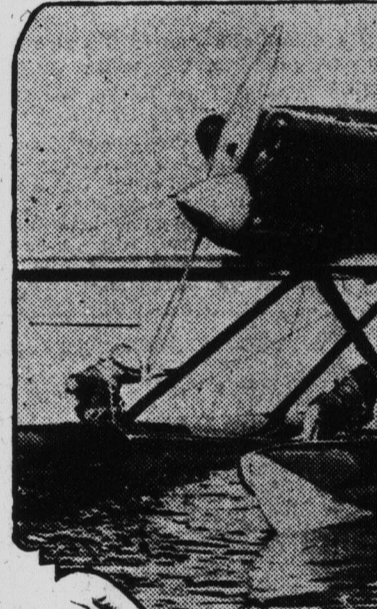

Leaves Coal In Will To Wife and Daughter

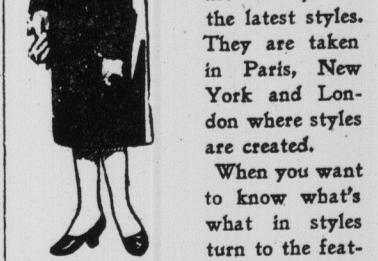

Industrial Optimism Spreads In Britain As Strike Finishes

LONDON, Nov. 16.—In spite of staggering losses due to the coal strike—which surpasses the entire cost of the South African war—there is a remarkable wave of industrial optimism sweeping the country. Orders for British goods which have piled up during the stoppage from all over the world were never executed, and now manufacturers say that with coal peace in sight they are beginning to carry them out and expect a temporary boom.

Port Traffic Here This Winter Expected To Reach High Level

Increased Service to Some Ports Noted in Sailing Lists Published

Every indication points to the 1926-27 season being one of the best in the history of the port of Saint John for winter traffic, with an increased service to some ports, a direct line to Hamburg by the Thomson Line in addition to the Canadian Pacific line continued service to that port, service to Scotland, an extension of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, a probable increased service of the Head Line, as well as more sailings in the handling of grain cargoes.

GRAIN LIKELY LARGER. The carrying of grain cargoes alone should be larger than ever, owing to the large quantity that is expected to pass through the Canadian Pacific elevators on the western side of the harbor, and the C. N. R. on the eastern side. The total number of ships carrying only grain last season amounted to twelve or thirteen, but grain carriers this coming season will undoubtedly show a big increase, and several freighters have already been chartered for this purpose.

TO OPEN SEASON. To the Canadian Government Merchant Marine will again go the honor of opening the winter season, as the steamer Canadian Leader is expected to arrive from London and Antwerp on November 19, with general cargo. Last season the port was opened by the C. G. M. M. Canadian Runner, which arrived in port on November 22.

CALLS FOR 21. The Anchor-Donaldson Line winter list calls for 21 vessels in comparison with 17 last season. The Canadian Pacific and Anchor-Donaldson Lines Christmas sailings will be about December 11 and 15. It is not expected that there will be any increase in the Manchester, Furness, Withy lines sailings over last season. A regular service will be maintained by the Houston Line to South American ports, and the Wilhelm Line to South America, should sufficient trade in the future warrant it.

MYSTERY CLEARS WHEN GIRL WIRES

Mildren Moore, Ellsworth, Missing Since Aug. 23, is Heard From

ELLSWORTH, Me., Nov. 15.—The mystery of the whereabouts of Mildred Moore, pretty 22-year-old school teacher, who disappeared from her home at North Ellsworth on Aug. 23, was cleared up today when her mother, who has been prostrated and ill for some time, received a telegram from her daughter from Los Angeles, stating that she was well and a letter was following. Miss Moore disappeared at the same time as Charles Wilson, Jr., aged 38, who was employed with her father, Charles Wilson, at the Willow Inn, a tourists' camp and wayside hotel, on the Bar Harbor road near the home of Miss Moore, who was employed at times at the Inn. The Wilsons came from New London, Conn.

THE ANNEKE JANS FARM.

63 Wall Street, N. Y. November 13th, 1926.

Editor Times-Star. Sir—I am associated here at 63 Wall Street, New York City, with Mr. Richard Reid Rogers, General Counsel of the Panama Railroad Company, and as a native of your city, with the expectation of eventually opening a law office there, I wish to call your attention to an article appearing in your issue of November 8th at page 15 in regard to a meeting of 100 of your citizens as heirs of Anneke Jans Bogardus. I believe the following facts should be published in your paper to offset any further action in this matter:

On October 26th, 1917, the Appellate Division of the State of New York for the First Department (179 App. Div. 621), disbanded an attorney at law here for taking part in soliciting contributions indiscriminately towards defraying expenses of alleged investigations made and to be made by him as to the validity of the title to the property owned by Trinity Church in the City of New York, at Trinity church was incorporated

Mr. Justice Clarke, the Presiding Judge of the Appellate Division in this connection gives an interesting history of litigation as to the title of property to Trinity Church as follows: "A consideration of the charges thus presented requires an examination of the history of the title to the lands in question and a review of the decisions of the courts of this State (New York) in which Trinity's ownership had been unsuccessfully asserted. The adjudicated cases show that about the year 1638 or 1639, one Anneke Jans Bogardus owned a farm on the island of Manhattan and that she died about the year 1668, leaving a will. In 1667, the then Governor Nicholas, confirmed the title of this and other property in her children and heirs. In March, 1670, some of the heirs executed an instrument known as a 'transport' conveying the said farm in fee to Colonel Francis Lovelace, then Governor of the Province of New York. This farm, with other lands held by or for the Crown, was known at different times as the Duke's farm, the King's farm, and the Queen's farm."

By royal charter in 1637, and in the same year the then Governor Fletcher, executed a lease of the farm to the corporation for a term of seven years. Subsequently, in 1705 Queen Anne granted to the church the property on Manhattan Island described in the grant. The corporation thereafter remained in possession of this property under claim of title from the Crown and its present holdings are under such grant. With this brief historical outline of the title, we may turn to a consideration of the attempts of the Bogardus heirs, and on one occasion, the State, to establish title to said lands as against the corporation. Mr. Justice Clark then quotes the following decisions: "Bogardus vs. Trinity Church, 4 Paige 178. "Humbert vs. Rector, etc., Trinity Church, 7 Paige 195. "People vs. Rector, etc., Trinity Church, 22 N. Y. 44. "Kierstead vs. People of the State of New York, 1 Abb. Fr. 385. "Van Glessen vs. Bridgford, 83 N. Y. 348. "Bogardus Case, 4 Sandf. Ch. 633." It will be seen from the present state of the law in this State as laid down in this opinion that the title to Trinity Church is not in the heirs of Anneke Jans Bogardus and as said by Justice Clarke to solicit funds "was endeavoring to obtain money from credulous and uninformed people

Tears Used to Be the Cowardly But Most Effective Feminine Weapon Used in the Battle of the Sexes—Nowadays Women Work for What They Want and Use Their Handkerchiefs for Ornaments Only.

HAVE you noticed that tears have gone out of fashion and that women weep less than they used to? Heaven knows, it is not because there is any less for them to cry over.

PROBABLY there are just as many unhappy women now as there ever were, but they no longer do their waiting in public places.

YET this was not always the case. In former days it was considered an elegant feminine accomplishment for a woman to be a free accompanist in all of the old-fashioned novels as described as having water always standing in their eyes—violet trenched in dew.

THERE are no such figures of woe now. Women have so thoroughly wiped their eyes that it is almost as startling a thing to see a woman cry as it is to see a man.

IS IT because women have become less emotional? Is it because there is no really reliable waterproof mascara and rouge?

TIME was when the shortest and most direct route to a woman's desires was always by water. All she had to do was to turn on the hydrant and engulf some man in a torrent of tears, and he melted down into a spineless mush before her.

## DEBATE USE OF WAR TANKS IN PEACE TIME

Lorry Type Would Be Suggested to Pioneer Work in Colonies

LONDON, Nov. 15.—When the Imperial Conference discussed Empire defence today there was an unexpected development.

On the Comberley Moors on Saturday the conference delegates saw a demonstration with the latest of types of tanks. It was essentially a demonstration of new weapons of war. But during the conference discussion today the point was raised of how far the sword might be turned into a ploughshare—how far the devices of war might be adapted to the industries of peace.

It was shown that military inventors in Britain had in their traction devices advanced beyond civil engineers. This is particularly the case with the tank lorry which can either run down a road on wheels, at 30 miles an hour or within a minute be running across open country on caterpillar tracks.

### INVALUABLE DEVICE

The invention is used by the army for conveying machine guns with men, but it was pointed out at the conference that the device would be invaluable for pioneer settlements, especially in India and the Crown Colonies.

The conference adopted a series of more or less technical reports from the economic committee. The report on oil pollution of navigable waters, for example, welcomes the efforts to reach an international agreement. It further recommends the principle of the draft convention recently prepared at Washington for the consideration of the governments of the Empire.

### UNIFORM BILLS OF LADING

Another report welcomes the progress made towards achievement of international uniformity as regards bills of lading and a third commends to the governments of the Empire the adoption of international conventions in regard to the limitation of shipowners' liability and to maritime mortgages.

The final report adopted approves the maintenance of the Imperial Shipping Committee on the present basis.

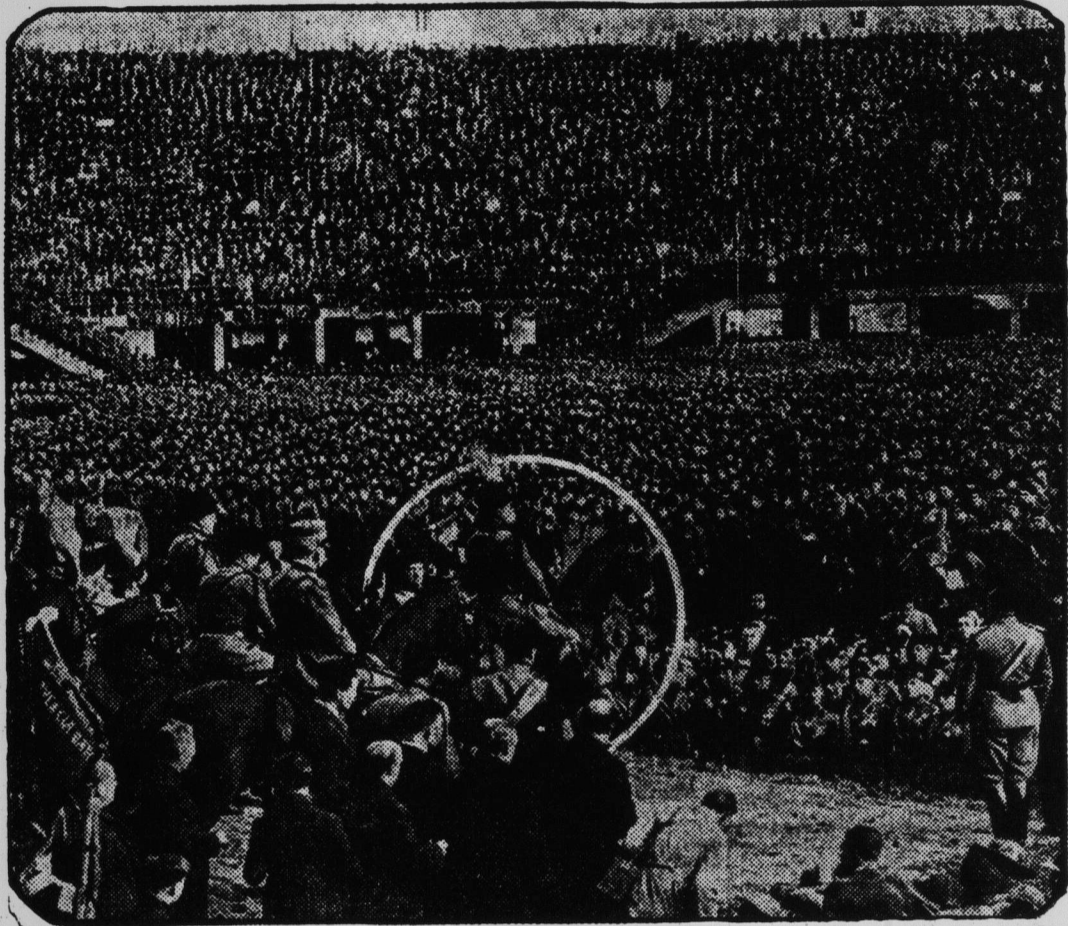

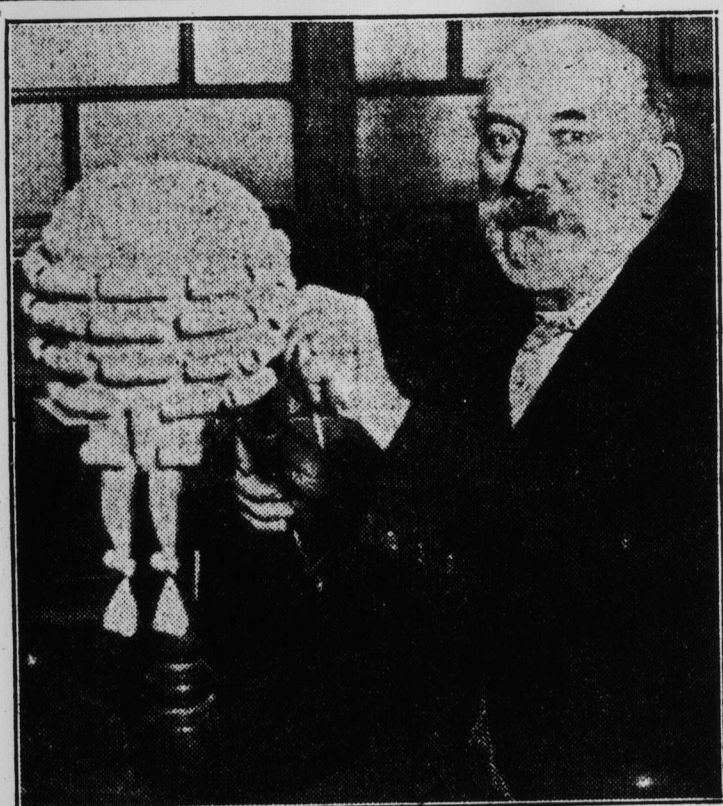
### HAVE CLUBHOUSE

## COTTON BALE NOW IS HELD AS HEIRLOOM

Originally Kept For Market Rise, Has Been in Family For 57 Years

CHIPLEY, Ga., Nov. 15—A bale of cotton almost 87 years old, is owned here by heirs of Christopher Columbus Jones, who in September 1870 had the bale ginned and then held it year after year for the price he had resolved to get for it—22-1-2 cents per pound.

Planter Jones sold his other cotton but obstinately held to his bale on which he placed a price of \$132.07 1-2 for its original 587 pounds. Eventually the "resolution bale" became a family pet, so to speak, and its sentimental value was such that in recent years when cotton soared to its 46¢ a pound peak, no offers were entertained.

Ginned in the old-fashioned way, the cotton remains in what is left of the original bagging and ties and its quality has not deteriorated. Experts have graded the lint as "No. 2" and reported that the fibre pulls one and one-sixteenth inches.

The heirs have agreed that the bale never should be sold.

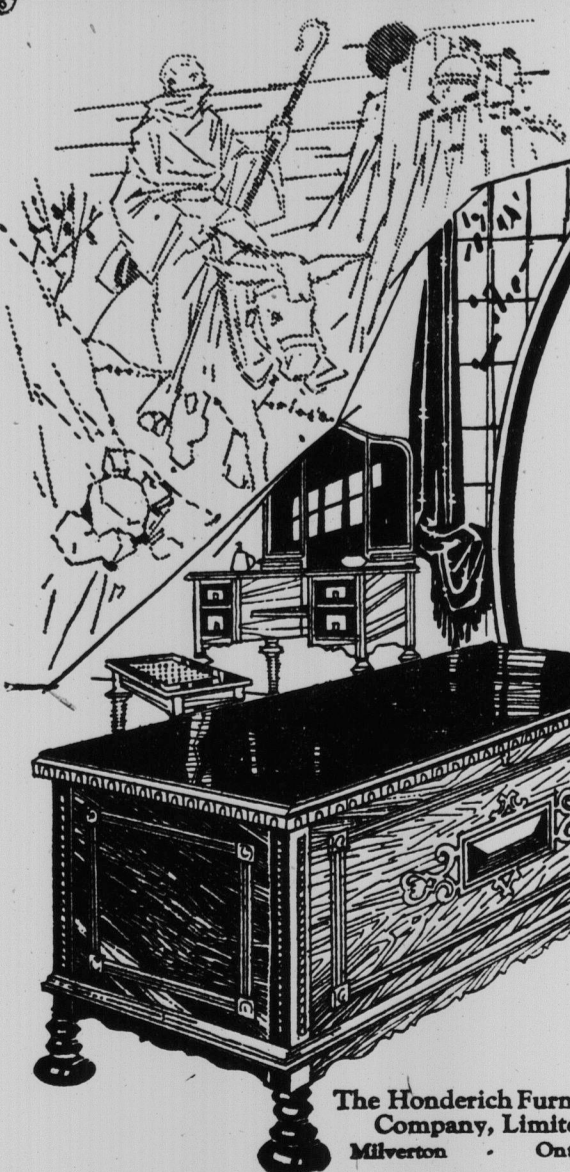

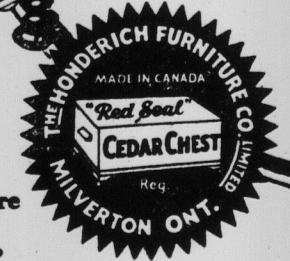

## WILLINGDON TO SHUN POLITICS

### Urges Co-operation Within Empire at Toronto Gathering

TORONTO, Nov. 15—Addressing members of the Canadian and Empire Clubs today at luncheon here, Lord Willingdon, Governor-General, appealed for co-operation, particularly within the Empire. He declared that periodical gatherings of leading statesmen of the Old Country and the Dominions have had most satisfactory results, and he hoped that the conference now proceeding in London would have the effect of producing greater co-operation. His Excellency also stressed the need for international co-operation, especially with the United States.

Lord Willingdon spoke of the optimistic spirit of the Canadian people—a spirit which he thought was more fully developed at the present time than it was a year ago when he was passing through the country on his return to England from China.

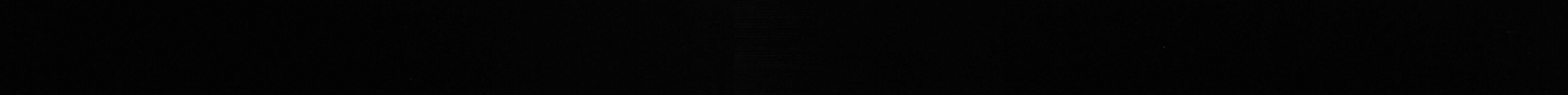

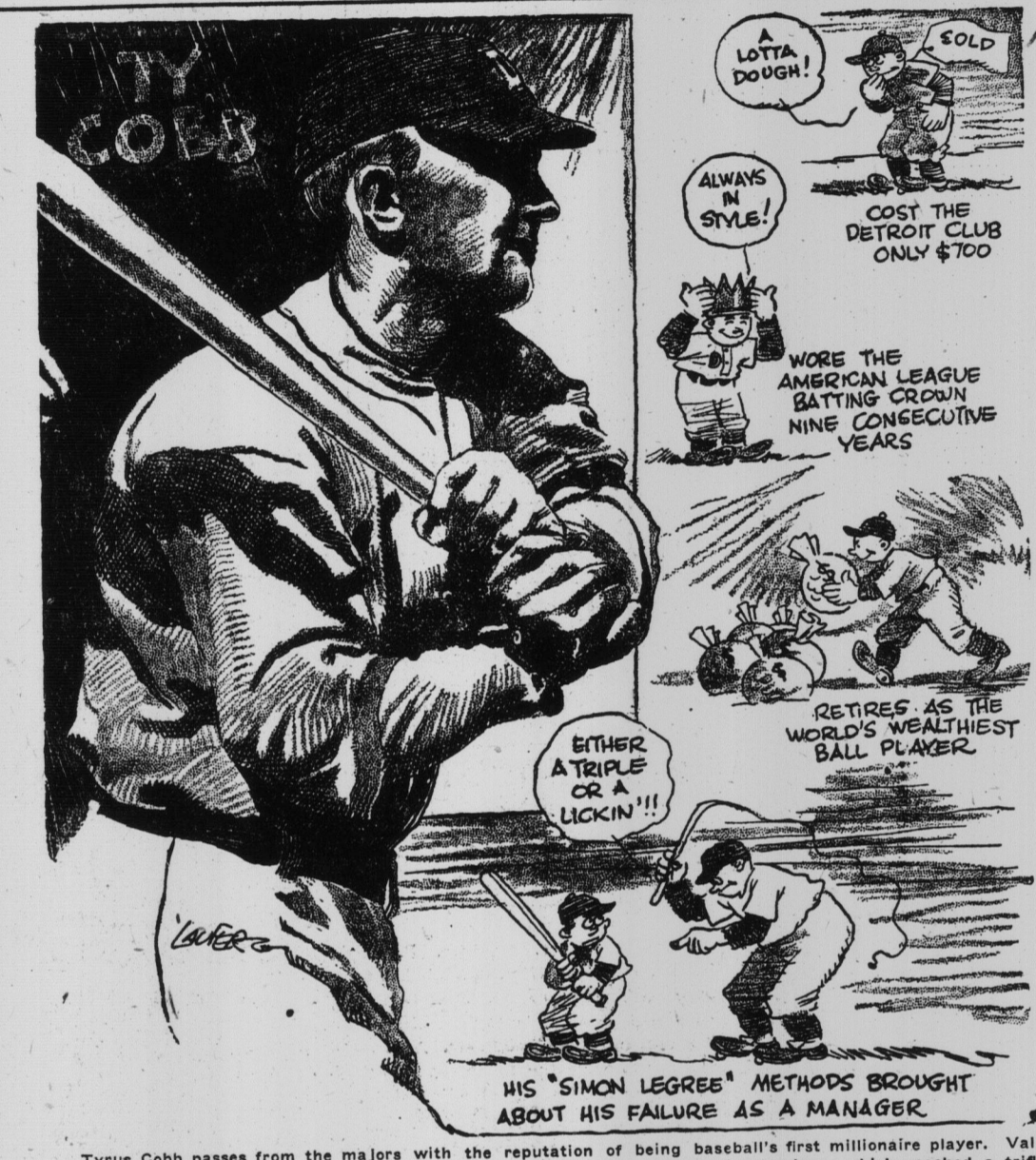

As Hiram Sees It

"There goes a schooner up river with Frenchmen an' Injuns aboard," says I to the town feller, plunk at the patch o' moonlight on Long Reach. "What," says he, "is the ghost of the Boston schooner that the French officer Martin, with his Injuns and Frenchmen, captured at Annapolis Royal in 1756. A lot of 'em come home in it—'an' took it up the river to Annapolis—'an' above Fredrickton. The main body marched home on foot by way o' Chignecto—'an' I can't take the risk o' crossing the bay—but the schooner got across all right—'an' I s'pose the French livin' along the river had some use fer it. They had some prisoners aboard, too—'an' I s'pose they had to help navigate the vessel. The war lasted fer five years—but the Injuns wasn't so keen after they failed twice to capture Annapolis Royal—'an' Gov. Shirley's men went an' grabbed Louisbourg from the French. Them was the ghosts of some o' 'em we seen on the deck of that schooner, in the moonlight on the river."

LORNEVILLE MAN LOSES LIFE AS BOAT UPSETS

Charles O'Dell is Victim; Andrew and Thomas Galbraith Rescued

The opening of the lobster fishing season yesterday was marked by a sad fatality when Charles O'Dell, of Lorneville, lost his life while hauling in his traps off the East Head light-house near Musquash, in the Bay of Fundy, as he and two companions were thrown into the rough sea by a number which capsized their fishing boat.

STRUCK ON HEAD

As the boat turned, Mr. O'Dell was struck on the head by the craft and rendered unconscious. He did not have time to sink under the surface as his companions caught hold of his clothing and held him up while they were turning the overturned boat. With the extra weight in holding on to O'Dell and their wet clothing the Galbraith brothers held desperately to the bottom of the boat with the seas breaking over them.

TO THE RESCUE

Fortunately Joseph Galbraith, keeper of the East Head light and father of Andrew and Thomas, was watching the three men when the fishing boat was upset. He immediately launched his rowboat and rowed through the seas to the scene of the accident, it taking him about half an hour to reach the men. He managed to get them in his boat and it was on their way to shore that it was noticed that Mr. O'Dell was dead.

THOSE SURVIVING

Mr. O'Dell was about 38 years of age and one of the most popular residents of Lorneville. Deep sympathy is extended to his family. Besides his mother and father, Mr. O'Dell has two children, Elton, a three-month-old boy, and a daughter, Sylvia, aged three years; also one brother, George O'Dell, West Saint John water and sewerage staff, and one sister, Mrs. Fredrick, also of West Saint John.
