52 SOME FEAR NOW THAT RUSSIA AND CHINA

Shanghai, Nov. 18—War between China and Russia is considered a serious possibility here. President Yuan Shi Kai opposes it, but messages from Wu Chang said that Vice-President Li Yuan Hung, was insisting on it.

Backing Li in his demand are the provincial governors almost to a man, the army, the cabinet, the national assembly and all the people who are well enough informed to understand the situation. If the president resists this united pressure it is thought extremely likely his government will fall.

The Russo-Chinese dispute is over outer Mongolia, a territory nearly one-third the size of Europe. Certain Mongolian princes recently declared their independence. Russia recognized it. The Chinese asserted that but a few men were behind the declaration and that Russia hired them to issue it, meaning really to grab the entire territory. At all events, it is not denied that Russian troops have been occupying strategic points ever since.
