

THE FIRST STEP FORWARD

THE question of nationalization of the Port of Saint John, which has been a live topic, not only here but throughout Canada during the last few months, is now actively on the carpet. The Common Council has taken a step which will bring covering the question, to be presented at the next session of the Federal Parliament. This move should have the hearty commendation of all the people to be one that should fill all requirements.

The Mayor, in bringing the subject before cannot be eliminated from his calculations. Council, pointed out that the Duncan report was said to favor nationalization; that the President of the Canadian National Railways was in accord with the scheme, and that the head of the Canadian Pacific also endorsed it, provided the interests of his company were safeguarded. Others concerned in the oposal are the people of Canada, as represented by the Federal Government, and the citizens of Saint John, with the Common Council as the guardian of their interests. If representatives of all these parties can be brought together, some definite decision

doubtless can be reached. No matter what subjects are discussed, however, the principal consideration should be to keep the port charges so low that the harbor will have no difficulty in competing with the other Atlantic outlets. This is essential. All other arrangements would fall by the wayside, if this primary requisite were neglected. Also it should be definitely assured that the Canadian National Railway would make the fullest possible use of the port for its export traffic. Otherwise the national aspect of the whole undertaking would be lost or sadly overshadowed. The C. P. BRIGHTER PORT PROSPECTS

COINCIDEN UAL, with a statement by Mr. Frank M. Ross, general manager of the Saint John Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Company, to the effect that Saint John is likely to enjoy a greatly increased freight traffic this winter, comes an announcement from an official of the Board of Grain Commissioners at Fort William which tends to hear out his prediction. According to both statements, grain movements from Canada during the present season have been greatly curtailed owing to tramp tonnage being diverted to the coal traffic following the tie-up in Great Britain. Montreal is reported to be about 20,000,000 bushels behind its grain shipments of last year, and it is safe to assume that the other summer ports have been affected proportionately. Should the British mine strike be really settled, the tramp tonnage now engaged in the transport of coal will be released for the additional grain carriage which will be offering from Atlantic winter ports. This undoubtedly will prove of immense benefit to Saint

According to the statistician of the Board of Grain Commissioners, the situation is expected to result in a large movement via Buffalo. He points out, however, that, as the capacity of the elevators handling Canadian grain is not large, the rate of movement from the seaboard will determine the quantity which can be shipped through that terminal before the Great Lakes' season of navigation closes. He adds that a large volume of grain would probably be held aftoat there and at

Georgian Bay ports during the winter. If the tonnage be available at Saint John and Halifax there is no reason why the Canadian grain should not be moved through those ports rather than let it lie in vessels all the winter in the Great Lakes. This is a matter which those who have the interests of the Canadian ports at heart

At all events, the prospects for a busy season at Saint John is now practically assured.





Tears Used to Be the Cowardly But Most Effective Feminine Weapon Used in the Battle of the Sexes-Nowadays Women Work for What They Want and Use Their Handkerchiefs for Ornaments Only.

AVE you noticed that tears have gone out of fashion and that women weep less than they used to? Heaven knows, it is not because there is any less for them to cry over. There has been no diminution of the sorrows that tear at women's hearts. There is still death and sickness and suffering and anxiety and loss and poverty. There are still wayward children and unfaithful husbands.



YET this was not always the case. In former days it was considered an elegant feminine accomplishment for a woman to be a free weeper. The heroines in all of the old-fashioned nowels are described as having water always standing in their eyes—violets drenched in dew—and would burst into tears at the crook of a finger. Those of us who are middle-aged can finger. Those of us who are middle-aged can who wisited our mothers, who were marathon long-distance weepers, who had never "got over" some misfortune that had befallen them thirty or forty years before and who must, upon conservative estimate, have literally shed barrels of tears.

THERE are no such figures of woe now. Women have so thoroughly wiped their eyes that it is almost as startling a thing to see a woman cry as it is to see a man. I often wonder why.

IS IT because women have become less emotional? Is it because there is no really reliable waterproof mascara and rouge? No complexion that doesn' damage in a flood? Is it because men have become so hard-boiled that they are impervious to tears? Or is it because women have got strong crough to fight for what they want instead of sitting down and crying

TIME was when the shortest and most direct route to a woman's TIME was when the shortest and most direct route to a woman's desires was always by water. All she had to do was to turn on the hydrant and engulf some man in a torrent of tears, and he melted down into a spineless mush before her. Many a man has married the woman he didn't want to marry because he couldn't withstand her tears when she wept for him. Many a husband and father has dried the eyes of his wife and daughters on cars and jewels and trips to Europe that he couldn't afford; but he was willing to do anything rather than perish in the sea of brine into which they olumped him.

OF COURSE, the efficacy of tears has depended to a large degree upon the ability of the crier to weep without getting red in the face and having her nose swell. Also upon whether the weeper pulled the cry-baby line before marriage or after, for it is sadly true that the man who will invite his sweetheart to weep upon the second button of his waistcoat before marriage will tell his wife after marriage not to act like a fool when

Still and all, tears have been a valuable weapon to women in fighting the battle of the sexes. They have not only proved a potent source of revenue but they have been a tower of refuge to which a woman could flee when she was trying to hold an untenable position in a domestic debate or when she was attempting to excuse some undefendable act.

N SUCH an emergency all that a woman had to do was to burst into tears and the incident was closed, for you can't argue with tears nor is there anything that a man who isn't a perfect brute can say to his poor little weeping wife but: "There, there now. Don't cry." No matter what she has done.

TT IS the women who can weep who can literally get away with murder and be acquitted by men jurors who couldn't withstand their tears, and who in domestic circles henpeck their husbands out of their lives. A little two-by-four wife who can throw a fit of hysterics can make a giant of a husband tremble before her and walk on eggs for fear of riling her.

TEARS have always been the only feminine weapon of which men were afraid, but they have always been a coward's weapon, and so it shows how immeasurably the morale of women has improved that women have thrown them into the discard and that they no longer play upon man's sympathies and his tenderness in order to bamboozle and browbeat him.

And it shows how women have grown in strength that now they roll up their sleeves and go after what they want, instead of howling for it.

THE woman who lost her fortune in former days became thereafter a geyser of tears who spattered over everybody in her vicinity and took all of the starch out of the pleasure in their own possessions. Nowadays, she realizes that no one wants a damp, moist, unpleasant body around them, so she sheds never a tear that is in evidence, but goes to work and the world. makes good and turns a smiling face on the world.

And what a fine, brave attitude toward life it shows for the woman

who has had some great sorrow to hide her grief in her own heart and to refuse to sadden all who come in contact with her by making herself a





"In the first place," continued Dr. Pidgeon, "always act as a member of society and never perform a private action that you could not wish everyone else to pattern after to the benefit of society as a whole. No citizen seems vorthy to the democratic heritage to which he has fallen unless every action he performs is an expression of his highest ideals of right and feelings of good will towards all mankind." "In the second place," said Dr. Pidgeon, "each citizen should labor carnestly to embody his private conceptions of right in everything that re-presents the public life. 





BY GEORGE HAMBLETON LONDON, Nov. 15-When the Imperial Conference discussed Empire defence today there was an unexpected development.

COTTON BALE NOW IS HELD AS HEIRLOOM

Originally Kept For Market Rise Has Been in Family For 57 Years

CHIPLEY, Ga., Nov. 15-A bale of cotton almost 57 years old, is owned here by heirs of Christopher Columbus Jones, who in September 1870 had the bale ginned and then held it year after year for the price he had resolved to get for it-22 1-2 cents per pound. Planter Jones sold his other cotton but obdurately held to his bale on which he placed a price of \$132.07 1-2 for its original 587 pounds. Eventually the "resolution bale" became a family pet, so to speak, and its sentimental value was such that in recent years when cotton soared to its 45c a pound peak, no offers were entertained. Ginned in the old fashioned way, the cotton remains in what is left of the original bagging and ties and its quality has not deteriorated. Experts have graded the lint as "No. 2" and reported that the fibre pulls one and one-sixteenth inches. The heirs have agreed that the bale never should be sold.







FRENCH FRANC STILL RISES.

MONTREAL, Nov. 15—The persistent strength of the French franc during the past few months has been the outstanding feature of the foreign exchange markets. Yesterday it-closed at 3.36, showing a net rise of 143 points from the low-level of the year, reached on July 20. The drastic deflationary measures instituted by Poincare are believed to be behind the rise of the franc, but the return of French capital and the consequent demand for French currency is also an important factor. It is believed that if this latter movement gains further momentum the advance of the france is likely to become a sting affair.







The opening of the lobster fishing season yesterday was marked by a sad fatality when Charles Oliver O'Dell, of Lorneville, lost his life while hauling in his traps off the East Head lighthouse, near Musquash, in the Bay of Fundy, as he and two companions were thrown into the rough sea by a comber which capsized their fishing

It was only the quick action of Joseph Galbraith, lighthouse keeper, who witnessed the accident, that prevented further loss of life. The sea was very rough along the coast when Mr. O'Dell with his two brothers-in-law, Andrew and Thomas Galbraith, also of Lorne-ville, set out in their boat yesterday

At 11.45 o'clock the fishermen started to pull in their traps and as the boat was slightly listed to one side a large sea struck the boat and turned it over, throwing the men into the water.

STRUCK ON HEAD

As the boat turned, Mr. O'Dell was struck on the head by the craft and rendered unconscious. He did not have time to sink under the surface as his companions caught hold of his clothing


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
