

CALLS SMALLPOX SITUATION SERIOUS

U. S. Surgeon-General Warns Country Against Epidemic in 35 States.

-Washington, July 24.—Apprehension over the growing númber of smallpox cases throughout the country was expressed today by Surgeon-General Cumming of the public health service, who said the presence of the disease in 35 states threatened serious consequences unless state health officers exercise the greatest vigilance in vaccination and revaccination.

Locust Valley, N. Y., July 24.—John W. Davis, to use his own words, has discovered that the life of a presidential candidate is not a bed of roses. Mr. Davis announced his discovery during a recent speech here after a reception by his neighbors of the Locust Valley section of Oyster Bay, which was much like the ovations that another man of the neighborhood, Theodore Roosevelt, used to receive.

Ottawa, July 23—Visitors to the United States from Canada, to avoid complications and probable disappointment should, owing to the operation of the new United States laws and quota systems with regard to immigrants, arm themselves beforehand with a letter from a reputable Canadian citizen testifying that they are entering the United States on a visit and that they intend to return to their homes in Canada.

G. G. Blake, United States vice-consul in Ottawa, today explained that some such requirement is necessary to assist 'the emigration of ficials in determining that the representation as to being visitors only are bonafide and not merely a way of evading the quota system which the United States.

Mr. Blake said a letter of identification should contain the name of the intending visitor, address in Canada, business or employment where they are going, that they are on a temporary visit for how long, and that they intend returning to Canada on such a date.
