TOWN COUNCIL

Delegation Received Regarding Victoria Street Crossing.

On Tuesday evening a meeting of the Town Council was held under the chairmanship of his Worship Mayor McDonald. There were present at the opening of business Councillors Lunan, White, Mowat, McKenzie and Alexander. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed. Councillors Pinault and Moores then entered the meeting. The regular order of business was then suspended and a delegation consisting of Messrs. Sullivan, Comeau, Graham and Ferguson were received by the Council. Mr. Sullivan stated that the matter they wished to bring before the council was that of the crossing at Victoria Street. Looking to the fact of there being a great depreciation of property around this district if Victoria Street is closed entirely when the new subway goes through, it was felt by the property owners there, that some sort of crossing should be left for the convenience of the public. The delegation desired the council to take steps to approach the I. C. R. to have a foot crossing or side walk six or eight feet wide made, for the convenience of foot passengers only.

Councillor Pinault said that he would not care to ask the I. C. R. to have a regular wagon crossing but would be in favor of asking the I. C. R. to leave a foot crossing there. He thought a committee should see the I. C. R. and try to arrange this matter. Councillor Mowat concurred, and Councillor White said he thought the request of the delegation a reasonable one and suggested that the committee who have the dredging matter under review should take this matter up also. The last thing he thought would be an over-head bridge, and he moved that the engineer prepare a plan of this kind and allow the committee to make the best arrangement they could with the railway company. This was seconded by Councillor McKenzie and carried. Mr. D. E. Graham then carried the council for their reception and the delegation withdrew.

Mr. F. Murray was then heard before the council regarding the dredging matters already brought up, and he stated that a memorial had been prepared for presentation to the Minister of Public Works, and he had information that this dredging was recommended last year by Mr. Reid. After discussion it was arranged that the Mayor go to Ottawa with Messrs. W. S. Montgomery and Mr. F. M. Murray to present this memorial. The regular order of business was then resumed. Communication was read from Mr. Thos. Stevenson asking that the 5 per cent. held over against this Stanley Street contract be paid over to him. On motion the request was not granted.

Communication read from His Worship the Mayor asking permission to burn rubbish and brush.

Granted. Communication from R. Boss of the Telephone Company stating that it was inconvenient to remove telephone poles and guy ropes at this time and asking that the matter be held over till next spring. After discussion it was agreed that the objectionable poles and guy ropes be removed until the spring.

Communication from F. M. Murray stating that the claim of Morris Furlong had been settled by the Insurance Company.

Petition of John Morrissey for license to conduct a restaurant on O'Leary Street was referred to Police and License Committee.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Councillor Pinault submitted report from the Public Property and

SMALL FIRE

IN TOWN

Early on Wednesday morning fire was discovered in the basement of the building on Gerard Street opposite the I. C. R. station occupied by the Exchange House and F. J. LeBlanc.

The brigade with a couple of streams soon extinguished the blaze which was confined to the basement, the stock in the store above being damaged only by smoke. The loss will be trifling. The fire is thought to have started from an over heated flue pipe.

Streets Committee recommending payments of accounts amounting to \$44.06. Report received and adopted. In a further report on the dumping ground Councillor Pinault submitted a plan and estimates prepared by the Town Engineer for a new dumping ground at the town wharf. The cost of the cribwork was estimated at \$3867.97. After discussion it was moved by Councillor Alexander, seconded by Councillor Mowat that the Public Property and Streets Committee be authorized to get prices for the lumber required and tenders for the building of the cribwork.—Carried.

Councillor Moores submitted report of Public Charities Committee recommending payment of accounts amounting to \$53.00 and Councillor Alexander from the Water and Sewerage Committee accounts to the sum of \$391.99. Both reports were received and adopted.

In a further report Councillor Alexander stated that the dam at Smith's Lake was in a serious condition the piles having sprung and great leakage caused thereby. The present dam is in a very dangerous state and it is absolutely necessary to build a concrete dam.

After discussion it was agreed that the Town Engineer prepare a survey of the ground and give estimates for the construction of a concrete dam.

Regarding the extension of Sewerage to the Pichette property on Sugarloaf Street it was agreed to leave this over till the spring. Councillor Lunan submitted report from the Police and License Committee recommending payments of accounts amounting to \$52.00. Report received and adopted.

Under new business Councillor Pinault brought up the question of Father Wallace property, a plan of Central Street being shown. On motion plan was referred back to Committee for further date.

His Worship brought up the matter of shacks on Water Street which was discussed at great length, and ultimately Councillor Alexander moved and Councillor Mowat seconded that notice be given to such owners and tenants that said shacks must be removed according to the bye-laws.

As Messrs. J. S. Benson and M. A. Kelly had not been sworn in as School Auditors as provided by the bye-laws they were again appointed.

Councillors McKenzie, Moores and Lunan brought to the notice of the council the matters of guy ropes, unprotected basements and unlighted openings in streets, and the clerk was instructed to write all such offenders.

Councillor Pinault brought to the notice of the chairman of the Electric Light Committee the fact that many householders were yet without light in their houses, in standing the case of Mr. C. S. O. Crockett. Councillor Mowat in reply stated that definite instructions had been given not to give electric light to any person or persons who were in arrears for electric light supplied.

The Police and License Committee were instructed to prepare and arrange tariff for cab and truckmen in the town.

GIRL KIDNAPPED

Returning From Mass, is Seized By Brigands—Reward of \$2,000 Offered.

Turin, Nov. 10.—Signorina Laura Abbate, the 29-year-old daughter of a wealthy merchant at Palermo, has been kidnapped by brigands in broad daylight in one of the main thoroughfares of the Sicilian capital. While returning home from mass in the company of her aunt the girl was seized by a powerful ruffian who has several accomplices, and was bundled into a cab which was waiting. The aunt and most of the bystanders were dumfounded, and two eyewitnesses who sought to rescue the victim were beaten off with knotted whips by a couple of coachmen.

The police managed to keep the affair secret but the family have now published a poster relative to the outrage. They offer \$2,000 reward to anyone giving information that may lead to the discovery of the girl's whereabouts.

Kidnapping is becoming an alarming common crime at Palermo.

NEW RINK FOR NELSON

Mack O'Brien and John Lynch of Nelson are building a new rink. The building is 104 feet in length by 56 feet in width and is being built on the lower corner of the old Sutton farm now owned by Jas. Lynch. It is intended to have it all ready for use by the time the first frost comes.

THE FRANCO-GERMAN DISPUTE

Germany and France have, after months of negotiation, come to an agreement in regard to their spheres of influence in Africa.

Germany agrees that France shall have the political protectorate of Morocco, the most valuable unappropriated colonial territory that was left in any part of the world. She also cedes the disputed frontier districts of Togoland in West Africa and gives up to France a small district immediately south of Lake Tchad.

In return France cedes to Germany about 80,000 square miles of the Congo territory allowing Germany access to Belgian Congo and, but for a chain of islands, interrupting French communications between Algeria and the Congo coast. Germany will now be a neighbor to the great Congo Free State, which is administered by Belgium and which is now spoken of as likely soon to be partitioned between the bigger countries. Germany evidently having planned to be right at hand when the breakup occurs.

On the whole, France gets much the better of the bargain, as Morocco is suitable for white people and Congo is not, and Morocco is many times nearer to France than Congo is to Germany.

The Moroccan question is not, however, closed. Spain holds more territory there than is pleasing to France and shows no signs of being willing to withdraw. This will necessitate a more or less prolonged negotiation between these two countries. But Germany has retired from the North African region, and France again breathes freely.

ONTARIO POLITICS

There will be a Provincial general election in Ontario early in December, and the four parties—Conservative, Liberal, Independent Labor and Socialist—are lining up for the fray.

Premier Sir James Whitney continues to lead the Conservative party and appeals to the people on the record of his administration.

The Liberal leader, Hon. A. G. MacKay, has resigned and has been succeeded by N. W. Rowell, K. C., a well-known figure in religious activity and moral and social reform. He announces as part of his platform his intention to substitute for the present three-fifths clause a law making a simple majority vote sufficient for abolition of liquor licenses and to give each municipality the right to reduce or abolish taxes on improvements and make up the taxes so lost by increased taxation on land values. This, which is opposed by Whitney, is in line with the proposal adopted last month by the Union of N. B. Municipalities.

Otherwise, the Conservative and Liberal platforms are pretty much alike.

In the matter of election deposit Ontario is ahead of New Brunswick and other provinces. It is not necessary in Ontario for candidates for the legislature to deposit \$100 each, to be forfeited in case the candidate fails to receive half as many votes as the winner. This deposit is most unfair and unjust, especially to the smaller and poorer parties and to candidates of small means, and should be abolished in all provinces.

Balfour Re-signs Opposition Leadership

London, Nov. 8.—The Unionist party is to swap horses while crossing the home Rule party stream. Arthur J. Balfour, at an emergency meeting of the city of London Conservative Association this afternoon, announced to his constituents his retirement from the leadership of the opposition.

Impaired health, increasing age and the desirability of the leadership passing into younger hands were the reasons which he gave for this step in a speech which was applauded by much feeling. But no one doubts that the increasing attacks against him by the ambitious younger Conservatives, particularly the tariff reformers, were the principal factor inspiring his decision.

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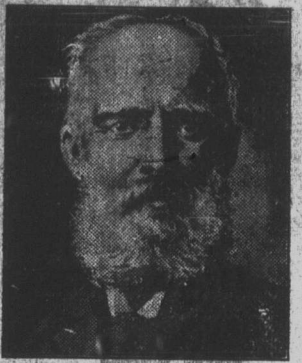

THE CHINESE REVOLUTION

The revolution, which began in
southwestern China against the
Manchu dynasty, a few months
ago, is now successful in over half
of China, and has forced the Gov-
ernment to grant a constitution of
the British pattern, to abolish all
special privileges of the Manchu
nationality and even to offer to
exclude members of the royal fam-
ily from cabinet positions. On
the other hand, the revolution-
ists, distrusting promises wrung
from the Manchus in the hour of
defeat, have declared for a repub-
lic.

Much bloodshed has occurred,
although very much less than in
any previous disturbance of like
magnitude. Foreigners and foreign
property have not been interfered
with, and almost perfect order is
being maintained in all sections
under revolutionary control. The
whole southern and middle sea
coast is now lost to the Govern-
ment, and the rebels are rapidly
advancing on Peking. There are
hopes of a settlement whereby the
autocracy and the rule of the
Manchus will go but the dynasty
be retained under a liberal consti-
tution guaranteeing justice to all
concerned.

ROCKS AHEAD

Our civic fathers in a few weeks will have an anxious time in the matter of enforcing the By-Laws especially the clauses relating to Fire District No. 1. It will be remembered that the applications of the various churches for the changing of the By-Laws to allow exemption from the provisions of the clauses governing buildings was in the cases of the Presbyterian and Baptist bodies turned down flat. The council stated in emphatic terms that the By-Laws must be enforced. These same By-Laws arrange for the removal of all shacks on Fire District No. 1 by the 31st of December of this year. This clause will effect all buildings which are not of standard fire proof construction as provided for in the By-Laws, and as it is not just nor in reason to make flesh of one and fish of another, there are a certain number of citizens who will see that the requirements of the By-Laws are carried out and that without par or favour. It has been stated openly and often that the council will not insist on the removal of these shacks on the prescribed date but it would be well to note the following facts; first that the OWNERS of such shacks or temporary buildings or buildings contrary to the building law of this fire district, took upon themselves the obligation to remove such shacks or buildings on a prescribed date, to wit the 31st Dec., 1911, or to make such buildings conform to said By-Law and second, the council when sworn in took upon themselves the obligation to serve the citizens to the best of their ability and to see that the By-Laws governing the town were administered in an impartial manner. It now remains therefore with both owners and council to observe their obligations, and as already stated if the council insist on a certain portion of the people observing all the provisions of the By-Laws, they must see that all are put in the same position.

The census department have given out the official figures for the town of Campbellton taken at last census as 3813. Just previous to the fire the estimated population was nearly 4000, and in 1905 a census taken by enumerators appointed by the Town Council gave the population as 3745.

We can congratulate ourselves that even with such a disaster as did overtake us in July 1910 we have not fallen very far back, and we have the confident feeling that our town will yet occupy a higher plane than it has done in the past.

Rudolstadt, Germany, Nov. 11.—In the elections for the Chamber of Representatives for the Principality of Schwarzburg Rudolstadt, held yesterday the Socialists were elected, and there is a possibility of another being returned in the second balloting. The chamber is composed of sixteen members and the Socialists therefore are now in the majority.

Grave concern is felt in official circles over the condition of the dam at Smith's Lake. This dam was put up five years ago and was all that the town could afford at the time, but was never more at any time but a temporary structure. We are now faced with the necessity of building a concrete dam.

A RESTIGOUCHE CASE

In County Court Chambers this morning before Judge Forbes, hearing on the return of the summons granted on Monday last in the case of Robert Crawford vs. Shives Lumber Company, Ltd., was heard. The defendant obtained a summons calling upon the plaintiff to show cause why the venue should not be changed from the St. John County Court to the Restigouche County Court. After hearing argument of counsel His Honor made an order changing the venue without costs. This is an action brought by the plaintiff, who was formerly the chief of police of Campbellton, against the defendant for alleged police work outside the town of Campbellton. Messrs. McInerney and Trueman are solicitors for the plaintiff, and Mr. A. E. G. McKenzie, of Campbellton, for the defendant. Mr. McInerney appeared for the plaintiff at this morning's hearing, and Mr. H. D. Forbes for the defendant.

Campbellton ran a hard chance of losing part of her police force last week. Officer Harris who takes his meals at a small lunch wagon became ill last Wednesday after partaking of a meal there and is still under the doctors care. The proprietor of the lunch wagon himself took ill on Thursday and on Friday officer Brown was attached with the same symptoms. In the two latter cases the illness although severe was slight and it is conjectured the sickness was caused through eating tainted meat or taking meals cooked in the same vessels as were used to heat tainted stuff.

ANGLICAN SYNOD CLOSES SESSIONS

Minimum Stipends \$900 and Free House
--Strong Action Re Moral and Social Reform.

The Anglican Diocesan Synod met in Fredericton from Tuesday to Thursday last week.

It was decided to hold next meeting in St. John on the first Tuesday of next November.

A report was adopted recommending the establishment of a minimum stipend of \$900 and a house, but they did not recommend the immediate appointment of a financial secretary to carry out the recommendation. It was suggested however, that Bishop Richardson at the Laymen's Missionary Congress to be held in St. John shortly, lay the matter before the layman of the church.

It was decided that the money to be raised for Kings College be retained and the interest paid over.

The notice of motion given by Rev. D. Conners to the effect that no party to a marriage after a divorce, granted for cause arising after marriage, shall hold any office, parochial or diocesan stands over until next session, there not being sufficient time to consider it.

The grants from the widows and orphans special fund were increased from \$150 to \$250.

Changes in the forms of statistical returns were decided upon.

The committee on Religious Instruction in schools reported satisfactory progress.

The report of the committee on Moral and Social Reform endorsed the General Synod's strong condemnation of, and opposition to, Betting and Gambling and the White Slave Trade; and the leniency of the law relating to seduction, prostitution, and the sale of obscene literature, cards or pictures; and also called upon the government to take measures to overcome the evils of drunkenness by doing everything possible to remove temptation from the path of the weak.

The Women's Auxiliary reported \$422.50 cash and \$350 worth of clothing sent to Campbellton, and \$190.90 sent to China famine sufferers.

A motion to change the canon increasing the grant from one hundred and fifty to two hundred and fifty dollars to the Clergy Widows and Orphans' Fund, was passed without discussion.

Financial aid had been given to six missions.
