Harding in St. John.

Jude Robitson, one of the light keepers, told your correspondent that he had not been on shore for eleven days in his anxiety to help the poor fellows on the wreck. He had been at the work his entire life, and the storm was the worst he had ever known. Joseph Richard, his companion, who tends the light-house, is a man further down the channel, and the men leave the wreck and of their subsequent struggle in the water.

Owing to the mist he was unable to count them. He said it was his belief that all made the venture and that all perished. He added that four sailors had been rescued.

Owing to some differences in the church respecting church affairs, Mr. Whitehouse tendered his resignation, but was prevailed upon by the Christian Brotherhood to remain here for a few days.

BRITISH COLUMBIA WANT NO HINDOOS. Ottawa, Nov. 8.—There are some 800 more Hindoos on their way to British Columbia. Already strong protests have been received from that province against the arrivals of this class who are not wanted, who will never assimilate with the people and who will become a charge on the community.
