Most sanguine Conservatives hardly expect a turnover either in Hallfax or Jacques Cartier of Megantic, so that there is no cause for concern over the Government's numerical ability to carry on, provided the by-elections can be decided before January.

Political interest just now centres in Winnipeg where a Progressive convention is called for November 10 to decide the fate of Hon. T. A. Crerar. He is, it is understood, to be confronted with the alternative of quitting the leadership of the Progressive party in the House of Commons or resigning the Presidency of the Grain Growers, Limited, as it is believed that he cannot retain both and do justice to both.

probability, declares a Central News despatch from Edinburgh, that the Scottish temperance vote, which in 1918 was cast solidly for the Coalition, will be cast at the forthcoming elections in favor of candidates supporting Mr. Lloyd George. Leading temperance organizations are meeting to discuss the situation, adds the message, and many minor conferences already have passed resolutions in support of the retiring premier.

Considerable interest was aroused in London temperance circles over this report. It was pointed out by an official of the United Kingdom Alliance, the principal British temperance organizations, that such an attitude would mark a departure from previous stands of the Scottish temperance organizations, which heretofore had always upported individuals declaring themselves in favor of temperance principles, regardless of party alliance.

If the report is accurate, however, it is estimated such an attitude by the Scottish temperance voters would mean approximately 400,000 votes, indiging from the anti-license vote at the last election. It is considered untikely in temperance advocates will upport the Unionists in the forthcoming election, as Sir George Younger, present chairman of the Unionist party, is a prominent Scottish brewer, but whether they will throw the weight of their influence solidly on the other side or with any party is considered here as a highly speculative question.



DRAINING NEWMAN **BROOK VICINIT**

Sewerage System Being Installed to Take Care of All Surrounding Area -- Sewers and Water in Newman Red Cross Allegorical Proand Bryden Streets.

At the head of the arch will be erected a basin with a manhole, into which will be taken the drainage from the two sewer mains as well as the flow of Newman brook. The pipe from Lansdowne avenue will be thirty-six inches in diameter and will be constructed from hollow tiling, which, in ddition to forming the sewer, will braises. The other sewer will be of terra cotta pipe.

The system being erected will drain the areas surrounding Lansdowne avenue, Dufferin avenue, Metcalf street extension, Adelaide street, Victoria street extension, Newman street and Snow street, and will carry off the sewerage from the line in Wellsley street which takes the drainage from Cranston avenue and vicinity.

Eight-inch water mains and twelveinch sewer mains have recently been laid in Bryden and Newman streets, emptying into the mill pond. A fire hydrant has been placed on the lower end of each of the water pipes. The work in Newman street was completed today.





"The said Edward Cormier came to his death on the 14th day of October, in the year of our Lord, 1922, at the Provincial Hospital, in the parish of Lancaster, in the county of the city and county of St. John, and that his death was caused by the exhaustion of melancholia, from which disease he suffered. "We also find that no blame can be attached to any member of the staff of said institution for his death."

Six witnesses were examined, and Thomas Scoging, an attendant, made a statement in regard to Cormier's death.

Waish Testifies.

The first witness, Leo Walsh, of 15 Merritt street, said that he had been an attendant at the Provincial Hospital and when on duty had Cormier under his charge. After Cormier's death he had made a statement to the police. He said that, while in a room with Cormier, an attendant, Thomas Scoging, had hit the patient over the right kidney at least a dozen times with his fist, leaving a bruise. The patient had died the next morning. The patient was confined in a closed bed at the time and was lying face down. He said that an attendant, Leo Lutz, was present at the time of the alleged beating. He had made no attempt to stop the beating, but had said it was a shame. He had had several differences with Scoging. He said also that force had been used in feeding Cormier. A piece of wood had been put in his mouth and the food poured in.

The patient had died the morning after Scoging had beaten him, Walsh said, and another patient had shaved the dead man. The death had occurred on Saturday morning and the witness had told Dr. Anglin of the beating on Monday morning. On Tuesday he quit the job after having words with Scoging.

In answer to the coroner, the witness said that in 1917 he had been a patient in the Provincial Hospital for Nervous Diseases for a period of four weeks. He had been overseas and was a patient in the military section. Afterward he had secured a position in the institution and had been back several times.

He told of the details connected with the caring for the body of Cormier after death, and also of the routine in regard to the duties of the attendants. He did not know whether a doctor was in the building at all times or not.

Dr. H. L. Abramson, provincial pathologist, testified that he had made a post mortem examination of Cormier. He saw no mark over the right kidney and nothing to indicate that the man had been beaten. The kidney showed the usual condition. He had examined all the organs, excepting the brain, but found nothing to indicate the cause of death. He believed that the man died from the exhaustion of melancholia. A mark on the chin he took to be a pimple.

Alleged Witness Denies.

Leo Lutz, who had been an attendant for two years at the provincial hospital, had Cormier under his care part of the time and found him to be violent occasionally. He had to be restrained and kept in a crib. He had been in Cormier's room with Scoring






