ST. JOHN AN EXAMPLE
Mr. W. F. Burditt, in the last issue of the Canadian Courier, tells the story of the struggle for and adoption of the commission plan of government in St. John, and sets out in a very clear manner the way in which the civic administration is now carried on, receiving the daily attention of the five members of the council.

The London correspondent of the Montreal Witness says that Lord Lansdowne's tariff reform declaration, of what the Unionists would do if returned to power, has made a great stir in the country, since it implies taxation of the food of the people.

The Ottawa Journal says:—"Sir Percy Girouard, who has faced the problem of extending the means of communication in many countries in the far East, and has travelled widely, says that the Canadian roadways are the worst in the world. He points out that more money is spent on the roads of England than on the British navy."

LIBERALS AND CODERRE
The candidate who is opposing Hon. Mr. Coderre in Hochelaga is not receiving any comfort from the Liberals. The Montreal Herald says that he does not advance any reasons which would justify his election at this juncture. It points out that he is "so outspokenly opposed to any participation by Canada in the naval defence of the Dominion, and of the Empire that he cannot expect to receive support from any citizens who believe that we have a duty to perform in this respect."

APPLY THE PROBE
The methods by which Rogers and Roblin carried the constituency of Macdonald in Manitoba in the recent by-election is to be probed both at Winnipeg and Ottawa. It will be remembered that leading Liberals were arrested and thrown into jail without cause, and for the simple purpose of getting them out of the way on election day. It was found when the cases came up that there was no evidence whatever against them. A petition has been filed against the return of the two candidates, and it involves not only the Hon. Robert Rogers, but Premier Roblin and other Manitoba politicians.

CANADA'S BRILLIANT FUTURE
What a British Official Says of the Possibilities in the Dominion
(Times' Special Correspondence)
London, Nov. 5.—Sir George McCrae, vice-president of the Local Government Board, has arrived home after a two months' visit to Canada and the United States, and is highly enthusiastic as to the possibilities in Canada. He says:—"I was simply astounded with what I saw in Canada. There the possibilities of future development are beyond description. To go right away as I did from the track of the train—although to travel these 2175 miles from Ottawa to Vancouver by the Canadian Pacific is itself an educative experience of the greatest possible value—into the really virgin part of this country is indeed an experience one can never forget."

FARM HELP
The question of farm help was discussed at a meeting of the Ontario Beeskeeper's Association last week. One of the most successful members of the association, who got almost incredibly large returns from twenty-five acres of land last year, made some remarks on the general subject of hired help. He declared that properly managed it was the best investment a farmer could make, and that the farmer who neglects to hire efficient help is generally losing \$5 a day in order to save \$1.50 a day. 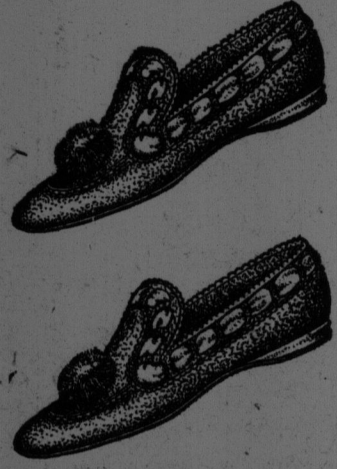

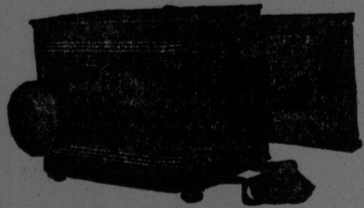

EVERY DAY CLUB AFFAIRS
FURTHER CONSIDERED AT MEETING LAST NIGHT

The question whether to reorganize the Every Day Club on a strong working basis or to close its doors was further considered at a public meeting last evening, at which the attendance was small. W. Frank Hatheway, W. C. Cross and R. T. Hayes, who were present, spoke very strongly in favor of keeping the club going, and expressed their personal sympathy with the few who were striving to this end.

A. M. Belding stated the case for the club, pointing out that it would not be worth while to spend the amount of money necessary to keep the institution going unless more effective work were done than had been done last winter. Even a small group of serious-minded men could make the club a force for social betterment, taking up such matters as a child's protection act, a prison farm, a detention home for Protestant girls, and other questions of importance, studying them and arousing sentiment in favor of public action. A ladies' auxiliary could be formed, strengthening the club, and doing work of its own to aid in improving social conditions. At the same time the hall could be kept open every evening as usual, free to any sober man, as a counter attraction to less desirable places of resort. The president said that three meetings had been held without organizing, because the response to the appeal was so slim, and the matter was still in doubt. It was not a question of money, but of men.

W. Frank Hatheway said he had been one of the original group who signed with Mr. Belding the lease of the first Every Day Club hall six years ago. He spoke of the value of its work in the past, and pointed out the broad field there was for efforts to improve social conditions in St. John. He mentioned various questions of importance that could be dealt with, in addition to those referred to by the president of the club, and made a very strong appeal to the men and women present to lend a hand in strengthening the institution.

W. C. Cross said that his own time was so taken up with Y. M. C. A. work and the work of the church and other organizations that he could only offer his sympathy and financial support to the club, as he had done in the past. He felt that the earnest men and women present would be found, and the work go on. He could sympathize with the president's desire to have a good working force, and not to be linked up with a failure. The fighting spirit was what was needed, and a group of people who would refuse to admit of accept defeat. Mr. Cross very strongly approved of a ladies' auxiliary, pointing out how much of the work of the churches is now carried on by earnest women.

R. T. Hayes said that he, like the others, had been one of the original supporters of the club, and had been glad, from time to time, to talk over its affairs with the president. The questions it was now proposed to take up as part of the club's work were worthy of its attention. He felt very strongly that a detention home for Protestant girls was needed, and said that the Catholic work in this respect. The question of the protection of children had been broached by the municipal council, but allowed to drop, and the agitation should be renewed. The Every Day Club deserved support, and he hoped the earnest men and women needed would not long be wanting.

The president said a meeting of the hall would be held this evening and the hall would be open every night this week. The members would be glad to see men come in and lend a hand. It was not a question of money; but of men.

I look for selling on the strong spots and support when the market is weak. If possible a market will be made to show the large interests to make the stock sales.

The Situation.
New York, Nov. 16.—Two factors have been adverse to a clear outlook and one of these, the Balkan tension, has now practically passed. The matter has been relegated to the field of diplomacy, and through probably somewhat long, drawn-out negotiations will eventually be settled satisfactorily. The other factor referred to is, of course, the question of the tariff and the extra session. The wisdom of Mr. Wilson in withholding any statement until the matter had been thoroughly discussed by the public is now apparent. It has become more and more evident that it is better to have such action as is to be taken put through as soon as possible. The problem of whether business will suffer depends upon the manner in which the subject is approached.
The transportation business of the country meanwhile, is evidencing the most gratifying growth. It is authoritatively estimated, based on much larger actual crops than officially estimated thus far, that the agricultural carrying roads have in eight days per cent more business than ever before at this date. For the first half of this week 12,000,000 bushels of wheat, corn and oats are reported as arriving at the western distributing points. This is an increase of around 7,000,000 bushels over 1911, and this is a fair indication of the betterment of the transportation outlook. All business will be more or less proportionately benefited.
Our exports of crops are piling up a large foreign credit, which must be eventually answered with further gold imports when the situation abroad finally permits. Railroad earnings and the profits of mercantile business are building up a fund for exploitation, both in business enterprises and in our better securities. These latter have evidently not yet discounted the benefits of these various favorable features. The over-hanging Balkan and tariff factors have kept prices at a level which make purchases at this time seem very desirable.
It looks as though tariff disturbances had been discounted, but that the underlying, exceedingly favorable, fundamental conditions, based upon wonderful crops had not been responded to as yet, which means greater strength and higher prices in the stock market later on.

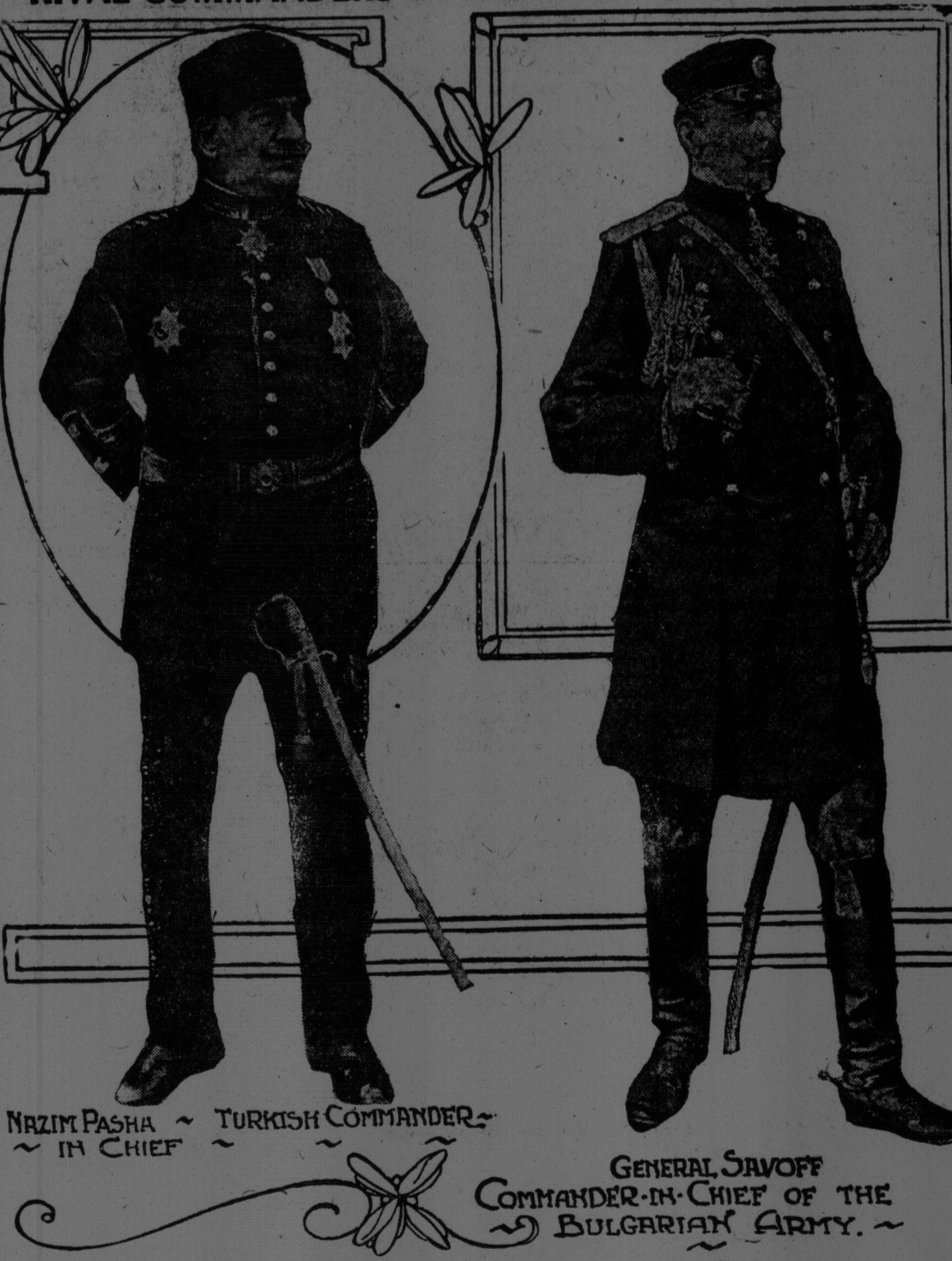

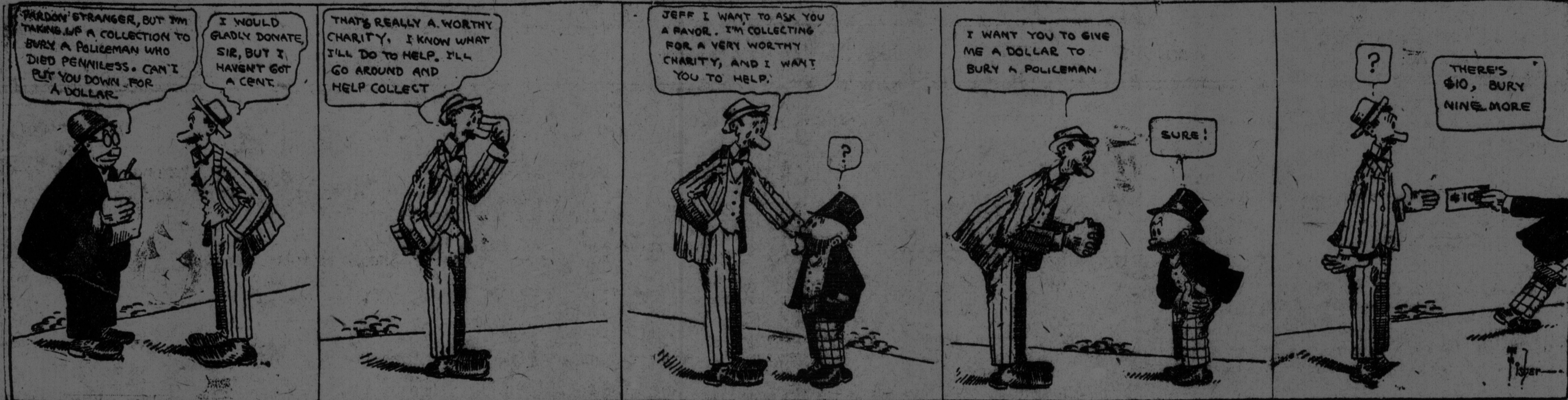

Many visiting knights from Chatham, Richibucto, Amherst, Halifax and other places attended the degree work. After the ceremonies an impromptu reception was held and light refreshments were served. Tonight the members of the Moncton Council are to entertain their friends at a ball which is to be held in the Catholic hall. Several of the St. John and other visiting knights remained for the dance and will return home tomorrow. There was general praise for the enterprise of the Moncton Knights in providing such comfortable quarters as were found in their building and for their hospitable reception of the visitors.

FORMER PRESIDENT OF GIRL'S CLUB IS NOVEMBER BRIDE

An interesting event took place this afternoon at three o'clock in the rooms of the Girl's Club when one of the young women who has been active in the organization, Miss Christine Miller, was united in marriage to Otto Schleicher. The rooms were nicely decorated with flowers sent by Messrs. Pederson and Cruikshank. The ceremony was performed by Rev. L. A. McLean in the presence of a large number of ladies who were responsible for the formation of the club, and have been instrumental in its progress. They presented to the bride as a token of esteem a handsome china tea set, and it was also an appreciation of her services as president during the last year. The bride and groom will make their home at Pleasant Point.

MANITOBA FLOUR DOWN 25 CENTS

Another decline in the price of flour took place today. Manitoba was down twenty-five cents. There was no change in the price of Ontario patents, but these went down a short time ago and there is still quite a difference in the quotations of each. The indications are said to be at present that flour will be one of the most reasonable staples upon the market this year, and as it is so much of a household necessity as to merit the term "the staff of life," this will be cheerful news to housewives, those with large families in particular. The scare which was caused at the start of the Balkan-Turkish complications is not felt so strongly now.

MERRIAM IS LOST

Schooner Bound From Saint John Is Wrecked

CREW ALL SAFE

Captain, Five Men and Wife of Cook Land With Difficulty on Large Green Island - Trying New to Save Cargo

News of the wreck of the three-masted schooner E. Merriam, bound from St. John for New York was received today. The crew are safe. The schooner, while making a course for the whistling buoy starting the night watch early yesterday Sunday and in the opinion of the captain of the Burnside Life Saving crew, which stood by during the day unable to render assistance, cannot be saved. A tug and lighter were sent from Rockland, Me., today with the expectation of saving the cargo, which consists of 225,000 feet of deal. There is said to be no insurance on the schooner, but the value of the cargo is estimated at \$100,000. The wreck is near Matinicus, about twelve miles out to sea, and nearly thirty miles from Rockland.

MORE REVENUE FROM MARKET

Some Matters of Tolls—Appointment of New Clerk and Special Officer

The appointment of David W. Belyea as clerk of the market was today recommended to the council by Commissioner McLeelan, and will be confirmed this afternoon. The commissioner also asked authority to employ another man as a special officer to aid in the collection of the market tolls. The council is believed that sufficient additional revenue can be secured to more than pay for the extra officer. During the interval between Mr. Dunham's death and the appointment of his successor, Harry McFadyen has been acting as temporary clerk, and Commissioner McLeelan has been giving considerable time to the personal oversight of affairs in the market. At the meeting of the commissioners this morning the market tolls were under discussion and a revision of the schedule may follow.

MR. ROBERTSON'S WILL IS PROBATED

Late Assistant Receiver General Divided Property Among Wife and Children

In the probate court today the will of George Robertson, late assistant receiver-general was passed. After giving his household furniture and effects to his wife, he leaves the rest of his property to his executors and trustees in trust to invest it and to pay to his wife the income, and if necessary, to use the corpus, and on the death of his wife, in case the corpus of the estate exceeds \$20,000, to divide one-third of such corpus between the sons of the deceased, and the remaining two-thirds among his three daughters, but if the estate does not exceed \$20,000, then the same to be divided equally among the three daughters. The trustees named are his wife, Agnes Robertson; his brother, Blair Robertson, and his brother-in-law, Samuel A. Corbett. Blair Robertson, who lives in Winnipeg, renounced, and the others were sworn in as executors. The realty consists of an interest in real estate at Joggins Mines, valued at \$600, personal property about \$9,000, and an interest in shares of the capital stock of the Imperial Dry Dock Company, Limited, payable to Mrs. Robertson. Barhill, Ewing & Sanford are executors. The will of John McManus, messenger at the St. John I. C. R. station, was proved. He gives to his two grandchildren, the children of his deceased daughter, Alice, namely John Louis Cohen and Michael Cyril Cohen, each the sum of \$140 on their attaining the age of twenty-one years, and the rest of his property, including his freehold lot at 35 St. James street, he gives to his wife for life and on her death to his two children, Katie McManus and Edward John McManus, share and share alike, and he nominates his daughter, Katie, and Timothy Collins, merchant, executors. They were sworn in. Real estate is \$1,000; personal estate \$150, besides insurance payable to Mrs. McManus. William J. Mahoney is probator.

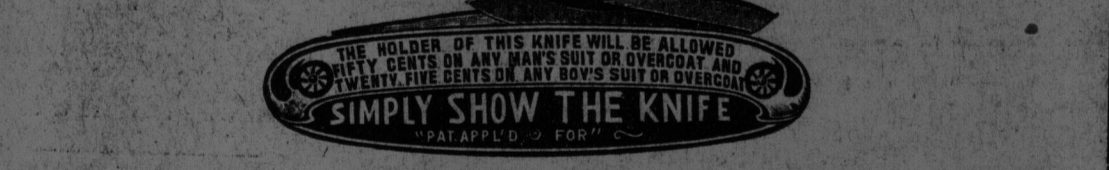
