Reasonable Suggestions on Care of Cattle, Sheep and Swine.

Caring Cows—The brush and currys are far less used on cows than they are on horses, yet they are quite as necessary to the animal's comfort.

Preserved Apples—Pare and core ripe apples. Stew the bottoms of two Mason jars with granulated sugar.

Peach Tapioca—One cup tapioca, soak for one hour in cold water and drain. Add enough water to the syrup poured from a can of peaches to make in all three cups.

Apple Custard—Take one pint stewed apples, sweetened and cooled; one pint sweet milk, eggs beaten, put in baking dish.

Apple Compote—Core and peel as many apples as are wanted and cook slowly in a syrup made by boiling one cup of sugar and a cup of water.

Apple Crop Situation

Conditions in Maritime Provinces and Elsewhere—Something About Prices.

Early apples have been rather above the average in New Brunswick. The fall and winter varieties are showing the effects of the dry weather and will be less than average crop.

The conditions remain favorable in Nova Scotia except that the weather is too dry. To prevent freezing in the cellar, when cold weather is anticipated a tub of warm water should be placed in the room.

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FARM STORAGE OF APPLES

Only selected apples which are free from bluish or insect injuries should be stored for winter keeping.

When packing apples in boxes never attempt to fill a space with an apple decidedly smaller than the rest of the apples being packed.

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MONTREAL LEADS IN WHITE PLAGUE DEATH RATE

Scourge More Prevalent There Than Any Place in the World

OVER 5,000 DIE IN PAST SEVEN YEARS

Canadian Banks Slow to Increase Paid Up Capital for Fear of Not Being Able to Maintain High Dividends - Business Outlook in the Dominion Not Affected So Far by Depression Abroad.

Montreal, Oct. 5-In Montreal, as in other parts of Canada, Presbyterians play an important part in the religious life of the community. At St. Paul's church, the handsome edifice in Dorchester street, the handsome Rev. Dr. Barclay is the pastor.

High Mortality from Tuberculosis. A few weeks ago reference was made in this correspondence to the high mortality rate from tuberculosis in Montreal, and the unfortunate fact that apparently deaths from this cause are on the increase.

There is no charge to the patients of this institution, whose work is chiefly advisory and diagnostic. It is an important part of it is the instruction of patients in their own homes.

Worst in the World. How serious is this matter was made clear at this gathering by Dr. Blackader, a distinguished Montreal physician, who pointed out that tuberculosis is more prevalent in Montreal and in the province of Quebec than anywhere else in the world, and that in Montreal more persons die of tuberculosis every year than of all other contagious diseases put together.

In England, the mortality rate from tuberculosis has been brought down by nearly 75 per cent. in less than a century, and in Germany and the United States the anti-tubercular campaign has met with equal success.

Increase in Banks' Capital Slow. It appears from the August bank statement that the paid-up capital of the active Canadian banks has at length reached \$100,000,000.

Bank failures account, in part for the slow growth of paid up capital in the last five years, the actual increase from August to August in the last twelve months being \$4,500,000.

That any decrease in a bank's rate of dividend, due to a lean year following upon an extension of capital, would react unfavorably upon the standing of that bank, there is no doubt, and the extra caution which marks conservative bank management in this connection can be readily understood.

Nevertheless, it is a matter for satisfaction, in view of the expansion of the country, that month by month, substantial additions are being made at the present time to the capital. Apart from new announcements, which make more definite the forthcoming series of annual meetings, the present indications are that in the course of a few months the paid-up capital of the active banks will reach \$100,000,000.

Large Expansion in Loans. The feature of the August bank returns is the large expansion in the banks' current loans and discounts. These, reflecting the beginning of the harvest-financing are up to \$24,800,000, an increase of \$1,000,000 over the end of July.

Deposits of the public in Canada are slightly lower than in July, a gain in notice deposits of \$2,000,000 being offset by a loss in demand deposits of \$4,000,000.

This week, the "excess" circulation has become available to the banks. The available amount of this circulation, which is equal to 15 per cent. of the minimum up capital and reserves of the banks at September 30, would appear to be about \$28,000,000—an amount which should be sufficient for the purpose.

Business Outlook in Canada. The outlook for the local stock markets is currently difficult at the present time. Too much importance need not be attached to the rise which has taken place since the elections, and to the prognostications which have been freely made in some quarters that there will be for some time to come, a marked advance in prices.

On the other hand, here in Canada, we have a harvest which, if not of the proportions expected at one time, is "good enough" and all the indications point to a continued activity. In view of the troubled outlook abroad, I have been at pains to discuss this week with a number of bankers and prominent business men the subject of the immediate future.

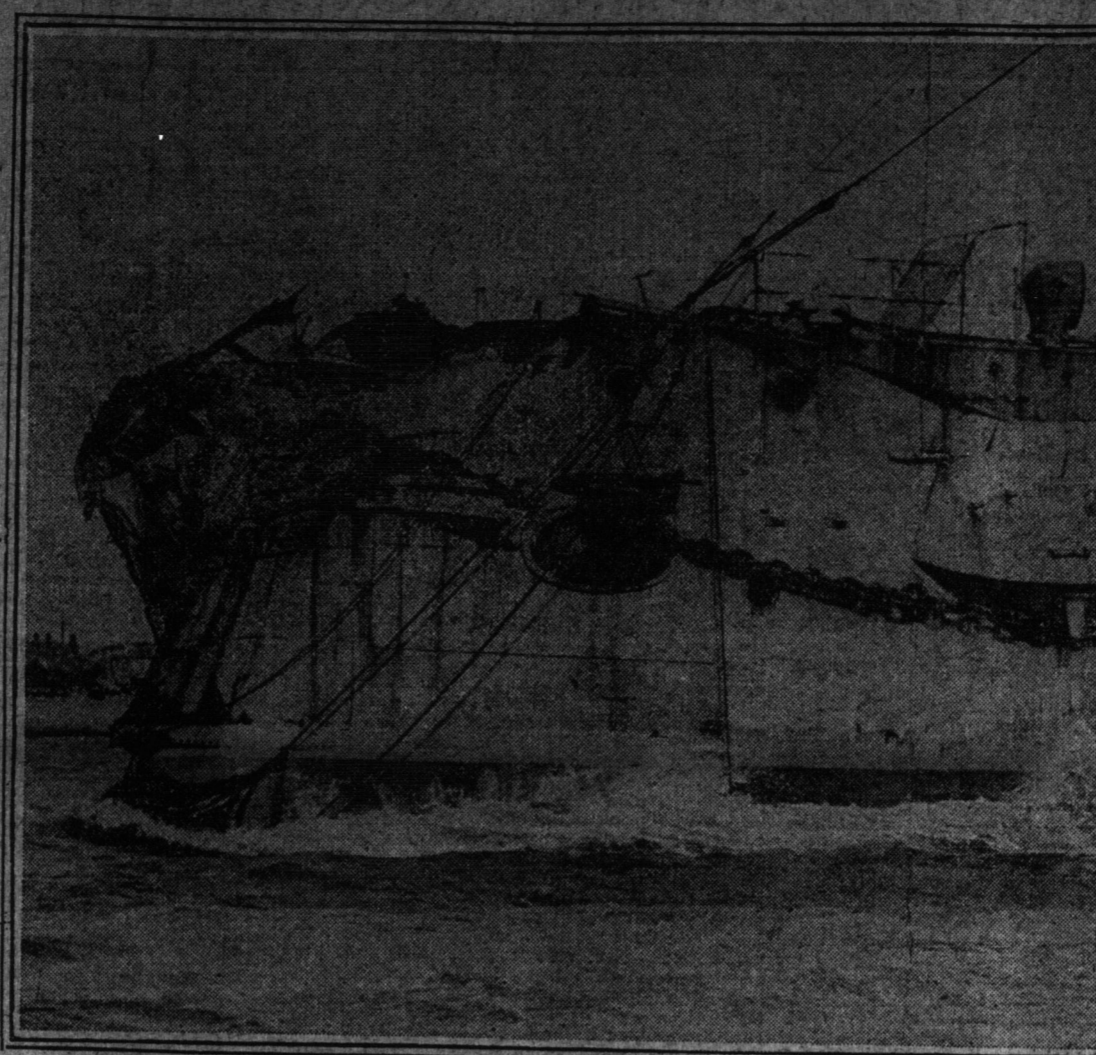
It is recognized that there may possibly be a less free flow in the immediate future than for some time past of capital from abroad into the Dominion, owing to the fact that the great European centers are not in a position to send it.

The really difficult questions are, whether the depression abroad will attain such serious proportions as to affect our trade, or whether the money already in circulation will be absorbed by the banks.

As regards the local stock market they have lately gone clean contrary to the movements in the leading centers. But it is not certain that this attitude can be long continued.

HOME FOR CONSUMPTIVES

Municipal Council Adopts Recommendation of Doctors GREATLY NEEDED

New Wing is Also to Be Added to the General Public Hospital at a Cost of \$30,000—Importance of Aid for Both Projects Urged by Strong Delegations.

Wednesday, Oct. 4. A new wing to the general public hospital costing \$30,000 and providing accommodation for about fifty patients, and a home for advanced cases of tuberculosis on the outskirts of the city, were both authorized yesterday by the municipal council.

Dr. Walker said that for some time it had been forced on the attention of the commissioners that the patients in the hospital were rapidly increasing. In 1905, 1,085 cases were treated while this year, for nine months, 1,219 had already been admitted.

Dr. Walker said that the local dispensary with six doctors and a nurse engaged had been greatly handicapped with the work because they had no place to send advanced cases.

Dr. Walker said that the care of advanced cases had been taken up by municipalities in the United States and Canada and in Europe. Twenty-seven new cases had been reported in the last two months and there had been 37 deaths right in the most favorable months of the year.

MACKENZIE AND MANN Two Self-made Canadians Who Built a Transcontinental Railroad.

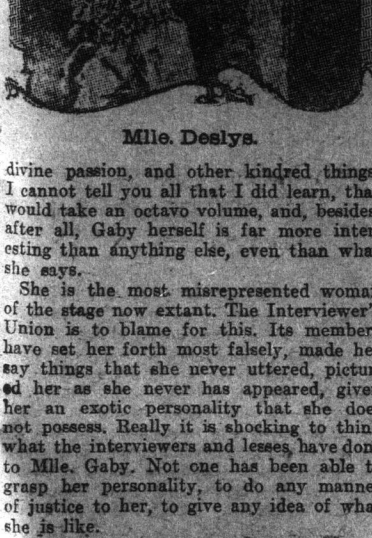

COUNCIL WANTS MORE INFORMATION

Report of Committee Regarding Court House Referred Back

MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS DISCUSSED AT LENGTH

Prison Farm Committee Favors Site on Sandy Point Road—Pledisite on Liquor License Question in Lancaster—Peddlers Licences—Other Business Dealt With.

Wednesday, Oct. 4. In addition to the favorable reception of the delegates asking an addition to the General Public Hospital, and the establishment of a home for advanced cases of tuberculosis as told elsewhere, the municipal council yesterday discussed and dealt with some very interesting matters.

The report of the committee recommending the sale of city hall and the present court house and the construction of a new building to cost \$300,000 in Market Square was referred back to the committee for further information. An informal expression of opinion showed that the representatives of the city were opposed to the recommendation, while the county councilors were in favor of immediate action.

The prison farm committee reported that the most favorable location for a prison farm on city property was on the site of the isolation hospital on the Sandy Point Road, and also recommended that a delegation be sent to Guelph (Ont.), and to Mansfield (O.), to gather information on the scheme. The committee also advised that the system of confining boys in the Industrial Home was conducive to reformation, and suggested that after a certain time they be allowed to go out upon farms in the province.

There was a lively discussion over a recommendation to allow the county secretary to collect the license fees of peddlers and retain half the amount, and finally this section of the report was amended to read that legislation be applied for, making it a part of the officials duties to perform such work.

The plebiscite on the liquor license question in Lancaster was granted in accordance with a petition signed by 401 ratepayers of the parish. Before the business was finished so many councillors had left the room that the council was left three short of a quorum and the proceedings came to an abrupt termination, when this was discovered.

Warden Connolly was in the chair when the session opened. The reading of the finance committee's report by Councilor Curran was the first business item. Bills were ordered paid. A bill for \$115.84 from P. E. Jones for wiring the court house was cut down to \$100, the contract price. Dr. Berryman's bill for \$20 for summering the grand jury in his capacity as acting sheriff was held to await further information.

In answer to Coun. Hayes, the county secretary said that the present sheriff had drawn salary only from the time of his assumption of his duties and the county would be saved the amount accumulating in the lapse of time since the late sheriff's death. The high sheriff's salary was fixed at \$1,900.

James Bow was granted \$15 for his services in capturing the lunatic, remaining at large in the vicinity of Spruce Lake. An order was passed requiring the county tax bills to be made up and sent out by the tax collector. On motion of Coun. J. B. Jones a section was added requiring the collectors to make returns and pay in the cash collected at least once a month. A recommendation requiring junk dealers doing business in the parishes to take out licenses, provoked some discussion.

Coun. C. T. Jones objected to the section in which it was agreed that in case of dealers proving they had paid the license fee of \$35 in the city that they should be relieved in the county. The next section dealt with the collection of the peddlers' licenses and Coun. J. B. Jones suggested that the money collected be sent at once to the county treasurer and that he should apportion it among the highway boards.

could not get justice from the council they would go to the Legislature. After some discussion, Coun. Frink's motion to make the collection part of the secretary's duties was adopted.

The market in the jail was granted two weeks leave of absence. An order was passed directing the civic assessors to return the county assessment accounts to the secretary.

Coun. Donovan, in the course of a stirring little speech, said that he did not consider the present court house fit to stable a calf, so he was decidedly opposed to using the little town hall as a site.

Coun. Cochran reported for the prison farm committee along the lines stated above. The municipal Home property and the Industrial Home farm were not found to be suitably located for the purpose but the Sandy Point property surrounding the Isolation Hospital fulfilled all requirements.

Coun. Cochran submitted a plan of the farm and the councilors received the report and expressed approval of the proposed plan.

ITALIAN DEFEATS TRIPOLI NAVAL FORCES

TRIPOLI NAVAL FORCES DEFEATED BY ITALIAN

The Italian government is apprehensive that the Turkish fleet may be able to hamper the passage of the transports, and great precautions are being taken. The expedition will be started from ports in two seas rather than from Italy and Sicily, in order to minimize that danger, and evidently Italy is so busy to get the expedition on the way.

Another reason for the delay of warlike operations is the continuance of the Turkish cabinet crisis. Clearly, the old ministers are remaining in office against their will, and are unable to formulate or agree upon any definite lines of action. It is even reported that the minister of marine has resigned on account of flagrant disobedience of his orders to the fleet.

Meanwhile the poor parties of the powers continue without intermission. It is said that Russia is now supporting Germany in her efforts to bring about peace. Turkish transport captured. Taranto, Italy, Oct. 3.—The Italian armored cruiser Marco Polo brought into this port today the Turkish transport Sabaha which she had captured. Great excitement prevailed throughout the day during the disembarkation of the prisoners taken along with the steamer.

From the distance the white buildings of Tripoli could be plainly seen, the whole field of operations was unfolded before the eyes of the Italian fleet. The officers of the Vareso kindly explained that the latter had been delayed because Admiral Aubrey, commander of the Italian fleet, had received a request from the Tripoli garrison for another day of grace to enable them to receive three days' notice to surrender.

The battleship Benedetto Brin and the armored cruisers Giuseppe Garibaldi and Francesco Ferruccio drew up in line opposite the harbor entrance. The latter vessel in the battle line was not far from the shore, and the Turkish vessels stood off to keep back intruders.

The first shots were directed towards Charchatt fort and later Kerkerche fort was shelled. No sooner did the first shell burst over Tripoli than the officers seemed to awaken. It returned the fire with vigor and energy. A heavy cannonade was kept up on both sides for a few minutes, and the firing became deadly.

Again, at an early hour this morning, the first division of the Italian fleet under Admiral Faravelli, resumed the bombardment. The Turkish garrison still occupied a position behind the forts and responded with a few shells, which fell short.

As a result of the bombardment, the Turkish garrison was compelled to surrender. The Italian commander expressed his regret at the loss of the city, but said that the Italian fleet would be able to remain in the harbor for some time.

PRESIDENT MEETS PHOTOGRAPHERS

The report of the Sabbath school committee was the first business of the synod this morning. Rev. J. C. Crowdy, of Dunham, N. B., spoke of the need of getting not only the ministers but also the members interested in the church work. He emphasized the need of studying the Bible in the home.

The evening session was presided by the Pine Hill alumni banquet, one of the most successful yet held. The new officers elected were: President, Rev. E. G. Stratton, Charlottetown; vice-president, Rev. Gordon Dickie, St. John; Rev. L. H. McLean, Pictou; Rev. George A. Christie, Pictou; Rev. Dr. Clarence McKinnon, St. John; Rev. Dr. J. S.
