The Doctrine of the Holy Eucharist. Here in the cathedral I propose to deal with what is the most important part of my subject—the doctrine of the Holy Eucharist. Having come to this point, we reach a further question and another division of opinion, for it may be asked: When is the gift bestowed, and how? It is clear that if we confine this question to the individual communicant...

Now, between these two opinions there can be no question at all that the church holds the latter. The inward part of the sacrament is declared in the catechism to be the Body and Blood of Christ, which are verily and indeed taken and received by the faithful in the Lord's Supper.

Improper Objects of Worship. Yesterday the visitation was for the deaneries of Canterbury, Ospringe, Westbere, Dover, East Bridge, Sandwich and Sittingbourne. There was a celebration of the Holy Communion at 11.45. At the conclusion the archbishop took his place in the archdiocesan throne and delivered a further portion of his charge.

It is not possible really to distinguish between this doctrine and the Lutheran doctrine commonly called 'Consubstantiation' and it is important that it should be clearly understood that it is not unlawful to hold it and to teach it within the Church of England.
