If Charles Paddock, the winner of the inter-Allied sprints in France, heads the Southern Pacific A. A. A. U. athletic team to the National championships in Philadelphia he and his mates should pick up quite a number of points. Paddock has records of 9 4.5s for the "100" and 21 4.5s for the "220." The team, besides Paddock, will include W. Yount, who has records of 15 1.5s and 25 over the high and low hurdles has a broad jump mark of 23 ft. 5 1.4 in. and of 46 ft. 2 in. in the hop, step and jump; Colin Kilby, a low hurdles with a record of 24 3-5s and is credited with 49 2-5s for the quarter, and George Schiller, who has run the "100" in 10s and "220" in 22s.

. S. Davidson Herron, National amateur champion, won more honors a few days ago when he came through in the final round of the Sharon (Penn.) Country Club invitation tournament, defeating F. H. Darragh, of Beaver Country, by 6 and 4, in an 18-hole match. Herron was never in any danger of being beaten. After halving the first two holes he won four of the next seven, and was 4 up at the turn. He took three of the five inward holes and the match. The National amateur champion's hardest match in this tourney was against R. L. Platform of the United Farmers of N. B.

1. 
