## WAR NEWS

The British battleships Triumph and Majestic have been sunk in the Dardanelles this week by a submarine, but most of the officers and crews were saved. Both ships were about 15,000 tons, and cost over \$4,000,000. Each vessel carried 750 men. Severe fighting is still in progress in Belgium and France, but the Allies have not only maintained their positions but have made progress at several points. A French air squadron threw bombs on the largest explosive factories of Germany at Ludwigschafen, destroying many buildings and causing many fires. Desperate fighting continues between the Russians and Austro-Germans on both banks of the River San in Galicia. A strong Italian advance guard crossed the Isonzo River after a sharp fight with an Austrian force and arrived before Monfalcone, 30 miles from Trieste, where Austrian wounded are being landed. Austrians have also been attached at several points along the Corinthian frontier and the Praedice Pass. Deaths among the Turks in the Dardanelles fighting are far greater than were expected. That over 3,000 dead were found and that 1,200 Turkish rifles were picked up on British side of dividing line during the suspension of hostilities. The steamer Princess, in the Government service was accidentally blown up in Sheerness Harb. Friday morning, and while crew of 250, except one man, besides 78 dockers working on steamer, lost their lives. The Black Diamond line steamer Mowenna, for years in the Nfld. trade, was torpedoed off the Welsh coast on Thursday. All on board was saved except one man, whose name is given as Curran, a stoker from St. John's. The Germans are now using poisonous gas both on the Eastern and Western fronts. The Russians have taken over 2,000 prisoners on the River Dniester, while Germans claim success north of Pryemysl. Lord Northcliffe is being bitterly denounced for his criticisms of Lord Kitchener.

## Views From Quex Park Hospital

Miss M. M. Kent, of the R. C. Academy, recently received from Mr. F. May, Butler of the Quex Park Hospital, Birchington, Kent, Eng. 29 photographs illustrating views of the hospital, grounds, wounded soldiers, nurses, etc. The photographs are greatly prized by Miss Kent, particularly because of the circumstances under which they were sent.

Miss Kent with a number of other ladies made up some material for our wounded soldiers. On one of the articles she made she pinned a piece of paper with her name written thereon. This article found its way to the Quex Park Hospital, and the Butler, on behalf of the staff and wounded soldiers sent the photographs.

Two of the soldiers, one of which lost a leg, may be seen painting in autograph books; another group are at dinner; another group, with legs and arms gone, are posing for the photographer; five of the wounded are in yet another group, three of them having lost a leg and two of them an arm; two Cold stream Guard pals are 'snapped' in another view. Mrs. Powell Cotton, the commandant of the hospital, may be seen playing tennis with two convalescent soldiers, and an Irish lad with one leg gone, is acting as part of a 'bride' in two comic scenes, one of which shows 'her' being taken for an 'automobile' ride by the 'bridegroom' in a wheelbarrow.

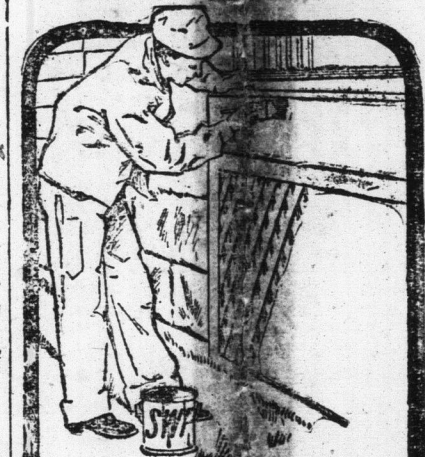

If the rule is to make a charge, it should be applied to everyone without fear or favor. We know of certain persons in the outports who had to pay for the services of the dredge.

**HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY  
SYNOPSIS**

Wednesday, April 21st. (Contd.)

HON. COLONIAL SECRETARY thought the debate had got rather off the point. Prohibition was a very serious matter, and should receive the most careful consideration. He was not prepared to dictate to anybody what he should or should not drink. Members of the House should not put their own views into force without considering the views of their constituents. The Government had for some time been considering legislation on this matter, which would satisfy every fair-minded man.

Mr. KENT thought there was not much in difference between the two sides of the House. He thought the Premier really meant to carry out his promise. But, if that was so, why not adopt the resolutions as amended? They covered just the ground the Government promised to cover. He was sorry the matter had become a party question. He repeated that the question should be decided here in the House, and upon the independent opinions of every member.

Mr. LEYD said the Government had evidently decided to make the matter a party one, which had never been done in the past. The proposals of Mr. Hickman, as amended, would not interfere with the revenue for five months to come. Apparently, the Colonial Secretary was prepared to vote for a plebiscite on prohibition, if it was proposed by the Government, but not if it was proposed by the Opposition.

Mr. HICKMAN said it had been hinted that his resolutions were intended to embarrass the Government. They were not. He had consulted no one in his party, he was absolutely independent in the matter.

Mr. MORINE said there was a great difference between the Government and the Opposition positions. The Government offered a plebiscite only, with no means of enforcing the result. The Opposition desired that, if the plebiscite favored prohibition, it should automatically go into force. That was what they wanted, and they would not be bluffing. They desired an effective bill.

Mr. COAKER desired to repeat that Mr. Hickman said nothing to anybody in the Opposition about supporting these resolutions, except to ask Mr. Morine to second it. Nothing had been arranged; everybody was voting with absolute independence.

A vote being taken, the resolutions and the amendment were lost.

The Premier, moving the adjournment, referred to the death of Hon. John Ayre, a member of the Upper House, and formerly a member of this House. Though of a retiring disposition, he possessed sterling qualities of wisdom and industry, which had been freely given in both branches of the legislature. His prominent position in commercial matters was well known; his activities in church, educational and charitable matters were wide and constant. He himself felt that he had lost a close personal friend. He moved an adjournment till to-morrow at 4 o'clock, as a mark of respect, and to enable members to attend the funeral.

Mr. KENT joined with the Prime Minister in deploring the loss of a valuable and respected citizen, one of the pioneers of our modern commerce, who was a great loss to the public life of the Colony, notwithstanding the quiet way in which his work was done. He seconded the motion to adjourn.

Mr. MORINE had long been closely acquainted with the late Mr. Ayre, and desired to be joined in the expressions of regret.

The House adjourned till tomorrow at 4 o'clock.

Thursday, April 22, 1915.

The House met at 4 p.m. pursuant to adjournment.

Various questions were asked and answered.

The Bill to amend the Death Duties Act passed Committee.

The PREMIER moved House into Committee of the Whole to consider resolutions in connection with the establishment of industries by the Nfld. Products Corporation Ltd. This company was being formed by Mr. Wilson, a well-known and wealthy chemist and inventor in Canada and the United States. He was associated with the Reid Nfd. Co., who were

giving him certain concessions. It was proposed to carry on at Humbermouth a very large industry in the making of certain chemical products, useful for fertilizers and other purposes. In connection with this industry, there would be used phosphate rock, there would be used pyrites from Spain, and bar materials. It was estimated that it would be possible to produce about \$10,000,000 worth of this fertilizer per year, of excellent quality and at a cheap rate. Even this would be only about 5 per cent. of the world production of such material. As a by-product of this chemical industry, there would be produced a great quantity of sulphuric acid, which would be utilized by setting up there an extensive pulp industry, which would manufacture sulphite pulp, a valuable kind.

The Company's engineers had spent a year in the country, and reported that by an expenditure of \$6,400,000 a power of 119,000 horse power could be developed in the Humber region. It would take all this power to manufacture the proposed material to the value of \$10,000,000. At Grand Falls there was only 30,000 horse power; here we would have 119,000, which would cost nearly seven million dollars to develop. It was reckoned that it would mean an expenditure of sixteen to eighteen million dollars in the country. He proceeded to read a series of notes explaining the chemical process and the materials it was to employ. He also explained the various sections of the proposed agreement with the new company. The estimates at \$18,000,000 or thereabout were proposed by a famous engineering firm, and had cost already, he was told, about \$100,000.

If this industry got under way it must be a great thing for the Colony. The Government had been in negotiations with the promoters for several months. Capitalists of this kind would not come to such a country as this unless they could obtain some privileges and concessions. This was our first opportunity of developing on a large scale our dormant natural resources. It was quite true that for many years past we had had many failures in our attempts to establish industries, and no one could be blamed for desiring them now; but it did not rest us anything to make the attempt, because people did not get these concessions unless they spent in the country a fixed amount of money. He could not even now be certain it would succeed, but he had great hopes of it. As to the proposed extension of the business to Labrador, no doubt if the business was a success in Newfoundland, it would be an easy matter to extend it to the Labrador. He quoted some statistics relative to water powers available on Labrador.

These concessions were absolutely conditional on the expenditure of enormous sums of money; if these were not spent, the concessions were not given. If these industries were established, it would mean an enormous labour bill spent in the Colony; it meant that many of our people who had gone to Nova Scotia or elsewhere would be able to come back and make better wages at home.

Mr. MORINE did not think the labor bill of this industry would be as large as was expected, nor did he believe that any of our people would come back to work in these industries. The work would only fall to the cheap foreign labor, which was easily obtainable. He would, however, support the measure if it appeared likely to be a benefit to the Colony.

Mr. LEYD also considered that labor in the new industry would be reduced to the minimum. He hoped that all possible information would be

Friday, April 23rd, 1915.

The House met at 3 p.m. pursuant to adjournment.

Petitions were presented by Mr. Young, Mr. Morine, Mr. Stone, Mr. Jennings, Mr. Cliff, Mr. Abbott, and Mr. Target.

Various questions were asked and answered.

The Death Duties Bill was read a third time.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on supply.

Mr. MORINE thought it would be a good idea to have the Budget Speech before Supply this year, on account of the gravity of the financial situation, and so that members would be able to discuss the Estimates more fully. It might be that we should have to make a general cut in expenses as was done in 1894, after the Bank Crash. The situation was abnormal. Before any votes were passed, the Minister of Finance should give a general statement as to how he proposed to finance next year.

HON. MINISTER OF FINANCE did not consider the conditions were sufficiently unusual to warrant departing from the regular course. All the usual information was before the House.

Mr. MORINE said we had a larger deficit than ever before; that the whole financial situation was absolutely unprecedented. The information on the Table covered nothing since the commencement of the war, but it was well known that conditions were very serious.

HON. MINISTER OF FINANCE said he would give all possible information as to the vote next along.

Mr. KENT asked for the Estimates to be deferred until members had time to study the Public Accounts more closely. He agreed that, under these conditions, and, indeed, under any conditions, some general statement of the finances of the Colony ought to be given before the Estimates were voted.

Mr. COAKER said something ought to be done to facilitate public business. The session was already very late.

Mr. LEYD agreed that the Government ought to give such a general statement as they could before the Estimates went through, so that the House might know how the Colony was to get out of the present tangle.

HON. MINISTER OF FINANCE said he intended to pass the Estimates as usual, but he would give all reasonable information as he went along, and would defer the matter until Monday, if desired.

Mr. Morine, Mr. Cliff, Mr. Lloyd, Mr. Stone, further pressed the same argument.

The Committee then rose until Monday next.

Committee of the Whole on Stamp Duties.

HON. MINISTER OF FINANCE explained that this was merely to enable the Government Departments to issue cheques without stamping them; there was no revenue to be obtained by the Government stamping its own cheques; and, also, to put a 2c stamp duty on receipts for more than \$200.

### Public Notice

#### Censorship of Telegraphs, Cables, and Wireless Stations.

By direction of the Chief Censor, London, the following Regulations will be in force on and after Friday next, January 15th, namely:—  
1. Cablegrams in authorized editions of A.B.C. Lieber's, Scott's and Western Union Codes only may be exchanged between British, Allied or Neutral Territory on extra European Telegraph System, on one side, and British or Allied Territory, wherever situated, on the other side.

2. The term "Extra European Telegraph System" means the places outside the Telegraph System of Europe. Besides the places in Europe proper, the following are also counted as being on the European Telegraph System, namely:—Russia and Asia; the following French possessions in North and West Africa, namely:—Algeria, Mauritania, Senegal, Upper Senegal and Niger; and French Morocco. The Island of Cyprus is regarded as outside the European Telegraph System.

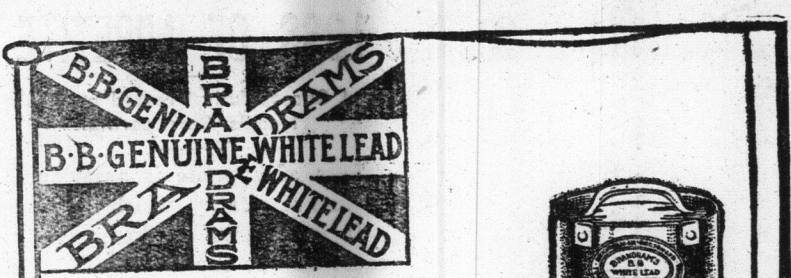
3. Until further notice cablegrams in the following three Codes, namely:—Meyer's Atlantic Cotton Code, Thirty-ninth Edition; Baley's Complete Phrase Code, not including separate Mining and Oil Supplements; Broomhall's Imperial Combination Code, not including Special Rubber Edition, are allowed only between United Kingdom and places in Extra European Telegraph System.  
N.B.—As all messages sent under the above Regulations have to be decoded and censored the carrying out of this work will be greatly facilitated if persons sending such messages would hand in at the Telegraph Office, at the time of presenting the message, the translation of the same.

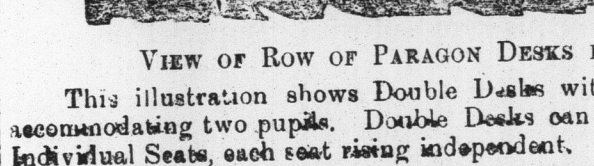

What Should Be Done

To Meet Present Conditions

The revenue of this country at present is away below what it was last year and previous years.

If a policy of retrenchment and economy briefly touched on and outlined above were put in force, the \$750,000 could easily be raised, and the burden of taxation, already weighing so heavily upon the shoulders of the people, would be greatly relieved.
