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

On examining the Public Accounts, however, he did not find that the policy of the present Administration in the matter of public works appeared to be a starving policy. Let them take the expenditure on public works chargeable to income, and it would be found that hon. gentlemen during the seven years of their Administration spent per annum, on an average, \$76,567. During the last three years the present Administration which had been charged with starving public works, spent an average of \$1,656,279 per year, or more than twice as much per annum, on an average as hon. gentlemen opposite. This did not appear to him to look much like starving public works. On public works chargeable to capital account, the hon. gentlemen opposite had spent during their seven years of office, on miscellaneous public works.




